Enclosed those few notes I had on Healy asylum & the nuns there.

The bldg is close to our Urban Renewal - the present venture of the nuns is not so profitable - I think - so they might dispose of the bldg & use nuns elsewhere.

If that happens this bit of historic info might be useful to you in disposing of the bldg materials since I don't plan to use it.

Plays were such a popular offerings for many years, that the community supported ^{local} amateur companies that had a regular schedule of presentations ~~here as well as in other fine cities.~~ ^{and toured our major cities.} One local woman played over 50 leading roles with such companies. Both the Musical and Literary club and the Cercle Canadien had their own theatrical companies for many years.

Residents can also recall those many years when every church group and local lodge would present at least a play each year. The same is true for benefit concerts that occupied nearly every Sunday evening through the winter season. ^R Let us not forget, either, the many ^{local} singers who rehearsed during those many months to participate in the annual Music Festival, usually presented in Portland and Bangor because ~~they~~ ^{those cities} had ~~their~~ halls sufficiently large to accommodate participants and audience, to which Lewiston-Auburn contributed ^a ~~its~~ generous share.

Dancing schools we have had in greater number and over more years than Portland ever enjoyed, going as far back as 1890 when Prof. George Wilson conducted his school of the dance and "ballroom deportment" ~~here~~ in Lewiston. All our schools give annual recitals that compare favorably with any presented in Portland, and residents also recall when Lewiston dancers were ^{guest} soloists at Portland dance recitals.

~~Let us also mention the Greek plays that~~ Let us also mention the Greek plays that were long a feature of Bates College Commencements, and were followed by many ~~outstanding~~ outstanding ~~Shakespearian~~ Shakespearian productions as well as contemporary, even avant-garde plays by the ~~college~~ college Robinson Players.

We have our own community concerts, our own community little theater. We have an historial ^c museum, a permanent art gallery at the college where many touring shows are displayed. The founding president of what became the Maine ~~Commission~~ Commission of the Arts and Humanities is a Lewiston woman: ^(whose mother) Mrs. Peter A. Isaacson, the former Dorris Westall, was long an art teacher here.

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
