This is the first march on Washington to be explicitly inclusive of bis. Plan to participate. There are all sorts of opportunities for bis to contribute **writing and visual work** to a variety of books and periodicals. Contact me for a list. There are too many for this newsletter. You don't have to be an experienced author. It's the thought that counts. That's why they have editors.

And speaking of writing, Alan Hamilton (president of ECBN) and I have co-authored some **new materials on sexual orientation and bisexuality**. Our article on using the Klein Index to understand sexual orientation is a resource material for the Unitarian Universalist Welcoming Congregations (sexual minority) Program and has been mailed to trainers all over the U.S. and Canada. We are now editing it into a short form which will be distributed by ECBN. Hopefully, it will be ready for inclusion with our next newsetter. We also wrote an ECBN brochure on Oppression which will be available soon. Now, we're submitting an article on Sexual Orientation to Anything That Moves, a national bi journal.

In June, Alec Craig, the Sangerville/Dexter UU minister, and I completed our training for the **Unitarian Universalist Welcoming Congregations Program** (sexual minorities.) We will be trainers for the Northeast District for the next two years. Our beat is Maine and all of the Maritime provinces of Canada. We'll be encouraging congregations to participate in this program and training leaders for those congregations who decide to try it. I'm really excited about creating more bi/gay/lesbian/trans friendly people and places in my home state.

Excerpts from "Pride: The Challenge of Working For Change," a speech by Raven Gildea at the 1992 Seattle Pride Rally.

..."The bisexual movement is a serious challenge to the lesbian/gay community, because accepting our place in this community means change. Change is threatening. It means surrendering the familiar. But when the familiar is oppressive change is necessary....There are many who claim that bisexuals are not discriminated against when they are perceived as straight. Well, lesbians and gays aren't discriminated against when they are perceived as straight either. We in the bi community are here today because we refuse to assimilate. We will not hide in the straight world, and we will not hide in a closet labelled 'gay' either We will not be silent. Se will not be invisible. We will not be discriminated against, outside or within the gueer community....In a society where we are defined as people by the gender of our lovers, in a world which insists we must fit into one of two mutually exclusive categories, bisexuals are defined out of existence. When we refuse to let that happen, we challenge the either/or thinking on which Western civilization is based....So whu should this fight be the fight of lesbians and gays also? Because until all people are free, none of us is....To build community-based power, we need to welcome and celebrate diversity. We need to recognize that the more we stand together, the stronger the stand we can take."
