This exhibition celebrates the recent publication of Edward V. Thompson's *Printed Maps of the District and State of Maine*, 1793-1860 (Bangor: Nimue Books & Prints, 2010). This period is very important in the geographic history of Maine and the cartographic history of the United States because it was during this time that Maine's boundaries were established and the state was organized as a discrete territory.

When the first map of Maine was printed in 1793, Maine had only five counties; the sixteenth and last was formed in 1860. The maps published between these two dates reveal the steady increase in people's geographical knowledge about the state: the location and contours of interior lakes and rivers; the construction of an extensive railroad system; the laying out of new townships; and the expansion of Maine's ports and mill towns.



For the United States, the decades from the ratification of the

Constitution to the outbreak of the Civil War witnessed the emergence and maturation of a distinctive cartographic tradition. *Printed Maps of Maine* displays key examples of the wide variety of works produced, from atlas maps (including a very rare "rolled" atlas), wall maps, pocket maps, and maps from books and newspapers. A wide range of "quality" is evident in the maps on display, from true cartographic masterpieces by some of the greatest U.S. mapmakers to news maps intended to have only a short life.

The last maps in this exhibition [40, 41] display the state's final territorial organization, with the incorporation of Knox County in 1860. Mapping of the state continued after 1860, of course, in a wide variety of formats and reflecting a variety of needs, but the basic shape of the map was henceforth set and unchanging.

The forty-one maps in this exhibition represent less than a quarter of those painstakingly identified and described by Professor Thompson in his study. Please note:

MAINE WALKE

OSGOOD CARLETON AND THE FIRST MAP OF MAINE

A land surveyor and teacher of the mathematical arts in Boston, Osgood Carleton (1741-1816) compiled existing manuscript maps and plans into maps of the district [1, 2]. Carleton persuaded the Commonwealth of Massachusetts to require every town to make a detailed plan and from these he compiled large maps of both Massachusetts and Maine. The authorities rejected the first maps because of the poor quality of their engraving; new maps were therefore prepared [3, 4]. Subsequent maps of Maine from the 1790s were endebted to Carleton's work [5, 6].

MOSES GREENLEAF: MAINE'S GREATEST MAPMAKER

Moses Greenleaf (1777-1834) was an outspoken advocate of Maine statehood and economic development. His first map accompanied his compelling argument for independence; he reissued it 1820 as the first map of the *state* of Maine [7, 8]. He continued to promote the settlement and development of Maine's interior. His promotional materials included a large

wall map emphasizing the uncertainty of Maine's northern boundary — which would be updated once the boundary was fixed in 1842 [9, 10] — and a small atlas [11, 12].

MAPS OF MAINE, 1820-1833

Maps of Maine appeared in many American atlases of the early nineteenth century, including works by Henry C. Carey and Isaac Lea [13, 14], Anthony Finley [15], David H. Burr [16], Jeremiah Greenleaf, Samuel G. Goodrich, and Fielding Lucas, Jr. [17].

A NEW MAP OF MAINE, 1833-1860

The most persistent atlas map of antebellum Maine was Henry Schenck Tanner's A New Map of Maine, which appeared in twenty-eight variants between 1833 and 1860. Seven variants are displayed here [18-24], including two in the form of pocket maps [20, 23] and one as an early attempt at full-color printing [24].

THE NORTHEASTERN BOUNDARY CONTROVERSY

Maine's northern boundaries — the U.S. northeastern boundary — remained in dispute from the Revolutionary War to the final compromise in the 1842 Treaty of Washington, better known as the Webster-Ashburton Treaty. The keen interest in the affair generated many maps on both sides of the Atlantic [25-27].
