


Launching the Class of '87

Commencement Day 1987 was sunny and mild outside and colorful inside the Cumberland County Civic Center with flowers, robes and hoods and the green and white parasols of the Class of 1937. The Class of 1987, along with those students receiving associate and master's degrees, a total of some 800 students, shared this milestone in their lives with their near and dear, approximately 6000 parents, grandparents, children, spouses and friends.

The excitement of the day was underlined by Governor John R. McKernan, who urged the graduates to set new aspirations for themselves. "While today represents the fulfillment of one dream, it should also be the beginning of others," he said. The governor then moved to the main focus of his speech, whether those dreams could be achieved at home in Maine. He outlined the steps which need to be taken so the goals of the young don't take them out of state. "As graduates of the University of Southern Maine, you have been fortunate to attend a school that caters to individual needs and potentials," he said. "... What I would wish for you, and for all the citizens of this state is that you are provided the opportunity and resources that allow you to take advantage of your talents and to advance confidently....'

Student commencement speaker, David Tolstrup, whose wife and daughter watched from the audience, exhorted his fellow graduates to use the opportunity represented by a university education to face the challenges presented by our shrinking world and growing technology. He cited recent crises, such as the Chernobyl disaster, which he hoped will force us finally to "accept the fact that there is really only one environment - Earth's environment [and] there is only one humanity."

In a similar vein, Interim President Harlan A. Philippi in his charge to the graduates reminded them that a university education must be used properly. "We expect you to honor your university education; to remain educable by reaching for perspectives throughout your life beyond those of your single discipline...beyond those of the jobs

Recognizing the Best and the **Brightest**





Cowie, an education major, has chaired the Senate Finance Committee and the Student Events Board. He also has been active in student orientation programs, the USM Children's Christmas Party and Student Legal Services. In addition, he has done volunteer work for the Maine Association of Handicapped Persons, The Hunger Project and the High Level Nuclear Wastes Project. The Van Amburg Award, in memory of the longtime USM student services staff member and USM graduate, is presented to a student deserving special recognition for volunteer efforts.

A committee of students, faculty and staff select the recipients of the senior awards and the Van Amburg award.

Among the other awards and their recipients were:

- The Arthur H. Benoit Memorial Scholarship, given in memory of the University of Maine System Trustee and his wife Judith, was also presented to David Cowie, for leadership and a willingness to serve the university and community.
- The Dena A. Brooks International Student Scholarship was presented to Hannah V. Holmes, a junior who plans to study abroad next year. The award was established in memory of the wife of former USM president Kenneth Brooks.
- The Clara Burnham Award for significant contributions to residence life was given to Charles "Chuck" Lamb, our former director of residence life who now serves in a similar capacity at the University of Vermont. The award is in memory of the former residence director of Robie-Andrews Hall.
- Business student Kathryn Erswell was named recipient of The Mary Purkis Gilman Scholarship Award. Established in 1984 in memory of Mary Purkis Gilman, wife of retired executive and former Gorham business owner Horton Gilman, the award recognizes young people entering business.
- Outstanding Senior Woman Anne-Marie Girard also received the Gertrude M. Prinn Scholarship, named in honor of the Gorham alumna of 1923 and former director of reading in Portland schools. It is awarded to a woman who shows unusual promise of

becoming an outstanding elementary teacher.

- The Dorothea J. Vlahakos Memorial Scholarship went to junior communication major Lisa M. Luce. Leadership potential and scholastic achievement are criteria for the award. The scholarship is given in memory of the instructor at Gorham State College.
- Senior Peter R. Story was named the 1987 winner of the Roland Wirths Memorial Award. The Athletic Department presents the award to the person who best exemplifies the traits of the late sports editor and writer for the Guy Gannett newspapers.

Charles L. Cragin, an alumnus of USM and the School of Law and a partner in the law firm of Verrill and Dana, gave the opening address.









USM Looks at Gary Hart: "It's unfortunate that the religious right has been able to impose their obsession with bedroom issues on the country... Hart would have raised issues that may not be raised by any other candidate," Michael Hamilton, assistant professor of political science, said at a news conference on Gary Hart when he stepped out of the campaign for president. "I would prefer we would argue about issues, not image," countered Sandi Hanisko, assistant professor of communications, "but there's no denying that image has played an important part in the last eight presidential campaigns." Both professors concluded Hart had made a foolish mistake. The two faculty members answered questions from Channel 6, WPOR, WGAN and WWGT immediately after Hart's announcement. Note: Faculty members who have an expertise on a topic in the news should notify the office of Media Relations of their availability.

An open house was held Thursday evening, April 30 at our new Child Care Center, located next to the Portland Gym. Here, Eleanor Law, USM's social work consultant to Child Care Services, is pictured with one of four pieces entitled, "Childcare Seasons."
