Foreign Films

October 28, 1973 "Le Boucher"
Claude Chabrol's suspense thriller, starring Jean Yanne as the butcher and Stephane Audran as the school-mistress, who become involved in a series of bizarre murders. "Le Boucher" rivals the best of Alfred Hitchcock's movies in suspense and in probing the response of people touched by violence. In French, with English subtitles.

December 2, 1973 "Cloë in the Afternoon"
The conclusion of Eric Rohmer's series of "Six Moral Tales," featuring Bernard Verley as Frédéric, a husband in love with his wife. Just as he feels himself nearly smothered by the permanent happiness of marriage and dreams of a life made of first loves, an old friend, Cloë (Zouzou), enters his life, and Frédéric must eventually choose between desire and love. In French, with English subtitles; rated R.

January 20, 1974 "The Sorrow and the Pity"
Marcel Ophuls' award-winning documentary on Vichy France, probing the implications of collaboration with and resistance to the Nazis. Ophuls interweaves newsreels from 1940-44 and interviews with participants nearly thirty years later to create a study of human memory and motivation unsurpassed on film. In French and German, with English translation overdubbed. Shown at 2:00 pm only, due to length (4 hrs, 20 min)

February 17, 1974 "Tiens-Toi Bien Après les Oreilles à Papa"

A Canadian comedy by Giles Richer, directed by Jean Bissonnette, starring Dominique Michel and Yvon Deschamps, in the story of a young girl who challenges the situation she finds in the major businesses in Montreal: in positions of importance, Quebec's French-speaking majority and the English-speaking minority are represented in reverse proportion. Her efforts to change the status quo lead Suzanne into many comic adventures. In French, with some English dialogue.

March 17, 1974 "Tokyo Story"

This gentle film by Yasujiro Ozu follows an aging couple as they travel from their home town to Tokyo to visit their children, who are too busy with their own lives to show their parents any of the city and finally attempt to buy them some pleasure by sending them to a seaside resort. Values of youth and age, city and town, duty and love are all gracefully portrayed. In Japanese, with English subtitles.

April 14, 1974 "Love"

A quiet story of death and renewal, Karoly Makk's "Love" contrasts the richness of images of the past as seen in the memories of an old and dying woman with the grayness of the present as seen through her eyes. But with her death, her strength of spirit passes to her daughter-in-law, bringing regeneration to the present. In Hungarian, with English subtitles.
