Fighting the Right in northern Maine

Aroostook County begins to organize against anti-lesbian/gay forces

A concerted organizing effort has begun in Aroostook County to counteract the right wing extremists who are attempting to limit our freedom. They wish to prohibit the enactment of any law which protects nonheterosexuals from discrimination in Maine and to repeal such existing laws in Portland and Lewiston. An Auburnbased group, "Concerned Maine Families," has organized a statewide petition drive to put such a law before voter referendum in November. 1994.

Eight people from The County attended a day-long series of "Fight the Right" workshops August 7 in Augusta. Co-sponsored by the Maine Lesbian-Gay Political Alliance and the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force, the workshops provided guidance and education on how to organize against the growing religious right extremists and Maine's Colorado-style anti-gay petition drive in particular.

Seven of the eight Northern Lambda Nord members who attended the August 7 workshops were present at a September 1 follow-up meeting in Presque Isle. At the Augusta workshops they

had split into two groups in order to attend the different workshop sessions. Two major topics covered at these workshops were discussed at the Presque Isle meeting.

The first half of this two-hour followup session focused on organizing and building a stronger community, as well as coalition-building both within our community and with other supportive groups and individuals in northern Maine. The second part of the discussion reviewed how to deal with the local media, how to get our message out, and how to counter the right wing in the electronic and print media.

Concensus was easily reached on the need to get more individuals involved, whether they are NLN members or not. Some people are easily motivated, but to reach the majority of lesbians, gaymen, and bisexuals in our rural region, a one-on-one recruitment effort must be undertaken. It is important to tap into people's individual strengths, whether it be licking stamps

members to see what kind of contribution they can make · sending out a widescale mailing to current, former, and some non-Lambs in order to publicize this fight-the-right campaign · creating specific committees to give



in the privacy of their kitchen, or being interviewed by WAGM on television. All contributions to this fight, no matter how small, are essential. You can be sure the religious right has no problem getting volunteers.

A list was made of the initial goals of this local campaign. These include: • contacting previous NLN Steering Committee members and past NLN

people a way they can get involved (i.e., newspaper committee which monitors all the local papers and cuts out gay/lesbian- and right wing-related articles; phone tree committee to organize phone numbers to facilitate easy and quick communication, from Madawaska to Orient) . preparing a press kit for use with the media · get to know area reporters . sending out and following up on regular press

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releases/calendar announcements (especially important is the follow-up, questioning why an item did not appear in the paper, and thanking them when it did).

Copies of videotapes of the Augusta workshop sessions will be obtained and reviewed. Highlights of the tapes will be presented at a meeting later this fall.

If you'd like to find out more about what's happening, whether you feel like getting involved or not, you're urged to attend the next meeting, Wednesday, September 22 at 6pm at the Gay-Lesbian Phoneline in Caribou. We'll order out for pizza and discuss the next steps we need to take to fight for our rights.

Fighting the Right in Maine

Statewide planning meeting in Bangor

Sunday, September 12 saw about 40 people from throughout Maine, including three from Aroostook County, gather at The Rage in Bangor. The occasion was a strategy meeting to organize a statewide effort to fight the Concerned Maine Families' petition and ballot initiative which would block the civil rights of the gay-lesbianbisexual community in Maine. The meeting was chaired by Paula Aboud, president of the Maine

Lesbian-Gay Political Alliance.

During the four-hour gathering, ideas for the structure of a statewide organization were discussed in detail. As a model for community organizing, the way Idaho's "fight the right"

group structured was explained. The statewide group, Idaho Voices for Human Rights, includes local committees such as Boise Voices for Human Rights, and Pocatello Voices for Human Rights, incorporating their local community names. Those in the supportive religious community are called, Voices of Faith for Human Rights. The groups' slogan is, "Don't Sign On!"

The goal of the Maine group is to make sure the ballot initiative never passes and never becomes law in this state. As part of the strategy to stop the right wing, people in every community will be recruited to make sure that on election day, November 2, if there is a CMF member at the polls asking people to sign their petition then there is someone to explain to people why they should not sign. Training for these volunteer poll sitters will be held after the next statewide organizing meeting, which is Saturday,

October 2, from noon-4pm at The Rage. ▼

Fighting the Right in Lewiston

Voters will decide on civil rights ordinance

The front line for civil rights in Maine has moved to the state's second-largest city, Lewiston. With the veto of anti-discrimination legislation by Governor John McKernan, a local referendum vote on a Lewiston anti-discrimination ordinance becomes the next

battleground in the fight for equality.

The
Lewiston City
Council
adopted an ordinance
which outlaws
discrimination based upon
one's sexual orientation;
this law is similar to one
passed earlier in Portland
which was then put to voter
referendum. The law was
upheld by city voters. Now
it's Lewiston's turn.

Maine is one of 12

states targeted by the extreme religious right wing for anti-gay/lesbian referenda. They think that Lewiston is just the kind of place where their "No Special Rights" argument might work. A victory for us in a blue-collar French-Catholic city such as Lewiston is a key to countering opposition to gay and lesbian civil rights in Maine. The right wing awaits the outcome of this election. A positive vote in Lewiston will send a message to the leaders of the Right in Maine and across the U.S.



Readers of Gav Publications

Wealthier and bettereducated than most

Marketing surveys show that gaymen and lesbians have substantially higher household incomes than the national average, and extra-ordinary consumer demographics, giving us one of the largest blocks of disposable income in the United States. These conclusions were reached by Strub Media Group after a February 1992 survey of readership of 10 gay publications.

The household income of those lesbians and gaymen responding to the survey averaged \$63,100; the national average is \$36,500. Only 18% of Americans are college graduates but 61% of readers surveyed have a college degree. Over half of

the readers - 51% - are in professional or managerial jobs. The national average is 15.9%.

The ten members of the National Gay Newspaper Guild which surveyed their readers were Bay Area Reporter (San Francisco), Bay Windows (Boston), Dallas Voice, Frontiers. The New Voice, New York (City) Native, Philadelphia Gay News, The Washington (D.C.) Blade, The Weekly News, and Windy City Times (Chicago).

Northern Lambda Nord conducted a regional demographics survey between January and September 1992. People residing in three of the four counties in this region, Aroostook, Madawaska, and Carleton, completed surveys. Rather than household income, the NLN survey asked for individual annual gross income, which averaged \$22,300. Nearly onequarter of the respondents -24% - earned under \$10,000: 4% earned over \$50,000.

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
The education-level in the Lambda survey showed a 50%-50% split between those with and those without a college degree. \textsf


