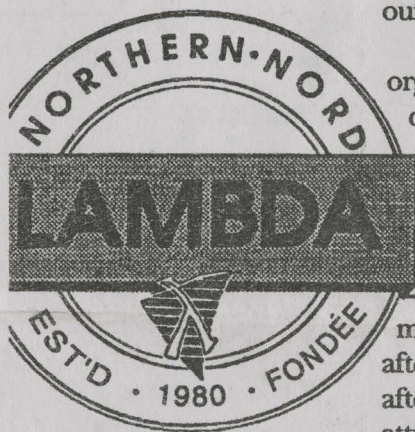

Beginning Our 15th Year

Members set goals to be reached during 1994

At the monthly business meeting Sunday, January 16th in Caribou, Northern Lambda Nord members adopted a list of five goals to accomplish during 1994. These include • increase the number of members in the organization • complete the computer entries and organization of the members' lending library and prepare a written list of the entire book collection



for distribution to the membership • participate, as an organization, in one community event • organize and hold an AIDSwalk in October • reach a total of \$4,000 in the community center building fund by the end of 1994.

Discussion focused around the means to reach these goals. Two ways were

discussed with regards to increasing membership. In order to make more people in the area aware of the existence of Lambda, the group needs to become more visible. A first step would be to announce our monthly meetings in the "community calendar" sections of the weekly newspapers in the region. A second step would be to have each member urge someone new to join the group, thereby doubling our membership.

With respect to organizing the library collection, an effort which has been dragging on for years, the monthly "library day" for February has been moved from a Saturday afternoon to a Sunday afternoon, with the goal of attracting more volunteers. People are also reminded that they need not wait for a "library day"; they are encouraged to volunteer some time any weekday evening or free weekend to enter books into the computer. (At the conclusion of the January 16th meeting, one NLN member went to the library and completed the input of

one and a half shelves of books into the computer, 66 titles, in less than two hours.)

In years past Northern Lambda Nord was more active in community events, such as creating a snow sculpture for the Caribou Winter Carnival. It was suggested that we participate in one of the area's community activities this year, such as the Caribou Winter Carnival Parade in February, the Acadian Festival Parade in Madawaska in June, the 'Roostook River Raft Race in July, or the Potato Blossom Festival Parade in July. It would require participation of members to help behind-the-scenes, whether it's building a raft or a float; they needn't participate publicly.

Every October there are regional fundraising benefits for AIDS. This October NLN will organize an AIDSwalk in Aroostook County to benefit an AIDS organization.

The bottle and can drives, the raffle ticket sales, the NLN mug sales, and cash donations to our fund to create a gay-lesbian-bisexual community center in this region is three years old this month. Though we have collected bottles, and

sold tickets and mugs, it has grown by less than \$1000 per year. We currently stand at \$2881.66. Our goal for 1994 is to reach the \$4000 mark by the end of December. This will require people to make a conscious effort to save their bottle and can deposits, and donate them to the fund. Promote the sale of Lambda mugs - they're \$5 each, do you have yours, yet?! Help with the sale of our tickets for the next raffle - it's for a \$100 shopping spree at the store of your choice. Raffle tickets will be available in late January; the winning ticket will be drawn at the October 1st membership drive party - that gives us nine months to sell tickets and raise money for the building fund.

These truly modest goals will be achieved with the support of the membership. You need not

Another Grant Application

Within a period of two weeks, Northern Lambda Nord has submitted grant applications totalling \$40,000 to help us purchase property for the establishment of the first gay-lesbian-bisexual community center in either Maine or New Brunswick.

The first request was to apply for an application from the OUTFund for \$20,000. They are a national funding group, part of the Funding Exchange. The OUTFund gives money only to lesbian and gay groups. If they approve our preliminary submission, we will then request the money in a more complete application. That "request-to-apply" was submitted at the end of December 1993.

The Haymarket People's Fund of New England is marking its 20th anniversary by awarding 20-\$20,000 grants. NLN has applied for one of these grants, again in support of our community center. Haymarket is organized into regional funding boards; Maine constitutes

one region. This means that people in Maine review applications from within the state and decide who receives funding. We

A total of \$40,000, plus the \$2880 in our building fund, would be close to the amount needed to purchase property. With the closure of Loring Air Force Base and the sale of many properties by people leaving the area, the Army Corps of Engineers now owns a lot of vacant houses. This is a good time, while the real estate market is depressed, to purchase property. In the Haymarket grant application, several factors were noted when looking for a suitable building: the property would have to be properly zoned, it would need the right number and size of rooms for our library, office, and meeting spaces, it would need to be wheelchair accessible, have safe and sufficient parking, and include some type of income property, such as a second-floor or rear apartment. The rental income would be necessary to cover the ongoing

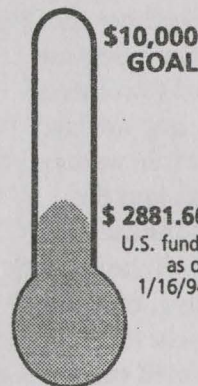
There are currently several HIV-related projects underway in Maine.

The Mabel Wadsworth Women's Health Center is sponsoring a day-long conference on lesbian health Saturday, April 9 at the Airport Marriott Hotel in Bangor. This is the first of its kind in Maine and will provide information about

lesbians' health and healthcare from a variety of perspectives.

Peaches Bass, coordinator of the Lesbian Health Project at the Wadsworth Center, notes that "lesbians in Maine have been clamoring" for a health forum. "We're eager to give and receive information on everything, including cancer, sexuality, economics, mental health, ageing, coming out, family health, substance abuse, staying healthy, being smart healthcare consumers, being better healthcare providers, having kids, community health, and more." The conference promises to have a diverse array of workshops.
