

Welcome to Maine Gay Symposium V — a time for sharing, reflection upon the past year, planning for the future, and unity, hope and strength. The past year has been one of both victories and defeats in our progress for equal rights. In June, the Dade County referendum passed repealing the gay rights ordinance, and we face the prospect of similar defeats in Wichita, Kansas; Seattle; Eugene, Oregon; St. Paul, Minnesota; Washington, D.C. and California. Gay rights bills were voted down in several states, including our own and Massachusetts. On the federal level, the Supreme Court, continuing its selective enforcement of the Constitution, ruled that school boards have the right to fire gay teachers. Leshian mothers are still losing custody battles in the courts. In Toronto, the offices of "The Body Politic," a gay publication, were raided by the police who seized the files and arrested the employees. Though abortion is still legal, low-income women have lost their right to terminate a pregnancy as many states follow the federal government's lead in limiting Medicaid funds to finance abortions.

But there have also been the victories. Edward Koch, the Mayor of New York City, issued an executive order forbidding discrimination against Gays in all areas of city employment, as one of his first actions in office. Aspen, Colorado recently became the 42nd city in the country to pass a Gay rights ordinance. An amendment to the Legal Services Corporation appropriations bill to prohibit the use of LSC funds in Gay rights cases was killed in a House-Senate conference committee. The U.S. Supreme Court declined to review a lower court ruling that required the University of Missouri to recognize the student Gay organization as an official campus group. On November 20, the women's movement openly and overwhelmingh threw its support behind Gay rights when the National Women's Conference passed a Gay rights resolution, giving further impetus to Gay Liberation. The Province of Quebec became the largest political unit in the world to pass a Gay rights bill and make discrimination against Gays a crime.



Locally, the Maine Leshian-Feminists have organized a Political Task Force to create a strong, unified Leshian presence in Maine's political arena. Maine Gay Men was organized in June. This year, we also witnessed the emergence of Gay-Straight Alliances in Orono, Brunswick and Waterville, a new step towards


establishing communication between Gays and straights in Maine. In October, the Wilde-Stein Club created utter chaos and havoc at UMO when it sponsored a Gay Bluejeans Day, one of the most successful events in the history of Maine's Gay movement.



The theme this year is CELEBRATE!!! Celebrate your gayness, our togetherness, and the joy of joining in unity with each other to share this weekend in an open celebration of the Gay Symposium's fifth year. United we stand - growing as our children grow along with us, sharing themselves with each other this weekend in workshops that they themselves have created We are their present; they are our future.

We, of the Wilde-Stein Club, Mainely Gay, Maine Lesbian-Feminists, Gay People's Alliance, Growing Sober and Gay, Maine Gay Men, the Greater Bar Area Lesbian Support Group, and the Gay-Straight Alliances have attempted organize the finest Symposium possible for you. But, the fact remains tha the Symposium is people, and together we can break the barriers of oppres in our society, hand in hand with all other oppressed peoples. CELEBRAT







#### KARLA JAY AND ALLEN YOUNG

Karla Jay and Allen Young, gay activists and writers, are coeditors of OUT OF THE CLOSETS: VOICES OF GAY LIBERATION (1972) and AFTER YOU'RE OUT: PERSONAL EXPERIENCES OF GAY MEN AND LESBIAN WOMEN (1975), two widely acclaimed books on Gay Liberation and the Gay experience WE ARE EVERY-WHERE: A CELEBRATION OF LAVENDER CULTURE will be published sometime this summer as a mass market paperback by Jove Books. Their newest book, WHAT DO YOU PEOPLE DO ANYWAY?, will be published in the fall by Summit Books. Curently, they are working on a survey of American and Canadian Gay Men and Lesbians.

Karla has written for Ms. Magazine, Mother Jones, The Villager, WIN, Lavender Women, the Detroit GAY LIBERATOR, Gay Sunshine, the Lesbian Tide of which she was the East Coast Coordinator, and many other Lesbian and Gay Publications.



Allen's activities in the anti-war movement led to his involvement with Liberation News Service, the underground press. He became involved in gay liberation in 1970 with the Gay Liberation Front of New York City. His initial career in journalism included a Fullbright Scholarship to Brazil, writing for the Christian Science Moniter, the New York Times, and the Washington Post. Allen currently lives in rural Massachusetts where he is involved in organic gardening, the anti-nuke movement, a local food cooperative, and writing for many Gay periodicals. He "has hazel eyes and other charms."


There will be a meeting after the General Session for all those who want to work for the paper - we hope to see you there!

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Since the last Symposium, a new addition to Maine's Gay community emerged with the establishment of Maine Gay Men. The first organizational meeting of Maine Gay Men (MGM) took place in Portland on June 26, 1977 as a result of several men feeling a need for their own space to deal with significant issues in their own lives and the lives of other gay men. zeconsillo (della lit was hoped that MGM would fulfill certain needs not met by current Maine Gay movement organizations, encourage growth of political consciousness, facilitate political mobilization, and gring about further social contact and peer support among Maine's Gay male population. A monthly newsletter published after each meeting serves as a primary unifying factor. Articles, reproducable art, poetry and letters are encouraged and welcome. #### WOMEN'S VIDEO WORKS, INC.

Women's Video Works, Inc. is a team of five women, committed to providing women of Maine - particularly working women - access to the media, in order to share information, discuss mutual concerns, explore current issues of interest to women, and to help create a better informed and more cohesive community which can begin to deal more effectively with its problems.

With the help of a grant from the Maine Council for the Humanities and Public Policy, and CETA positions from the Waldo County Committee for Social Action, Women's Video Works, Inc. is currently producing a half-hour color tape of Working Women in Waldo County. This tape will be an historical tribute to the work women have done, both paid and unpaid, in the home, factory, office, etc. Thus far, preliminary tapes have been made at Truitt Brothers, Inc., Stinson Canning, and Maplewood Poultry, all located in Belfast; and of Tibbetts Industries, of Camden. The group has also visited, and plans to make tapes of, Van Baalen of Rockland, and Edwards Manufacturing of Augusta.

Women's Video Works, Inc. is also producing a weekly show for Channel II (Cable T.V., Augusta) called Mainely Women. This show, aired every Tuesday, is a forum for discussing topical issues affecting, and of interest to, Maine women. The first few months of the program, have and will focus on various platforms raised at the National Women's Conference which was held in Houston, Nov. 18-21, 1977. Different guests discuss such issues as abortion, reproductive freedom, problems of welfare mothers, etc.

In the future, WVW, Inc. will be working with such groups as the HOME Cooperative of Orland, Family Planning, the Universalist-Unitarian Fellowship, the Women's Caucus of the AFL-CIO, Maine Mental Health Dept., and the Maine Public Broadcasting Network. ## WANTED: DYKES AND FAGGOTS FOR THE PORTLAND GAY COMMUNITY CENTER!

This is a call to dykes and faggots who have a strong and powerful consciousness of our oppression and the oppression of women by straight men. It is a call to those of you who have theories on the causes of our oppression, who oppose straight male dominance, and who oppose all of those who run our lives and crush our freedom.

This is a call to faggots and dykes who agree that the time for words, theory and rhetoric is over. This is a call to be active and start a practice in line with your consciousness and theory.

"Mainely Gay" and representatives from Lesbian/Gay and feminist organizations all over the state, recently decided that increased political awareness does not come from discos and alcohol. It doesn't come from listening to the straight man, and it doesn't come from silence -- because silence kills. It doesn't come from cruising tricks or chicks, apricot sours, Levis, 45's, or little boys.

We have decided that our words mean nothing to anyone unless there is a practice -- in an organization that exists ONLY for Lesbians and Gay men, with strong feminist ties. An organization dedicated to struggle against the hold of straight men -- that resists their attacks with equal vigor.

For this reason, a group of core organizers here in Maine has agreed to begin creating a Gay Community Center in Portland, in which alcohol will be noticeably absent, and where political dykes and faggots can gather for a variety of purposes. The Community Center is now in its planning stages and there is a mound of work that needs to be done if it is ever to get opened.

According to our plans, the Center will have a coffeehouse with entertainment by Gay men and Lesbians -- mostly guitarists etc., singing gay music. It will have a Gay/Feminist bookstore, selling literature from all over the country, and many other countries as well. Rap groups, political groups, newsletters, and many other gay organizations will be housed in the Community Center's offices. There will be a craft shop for revenue, selling regular things as well as gay buttons, T-shirts, pendants, etc.

The Community Center will be a forum for all gay politics as well as many feminist speakers and organizations. It will unite all of us who either already understand where our oppression comes from, or who want to learn about it. And it will give us the opportunity to DO something about that oppression other than talk about it.

What the Community Center will NOT be is another pick-up station, a disco hall, or a bar. To say the least, the atmosphere will be an activist one.

There is a ton of work that needs to be done, from raising revenues, to finding a suitable place. We have to order publications and films from all over the world, contact speakers for Lesbian mothers, and contact people experienced in martial arts to lead self-defense classes for Gay men and Lesbians.

For once, the ideas and dreams of active gay organizers and realists will not be co-opted by straight male forces, or by the profit motive. We want to explore the idea of collectives of faggots and dykes here in Maine, and continue to organize our people.

If you are tired of talking, of nothing but bars, tricks, and straight male supremacy, now is your chance to do more than talk about it. The organizing committee will launch its activities about three weeks after the Symposium. The topic of the Community Center will also be discussed in the General Session of the Symposium, and possibly in the workshop entitled "Building a Gay Community," to be held Sunday morning. #### ORONO GAY-STRAIGHT ALLIANCE

The GSA hopes to accomplish this by enabling people to see, discuss and explore both the simdarities and differences between gay and straight people. 
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
