## **Biographical Note**

Harriet Sweetser was born on July 27, 1881. She attended Gorham Normal School, and later taught a grammar school in Dover-Foxcroft, Maine. She became a superintendent. The State Education Department named Sweetser the first Administrator for Home Economics.

Sweetser died on March 27, 1925 of complications from an appendectomy.

These letters were found by her niece, Elizabeth Sweetser Baxter.

## **Description of the Papers**

These letters, written by Harriet Sweetser, date from 1898 to 1916. Most of the letters are from her time spent as a student at the Gorham Normal School. Almost all of the letters are addressed to her mother, with a few to her father. Sweetser writes home to tell her parents about her day to day life at school.

There are also a couple of photographs. Elizabeth Sweetser Baxter also donated a copy of the notes she made on the letters, which includes explanations of names, as well as a comprehensive list of all the letters she found. There is also a miscellaneous folder, which includes items from organizations in Dover-Foxcroft, Maine.
