October 7 2:30 — 8:15 p.m. WAITING FOR GODOT

The Theatre Company of Boston

The first production of **Waiting for Godot**, written by Samuel Beckett, was staged in Paris and ran for over 300 performances. No other play has had so great an impact on modern theatre.

LA STRADA (The Road)

Starring Anthony Quinn and Guilietta Masina, La Strada is a story of a simple-minded waif, a brutish strong-man and a philosophical "fool" who travel the highway in Italy, and through the artistry of all concerned, it is a story of every man's loneliness and search for the way of life. Acclaimed as the best foreign film of 1966, La Strada has won countless awards.

Oct. 19 7:30 p.m. THE GOLDEN AGE OF COMEDY

The Golden Age of Comedy stars everyone from Will Rogers to the Keystone Cops and exhibits classic proof that the camera as a vehicle for humor reached its peak in the days of the silent comedies.

Nov. 30 7:30 p.m. CITIZEN KANE

Citizen Kane was Orson Welles' first and most famous film, and is a devastating biography of a newspaper tycoon, in which new expressionist film techniques were employed to depict and develop character and story. The film stars Orson Welles, Joseph Cotton and Agnes Moorehead.

Dec. 14 7:30 p.m. RICHARD III

Richard III is Shakespeare's dark history of a wicked king and has been called by the Saturday Review: "the best-acted picture that has ever been produced." Its stars include Laurence Olivier, Claire Bloom, Cedric Hardwicke and Helen Hayes.

Jan. 11 7:30 p.m. THE LONG VOYAGE HOME

The Long Voyage Home, based on plays by Eugene O'Neill, was directed by John Ford and stars Thomas Mitchell, John Wayne, and Barry Fitzgerald. One of America's greatest directors proves that elaborate and expensive sets are not requisite to a truly great motion picture in this epic story of men who live by the sea.
