Dear Sir: -

It is with pleasure that I am sending you the enclosed slip and I welcome the opportunity to express my deep appreciation of all that Portland Junior College has done for the Morris family. - Our son, Charles Jr., was raised with the idea of going to college. It was the natural expected thing for him to do. - During his high school course the depression struck & it certainly struck us. The usual college education was a financial impossibility for us to manage & that is where Portland Junior College came in. - By reason of the modest expense, the kindness of Mr. Sommerick at the Y. M. C. A. and the stupendous effort of the entire family Charles Jr. obtained his necessary two year's training to enter Boston University School of Law. Father & Mother Morris have never forgotten

these things and we also feel that the day is soon coming when other parents may find the same situation and we earnestly hope that the college may be open and ready for that emergency.

For your information I will say that Charles Jr. closed his law office and enlisted about two years ago. He was accepted for Officer Candidate School but the quota for Judge Advocate department was filled by the time he had completed his basic training so he transferred to the Signal Corp. and decided to remain in the service. He was stationed in Algeria for some time & then ^{sent} to Italy. - He has just recently been transferred to the Judge Advocate Department. He appears to have some time of his own and being particularly interested in history his letters prove that he is making the most of his location. Thanking you for your interest, we remain,
