### GAY BAR FIRE KILLS 29

On Sunday evening, June 24th, 29 of our gay brothers and sisters were killed when a flash fire swept through "The Upstairs", a New Orleans gay bar. This bar was particularly popular on Sunday evenings, when a food and beer "special" was offered. Fire Chief McCrossen has refused to comment on the cause of the fire, although it has been (cont. page 2)

FIRE (cont.) alleged that the flash fire was started by an angered patron. In addition to the 29 deaths, several persons are in serious condition with burns and other injuries.

Among those killed in the blaze were the current pastor of the Metropolitan Community Church of New Orleans, and several members and friends of the MCC there. Rev. Troy Perry, founder of the Universal Fellowship of Metropolitan Community Churches, has flown to New Orleans to assist the survivors and the families of those killed.

Memorial Services are being held by the Gay community throughout the country, and Rev. Perry has named Sunday, July 1st as a national day of mourning. In Boston, a Memorial Service will be held by MCC on Saturday evening, June 30th, 7:00pm, at Old West Church.

#### CONFRONTATION AT WNAC

On Wed., 24th June, during Gay Pride Week, the weekly WNAC-TV (chan. 7) program MASSREACTION was given a sudden and unexpected taste of gay pride. The program, intended as a means in which "the public" can "communicate" with the station through its commentators, was attended by four members of the Gay Media Watch. Breaking into a fascinating philosophical discussion on boxing, Charlie Shively (also of Fag Rag) asked why men couldn't learn to love instead of hurt one another. After a long pause while their minds tried to recover, John Williams (also of Good Gay Poets) asked why channel 7 had devoted so little coverage to gay events, specifically Gay Pride Week. Again, Silence, nervous snickers, terror. Without allowing them to escape, Elaine Noble (also of Gay Way Radio) asked why the audience had snickered, and why none of the announcers had answered any of Charlie or John's questions. Were they afraid of us?

At this point, George Frazier, one of the commentators, finally responded that he was all for gay people and had never ignored us, but that he didn't want us to "scare the horses" by protesting too loudly or make ourselves too public.

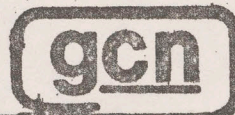
Although there were no dramatic, immediate results, consciousness was raised a few feet, and they are quickly learning that we are a force to be reckoned with.

## A SUMMARY OF GAY PRIDE WEEK EVENTS



### WANNA DANCE?

The Gay Community Center Committee sponsored three dances during Gay Pride Week, all held at the Charles Street Meetinghouse. The first, Saturday night the 16th, was the most successful, with the all-women's band "Whitch" drawing a sell-out crowd of 500, including many gay women who are noticeably absent at the regular Friday night dances.

Although the temperature in the hall at times neared ninety degrees, few seemed to mind greatly, and non-stop dancing to the great music was the standard for the night. The atmosphere became electric with so many people really enjoying themselves, leading the "Whitch" to remark that it was the best Gay Dance that they had ever performed at. (There is a tentative return engagement planned for a Friday and Saturday in September -- watch for details.)

The dance Friday the 22nd with the "Deadly Nightshade" drew 200 people. Although their music, of the foot-stomping country variety, complete with a fantastic fiddle and even a wash-board, was fascinating to watch and listen to, dancing was considerably harder, and the explosion of the crowd's energy never quite took place. (In all fairness, some people really got into the music that night, but not the majority. This group has electrified the whole crowd elsewhere, but Boston is just not used to them and this music.)

At the last dance on Saturday the 23rd, the "Whitch" could not quite repeat their previous performance, nor could the possibly danced-out crowd, which numbered only 300 in comparison to the 500 of a week earlier.

### FEETS, GET MARCHIN'!!

Boston's Gay Pride Week pranced smiling into the streets of the city Saturday morning, with the biggest Gay Pride parade Boston has ever seen. 300-500 gay sisters and brothers paraded from Copley Square (near Ken's) through the Block, the Common, and the Hill, past city and state power palaces, to proclaim their liberation.

Support flowed from numerous gay sidewalk paraders, bystanders, and the few straight-identified participants in the parade. Policepeople, unable to come out publicly because of their oppression as civil servants, nonetheless flashed their lights and made way for the gay throng. A group of women's-right-to-abortion picketers at the State House smiled with their gay sisters and brothers and raised their hands in mutual greeting, and shared chants.

As gay Pride Week began, the air vibrated with wishes of Happy Birthday to Christopher Street, and many happy returns of gay peace, love, and pride.

### ENCORE!!

The Gay Pride Week festivities at the Charles Street Meetinghouse were heightened by the one-night performance of the play "Coming Out", written by Jonathan Katz, originally produced at GAA's Firehouse in June of 1972, and produced and directed in Boston by Nicky Deutsch.

A collage of beautifully-performed sketches (based on poetry, fiction, autobiographical and historical accounts) traced the history of homosexuality,



and created an intense emotional experience for the audience, ranging from tears to anger to joy. In short, it was complete "mind-fucker". The talented cast included Harry Browne, Ken Dixon, Stephanie Johnson, Lynne Larkin, Loretta Lotman, Allison Mitchell, Christifa Sandborn, Michael Simmons, Joanna Ward, and Jim Zepp. They truly deserved the immense applause the standing-room-only crowd awarded them at the play's end. Don't pass up a chance to see "Coming Out." Your mind, spirit and body will be well rewarded. (See notice for P-town performance elsewhere in this issue.

#### MALE PAS-DE-DEUX highlights variety program

Thursday night's presentation of dance and music at the Meetinghouse was an artistic highlight of Gay Pride Week. All performances were volunteered by Boston artists.

The program began with a solo movement performance based on the theme of the four major elements, earth, air, fire and water. The dancer flowed through the increasingly complex interpretation of life. The artist was inventive in his use of lighting and props, particularly a large tie-dyed sheet that was used as a backdrop, shadow screen and finally as part of his costume.

Folksongs based on the themes of friendship and childhood experiences followed, performed a local singing team. The singers harmonized gracefully throughout the numbers, but were unfortunately handicapped by lack of a sound system.

The highlight of the evening came in a beautifully-choreographed and -performed pas-de-deux by two men. The dancers gave a wonderfully controlled performance in the love ballet, perhaps the first ever performed by male dancers. The piece, accompanied by piano, received a standing ovation from the enthusiastic crowd.

The evening was co-hosted by Loretta Lotman and James M. Zepp, cast members of "Coming Out" and members of Gay Media Watch.

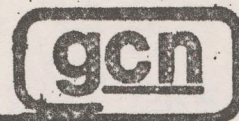
#### OUR BIG-CITY COUSINS

On June 24th an estimated 17,000 beautiful gay people took part in fourth annual Gay Pride March in New York City. Following the four-mile march from Central Park to Christopher Street, a rally was held in Washington Square, featuring speeches by Morris Kight and Barbara Gittings, and entertainment by Bette Midler and others.

Amid the air of celebration tension was felt when a transvestite attempted to speak. He was thrown off the stage the first time, and finally permitted to have the microphone only after the audience demanded to hear him. He complained of oppression of transvestites within the gay movement. Generating more conflict, a member of Lesbian Feminist Liberation condemned transvestites for their parodying of women. Later another angry transvestite from S. T. A. R. reminded us that drag queens first fought back at the Stonewall in 1969, and gave all of us our Gay Pride.

Miraculously, and somewhat ironically, the rally continued with its determined theme of gay unity. Seemingly, if gay unity is to exist it will have to be with an understanding of our essential differences as well as our common interests. Any attempt to formulate a single conception of gay





interests. Any attempt to formulate a single conception of gay identity is simplistic and self-righteous. This would have appeared to have been the genuine theme of this year's gay pride celebration.

#### WHAT THE HELL HAPPENED?

Amid the unity and gaiety of the Gay Pride festivities, there lies the dark cloud of confusion, mis-management, and basic poor organization. These two events are among the examples.

The organizers of the "Gay Cruise" were informed that "not enough tickets were sold" for the use of the large boat. Fine; so all the happy ticket holders piled onto the smaller boat, and so did a great many non-ticket holders. The immense crowd forced everyone to switch over from the smaller boat onto the larger one. Fortunately, this was the last move, and the cruise finally got underway. The exercise was great, but the hassle was a pain in the life preserver. Bon voyage!

Our second story opens up at the Charles Street Meetinghouse, with about thirty people waiting to hop on the second bus for the NYC march. The trouble was that there was no bus for them to hop on. The reason? No one knows, or if they do, they're not talking. The result? A lot of confused and angry gay sister and brothers thumbing their way to Fun City. Happy trails!

## D.O.B. OPEN HOUSE

On Tuesday evening, June 26, there was an open house of the Daughters of Bilitis. It was DOBs first rap session at their new offices in room 415, 419 Boylston St. In the last year their membership has grown from 40 to 100 women and prompted them to find larger offices.

The weekly raps begin with a "rap leader" collecting questions that the members would like the groups feedback on. This eliminates any "lack of communication" which some members may experience.

The sizable crowd was quite impressive, with some people seated in the outer office. Despite the amount of people, we were able to initiate a conversation dealing with many aspects of gay life, and create a pleasant and informative evening for all.

# "HAVE YOU HEARD THE WORD OF THE LORD TODAY?"

Our usual hum-drum afternoons at the Charles Street Meeting House had a one day spiritual uplift last Sunday (June 17) with a foot-stomping, hallelujah shouting Religious Workshop and Service as part of Gay Pride Week '73.

The workshop, moderated by Rick Hamilton, was attended by several local clergymen, ex-seminarians, as well as a hell of a lot of interested members of the community. Invited, but unable to attend, were members of the process, Scientology, and the Ranakrishna Vedanya Society. Also unable to honor us with his presence was a Cardinal Medeiros, a leader of a small but growing religious sect in the Boston area.

The workshop was followed by a heart-warming service under the supervision of Larry Bernier(MCC) Randy Gibson(CSMH\*UNIV.) Paul (Dignity-Boston), and also The Eyes of God. The service was an experience that none of the participants will soon forget, with a sharing of thoughts and feelings, and a reading of the "Creed for Gay People" by its creator, Paul Shanely. Editorial: Gay Pride Week -- more than a parade

This week was Gay Pride Week: a week featuring social events, workshops for the gay community and a parade.

But most people in the straight community will remember a bunch of men dressed up as cheap looking women with lots of lipstick and padding, walking down Commonwealth Avenue in tight dresses and blowing kisses to the gaping crowd.

It's too bad, because Gay Pride Week was an important event in Boston's gay community -- too important to be dismissed as a transvestite parade.

Workshops held at the Charles Street Meetinghouse brought many gay men and women together, giving them a chance to discuss mutual problems openly and frankly. For some it was the first chance to meet other homosexuals in a forum other than a street corner or gay bar and to communicate on an emotional and intellectual, rather than sexual, level.

The parade was no more than an attention-getting device to kick off the week and to draw attention to the gay community.

But it was a poorly chosen tactic, because it merely underlined the image that many people have of a homosexual as a one-dimensional drag queen.

The Boston press gave the parade wide coverage, but ignored the other more important events of the week, as was to be expected. In the press releases sent out to announce Gay Pride Week, no mention was made of the times and places of the other events.

If more thought had been given to the "public relations" of Gay Pride Week, a larger impact could have been made on the straight community. A parade of transvestites just didn't win for the Boston homosexual community the respect it deserves.

GCN Editor's note: This was the entire coverage of the Ledger on the parade, along with a picture of Sylvia. This is offensive to us on many levels, including 1) Faulty reporting; for those who did not see the parade, paragraph two gives the distinct impression that a thousand people in drag paraded. 2) No allowance is given to the fact that the actual three to six drags (depending on your definition of drag) represent only themselves, as do the other 1000. 3) Their inability to accept drag as a viable part of our diversified community.

Who coronated Sylvia "Queen of the Parade?" Myself and others on the Gay Pride Committee were surprised to find Sylvia speaking to the press and public as spokesperson (if not monarch) of the march; we still want to know by whom and how she was chosen.

Whoever was responsible for the decision was not a transvestite or transsexual since the latter had little place in this year's celebration. The hope was evidently to use Sylvia's popularity and extravagance to attract attention to the parade. In New York City the Lesbian Feminist Liberation statement supported "the right of every person to dress in the way that she or he wishes" but they opposed "the exploitation of women by men for entertainment or profit. ... What we object to today is another instance in which men laughing with one another, at what they present as women, are telling us who THEY think WE are."
