

COLBY PROFESSOR VISITS TEMPLE SHALOM TO DISCUSS ISRAEL AND EGYPT



SUNDAY, DECEMBER 7TH

Please join us at Temple Shalom for brunch and a talk on Israel-Egypt relations given by John Turner, associate professor of history at Colby College, **at noon, Sunday, Dec. 7.** Please RSVP with Julie at 786-4201.

Professor Turner's lecture is titled "An Enduring Peace: Egypt-Israel Relations in Historical Perspective." The peace treaty of 1979 between Egypt and Israel is of lasting importance to the Middle East and the world. How was it achieved and why does it endure? Turner will give historical context for understanding the continuing interactions between the two countries, including in this past summer's Gaza conflict.

Associate Professor of History John Turner holds a Ph.D. in Near Eastern Studies from the University of Michigan. His

research focuses on the interaction of political and religious authority in pre-modern Islamic history. He is particularly interested in the categorization and exclusion of heresy and heretics. His book, <u>Inquisition in Early Islam (London, 2013)</u>, seeks to explain the role of the 8th-10th century Caliph and the Caliphate in the definition of what it means to be a Muslim. In addition to his primary field, as a graduate student he studied modern history with a focus on Syria and Iran, where he also studied Arabic (in Damascus) and Persian (in Tehran). His courses range from surveys of the pre-modern and modern periods in the Middle East to country specific courses, and he covers eras from the foundations of Islam to the current day.

Professor Turner's talk is sponsored, in part, by Colby's Jewish studies program through a grant to subsidize talks by Colby faculty on topics that relate to the theme, "Perspectives on Israel."

FROM THE RABBI ...



Hi Everyone.

In my Hebrew School class, the Bar/Bat Mitzvah candidates and I recently discussed the morning blessings in the Siddur. There is a very long list of short blessings, usually recited at our Minyan by Dr. Behzad. I pointed out that the first one thanks God for the rooster! The blessing specifically praises God for endowing the rooster with the ability to distinguish between night and day.


While thanking God for roosters may seem strange, in fact, it is the perfect blessing to start our day. The rooster, or, more commonly nowadays, the alarm clock, is often our enemy. We hate

it, we curse it, we threaten to smash it against the wall (the alarm clock, not the rooster). But the alarm clock is really an important and useful tool. After all, we buy it and carefully set it each night because we know that the alarm clock helps us to successfully navigate the world. It allows us to sleep peacefully secure in the knowledge that it will do its job and wake us in time to get to wherever we need to go. Like school, or work or Minyan. In other words, the alarm clock is useful and annoying at the same time. Or more accurately, the alarm clock is useful precisely because it's annoying.

I asked the kids to write their own blessings thanking God for the things in their life that are simultaneously useful and annoying. Like parents. Or teachers. Or siblings. Or homework. I am asking you to do the same. Thanking God helps us to focus on the useful aspects of alarm clocks, or parents, or siblings, or spouses, or children, or bosses, or plumbers, etc. In other words, we often need to be annoyed in order for us to realize our full potential and it helps if we start our day being grateful for the things, or people, we bring into our life precisely because they are the most annoying. And after we compose our personal blessings thanking God for our spouses and children and parents and siblings, etc, let us resolve to recite them each morning. Then we can be sure to have a day we can crow about.


We will meet at 12:30 p.m. in the shul parking lot where can rearrange ourselves so that we can make the trip in the fewest cars.

Maine Conference for Jewish Life--June 12 to 14, 2015


