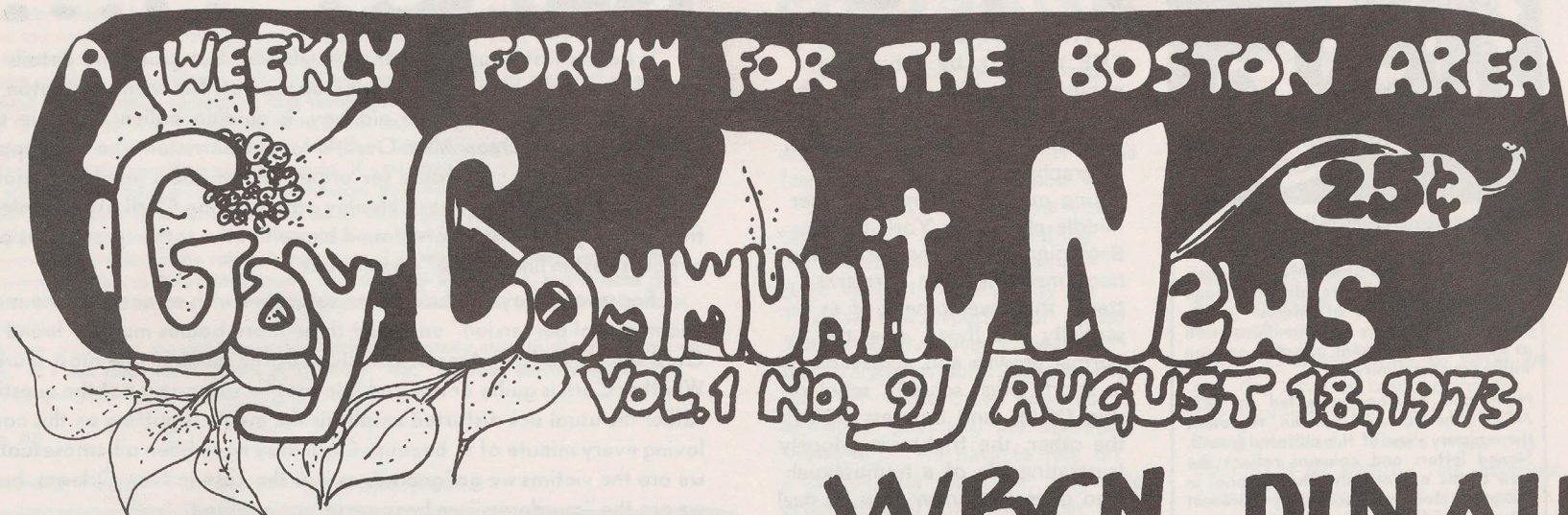


RITA READER RAGES

GAY

At the present time, there is no way of activating the entire gay community at very short notice in any emergency situation. Many individuals in the gay community feel that we must be realistic and be prepared for backlash as gay consciousness achieves extensive publicity, and thus we must be prepared to mobilize at very short notice to defend ourselves politically, legally, or perhaps even physically.

A telephone pyramid is now being formed to fill this need. Once a representative group of community people decide a crisis exists which requires action, a

list of people will be called, who in turn will call a small number of others from a list already in their possession. This process continues until as much of the community as possible has been notified. The numbers will be kept in strict confidence, with no one other than the organizers having the entire list. Individual callers will only have a few names and numbers. Any calls will be discreet, and the information only given to the named individual when the call is made.

Persons interested should write: Pastor Paul Shanley, 128 Tremont St., S. Braintree, Mass. 02184. If you are willing to call several others as well as be called, indicate yourself as a "caller." Forms to sign up others may also be obtained from Fr. Shanley.

WBCN vs. DINAH

In an unusual show of solidarity many groups united in support of Dinah Vaprin, the female announcer who was laid off by WBCN for, as the station explained, economic reasons. Immediately, a group called People United For Free Air Waves was formed to protest this action by the radio management.

In a protest rally on Friday, August 10, around one hundred people picketed the Pru demanding Dinah's reinstatement. About 30 people confronted Al Perry, General Manager and issued the following statement:

The management of WBCN has "laid off" Dinah Vaprin. We as members of the Women's Movement and other community groups around the city, plan to fight her lay-off. The reason management has given - "economic" is bullshit. We know that WBCN has moved to the top of the Prudential which must have a heavy rent to pay. Management, specifically Al Perry, General Manager, and Norm Winer, Program Director, fired Dinah because she was a woman, better, a woman involved with the Women's Movement and who, we are assured, gave the uptight white male management cause to squirm. We see the "laying off" of Dinah Vaprin as "laying off" and denying the existence of large numbers of listeners who saw Dinah and therefore WBCN as a choice and an alternative to the rest of the media. Clearly this is part of a conscious trend at WBCN to make itself more sellable to its advertisers, such as Costa Do Sol, Sangria, and Isabel-Portuguese made wine, and to buyers; and to become just another straight station. We are sick of the sham of the "hip rock radical groovy" FM station. Your air waves no longer sing or speak to us, or for us. We will continue to oppose the "lay-off" of Dinah Vaprin and all your other maneuvers to ignore women and other oppressed groups in the community and around the world. We support any and all

efforts to reinstate Dinah; and we demand that part of her air time be given to a women's show.

In addition to support from various gay groups, Gay Media Action (formerly Gay Media Watch) has sent an official letter of inquiry to the management and the union officials requesting an audience to determine the reasons for the firing.

BULLETIN

In late breaking developments concerning Dinah Vaprin, a WBCN union meeting was held Monday evening and a compromise resolution that the station carry a women's show with Dinah as moderator was made.

The same evening a group of women at the Women's Ctr. have agreed to make a demand to WBCN to hire a woman part-time to do feminist public affairs and specifically suggested Dinah. They also demanded that the station hire another female announcer, although it did not have to be Dinah.

DID YOU SEE?

THE BEST LITTLE BOY IN THE WORLD, by John Reid, published by G.P. Putnam's Sons, New York, 1973.

This recently published autobiography tells the story of a young man (25) from an upper middle class New York family. Beginning with some early childhood memories, the narrative traces the development of essentially two lives: one, the normal growth and achievement in sports (high school), scholarship (Yale), and business (IBM); the other, the frightening, lonely, frustrating life of a homosexual who does not know how to deal with his feelings. How difficult and repressed his life was can be inferred from his experience with Hilda Goldbaum, a charmer at the nearby girl's camp, and his that he was too afraid

(naive?) even to masturbate until his sophomore year at Yale (one of the benefits of an Ivy-League education, no doubt).

Life changes drastically for Reid (a pseudonym) when, because he cannot stand living two lives -- and empty ones at that -- he "comes out" first to one friend and then another, with understanding and real communication as the result; moves to Boston and begins to explore gay life with a vengeance: P'town, Sporter's, The B School and Cambridge. It's all there. He ultimately "comes out" to his parents, who still believe him to be TBLBITW. (title)

Although the book is somewhat superficially written, in terms of characterization, with the result that we feel more empathy with the situations than with the person, it is still important as a personal document, both as a revelation to the straight world of one kind of homosexual experience, and to the gay community as a positive example of coming to terms with one's own identity as a human being and as a gay person.

REACT !!!!!!!

It began last Thursday with the nebulous but gruesome details of sex, torture and perversion and it hasn't stopped yet. The scene is Houston, Texas, and Elmer Henley, a 17-year-old boy, is guiding police to grave sites of alleged victims of Dean Allen Corll, a local electrician who had supposedly been the host of innumerable sex orgies and murders involving adolescent boys over the last three years. Henley admits killing Corll after Henley woke from sniffing paint fumes and found himself in the rather precarious position of being next in line for the "torture rack."

For several days we have been saturated with screams by the media of "homosexual perversion" and "just three more bodies must be found before Corll will go down in American history as the number one mass murderer." Whether Corll is guilty or not and if in fact he was gay is not the question but rather the usual sick distorted emphasis the media is putting on this case and, loving every minute of it, because Corll may have been a homosexual. When we are the victims we go ignored, as was the case in New Orleans, but when we are the "murderers" we become sensationalized.

An extraordinary example is a news item from the Sunday Boston Herald American. On page 13, entitled "Mass Killers Lack Consciences" is a UPI story featuring a Dr. Jerry Brown of a Baylor College of Medicine. This Dr. Brown is quoted as saying, among other things, "The actual murder was part of the syndrome of homosexuality, sexual abuse and eventual homicide, which essentially must be carried out. They all add up—you don't have one without the other."

I am deeply shocked that you can condemn all gay people as unmentionable and diseased and in the same sermon say that Richard Nixon is being judged too hastily. Your haste in judging us without even having the decency to find out who and what we are shows you for the hypocrite that you are. Any man who preaches Christian doctrine and then commences to damn his brothers and sisters has surely lost touch with Christ's teachings.

I personally feel that your sermon was just another venomous by-product of ignorance and bigotry and was more in line with the teachings of the Anti-Christ.

To the Editor:

I was first dismayed and disappointed, and then angered, by the article in the August 11th GCN written by "Rita," a male who uses a woman's name.

To begin with, the presumption of The Man writing as a woman is disgusting. As Robin Morgan says, "We know what's at work when whites wear blackface; the same thing is at work when men wear drag." And the same thing is at work when The Man PRESUMES to write in drag. The Man can only identify with male stereotypes of women. Women have never related to these oppressive myths and have now stopped pretending to. WE ARE DEFINING OURSELVES. The Man's opinions on who we are and where we're coming from are (to put it politely) totally irrelevant.

"Rita's" article perpetuates the tired stereotype of the stupid, empty-headed woman thinking only of her clothes. But far worse, "Rita," The Man, presents the typical macho super-pig delusion that women just can't wait to be "molested." In this patriarchal society, a forcible rape occurs every 14 minutes. Both rapists and, often, police, share the assumption of "Rita" that the victims of these violent political crimes really didn't mind. In many cities, women are acting to stop rape and molestation (and in ways which include, it is said, "extra-legal retaliation"). Boston is one of these cities, and the Rape Crisis Center operates out of the Women's Center, where the GCN is distributed. To my sisters at the Center, I can only say that I was ashamed to find that an article about them and written by me was on the same page as "Rita's" column.

Perhaps The Man in drag is stupid and empty-headed: women are not. Perhaps he thinks of nothing but his wardrobe: few women do. Perhaps he has rape fantasies. I don't know. But women do not. The Man's arrogant assumptions about the nature of women apply only to his own cheap imitations and film-garnered masquerades.

Women -- feminists -- have been looking for allies. We long ago discovered that the Left was an instrument of The Man. We thought that gay men, who are also oppressed by the patriarchal society, would be natural allies. But when a gay man talks, acts, thinks, writes with exactly the same assumptions as a straight man, what is he but the same old oppressor, The Man?

apart from internal strife, differences, or apathy. The need for a feeling of togetherness among gay people is universal, not limited to Boston. As those of us who choose to, disperse across the country we should take this feeling with us. Our problems remain the same wherever we are; there will always be brothers and sisters in need of help in coming out, finding answers to all those questions which we ask ourselves when we start to realize our gayness. The old Gay Scene, as epitomized in the bars and cruising places, is no help. In many cases it can do more harm than good for someone in the very difficult position of coming out. A Gay Community, with a newspaper, and all the diverse services such as are listed in GCN's Quick Gay Guide, just by its existence can mean more to a troubled person than any "professional" help offered by the counseling establishment.

With these words of "wisdom" Hossenpfeffer silently folds its tent and sinks slowly into the sunset. Godspeed.

MEDIA MESSAGE

"Media - that through or by which anything is accomplished, as in the broadcast media (radio and television) or the print media (newspapers and magazines)."

When was the last time you saw, read or heard something completely uncompromisingly good about homosexuality on TV? In newspapers? On radio? You probably haven't, because the straight, establishment media have very little that's good to say about gays and the liberation movement. We have to rely on a few pro-gay reporters, two radio programs and this newspaper for positive news about ourselves. To the majority of Boston media outlets, we just don't exist.

Television is a particular pain. Homosexual appearances on television (usually limited to sleazy antagonists on detective shows or comic relief for Doris Day) have been recently in neutral areas, like news and public affairs. While reports may try to be fair, they are limited by the reporters involved - their knowledge of homosexuality and personal security in his/her sexual identity. Unfortunately, the reports usually fail - witness the WCVB debacle several months ago, "Homosexuals in Boston." Negative reporting is worse than the usual silence; it perpetuates the stereotypes and puts us that much further in the hole.

At the same time, almost every commercial glorifies the nuclear family and the ingrained heterosexual role models. Commercials sell more than products; they sell America on the straight

life. Thus, TV cannot afford to show homosexuals in a positive light. To do so would admit that homosexuality is a valid life-style that's contrary to the economic reality of the medium: in other words, fair representation ain't about to happen.

The name of the game, dear people, is "Mass Communications." The rules are simple - we can all play, but the cards are stacked against the homosexual. GCN can't stop WRKO. In short, our voice is weak and very seldom noticed. What we have to do is make ourselves aware of what we can do, what is being done for fair representation, and what is being planned. That's what this column is all about - fair, accurate, consistent coverage of the homosexual in all local media. It hasn't happened yet, but it must. Until all media recognize and report on our legitimacy as human beings, all our meetings, protests, zaps won't mean shit.

MEDIA NOTES - On a more positive note, there are some solid, meaningful programs about gay life coming up. This Thursday at 9, GAY WAY will feature Andy Kopkind and Littlejohn of WBCN's "Lavender Hour." It's likely the talk will turn to Dinah Vaprin's recent firing from that station. On August 23, GAY WAY will feature State Senator Chet Atkins, a young, liberal legislator favorable to the gay bills. And CATCH 44 will repeat the "Gay Media Watch" program on Friday, August 24 at 8:30PM on Channel 44. The show is a general rap featuring representatives of most Boston gay groups, including Elaine Nobel, Laura McMurray, and Nick Deutsch. Very positive, together, and the only all-gay TV program ever produced in Boston.

MCC Spiritual Renewal Day

On Sunday (12th) the Metropolitan Community Church of Boston celebrated a Spiritual Renewal Day, beginning with a three o'clock hymn sing. Later that afternoon there was a pledging workshop where MCC members discussed finances and possible fund raising activities. MCC held its usual Sunday evening worship service, with 111 persons in attendance. Guest minister was Roy Bircher of New York City Metropolitan Community Church.

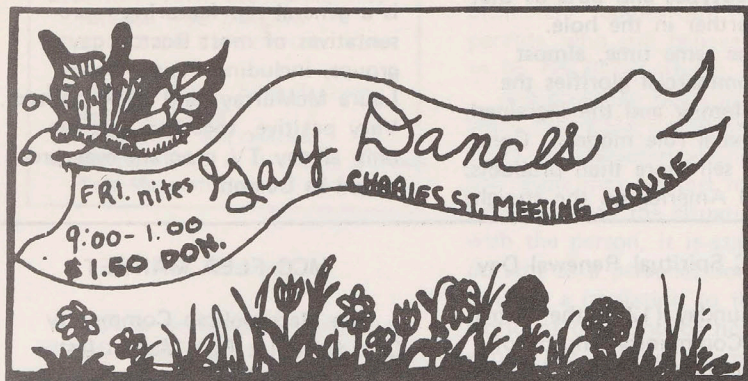
