The vigil will begin at 7pm at the Kennedy Park Gazebo and will be followed by a candlelight procession to St. Peter's school cafeteria where there will be a reception. ACLA will provide candles and red ribbons, but feel free to bring your own.

IS AIDS A GAY DISEASE?

The October 1996 Update elicited several responses expressing some very strong sentiments regarding our work within the gay, lesbian, and bisexual communities of Androscoggin County. Several people are concerned that the AIDS Coalition of Lewiston-Auburn focuses too much of its attention in these communities.

Our prevention programs target individuals who are at highest risk for HIV. The ACLA staff tailors programs to their needs. Because gay communities in the United States, and in Maine, have been and continue to be the most affected by the AIDS epidemic, reducing the number of infections within this

community is very important.

ACLA's prevention and education programs take into account the fact that we cannot use the same message for all groups. After all, what is effective for gay men is not necessarily going to make the same impression on women or high school students. Our prevention education in the gay communities includes the traditional information sessions and distribution of literature and condoms, but also includes community building within gay communities. Some of the community building work includes sponsoring social events and workshops for gay and bisexual men. Because community building creates social and support networks, individuals are more likely to take care of each other and themselves. The willingness of local gay communities to address the AIDS epidemic and to work with ACLA has made the prevention education programs more effective.

We are currently working with other groups of people who, traditionally, have not considered themselves at risk for HIV infection. We are developing and extending our prevention programs to women, youth, young adults and the homeless. As different individuals and communities recognize that they are at risk, their input and feedback allow ACLA to design more effective prevention programs. However, reaching some segments of the population requires much groundwork due to the fact that they are unwilling to recognize that they are at risk for HIV.

The staff at ACLA believes in the work we perform for the greater Lewiston-Auburn area. More often than not, we receive positive feedback and praise for our work. As a result, we have faith that the community is also committed to preventing the spread of HIV/AIDS by promoting social justice, correcting myths and misinformation about HIV/AIDS, and de-stigmatizing this disease.
