

On behalf of Unity College I would like to extend a warm welcome to Symposium XX. Diversity has been a theme for programing at Unity this year. The theme for this year's Symposium, "Building Unity, Celebrating Diversity, provides a fitting closure to the school year.

The staff has worked very hard to prepare the campus for your use. You are assured to have a comfortable, safe environment to enjoy the weekend.

There are several guidelines that need to be followed. Dogs are allowed on campus, under the condition that they are on leashes at all times, they are not allowed in the buildings and the owners are responsible for cleaning up after their dogs.

A Touch of History

By 1974 a gay and lesbian organization had formed at that radical New England Campus - the University of Maine at Orono. The small but determined Wilde-Stein Club decided to hold a weekend gathering during spring break in March. Thanks to the loud protestations of Rev. Benjamin Bubar (tax dollars supporting an organization that promotes HOMOSEXUALITY, you know,) word spread to gay men and women all over Maine. Symposium I became front page news. The UMO Trustees stood by Wilde-Stein, campus security was increased, and gay men and lesbians from Maine, New York, Boston, etc. converged on the Maine Campus.

"Natalie" from the National Gay Task Force (as it was called then, and (forgive us, we don't know his name) the man who wrote "The Celluloid Closet" were the Keynote Speakers.

Workshops were held in classrooms, a supper and dance took place at the Parish Hall of the Bangor Unitarian Church (who continue to be supportive throughout all these years.) Those from out of town stayed overnight in the homes of local participants. The occasional hecklers only served to reinforce the pride those first Symposium attendees felt - spirits were soaring high that weekend in 1974. We owe a lot to those torch bearers who led the way - Sturgis Haskell, Sharon Brown, Karen Bye, John Frank and others whose names are gone from our memories. What a legacy they left!!






