## gay conference

Beginning Friday evening Oct. 12th and going through Sunday Oct. 14th, the first Boston Gay Conference will be happening at the Charles St. Meetinghouse, Charles and Mt. Vernon Sts., and Old West Church, 131 Cambridge St., Boston. Many different groups and people working in various aspects of Boston's gay community will be involved in the conference.

The activities on Saturday will be primarily for women. Proceeds from the Saturday night dance featuring the "Whitch" will go to the Homophile Community Health Service. Sunday afternoon will introduce the newcomer to the Boston gay community, its organizations and activities. Representatives from many groups will conduct work shops that cover a wide range of gay life. See complete schedule of times, places and people listed below.

Rick Hamilton, an organizer of the conference, is hoping to attract both gays and straights and plans to get one of these things together quarterly (the next one would be in January) if

## Noble appointed, Frank misquoted

State Representative Barney Frank was misquoted in an article appearing in the Sept. 19th edition of the Boston Globe. The article dealt with the appointment of Elaine Noble to the 40 member Governor's Commission on the Status of Women by Governor Sargent. Frank reportedly referred to Ms. Noble as "an intelligent woman who suffers from particular problems". In a letter to the editor of the Boston Globe, Representative Frank (D-Boston) states that the quote was taken out of context and not clarified. Elaine Noble's "particular problems" are not that she is a woman and a homosexual, but rather the repercussions that she has received as a result of them.

Mr. Frank went on to say that "while all women face unfair discrimination in our society, homosexual women suffer from an intensified form of discrimination" and that "the only problem from which Ms. Noble suffers is a bigoted attitude on the part of far too many people in our society who are unwilling to allow others the right to lead their lives as they see fit. Ms. Noble is admirably equipped to lead the fight against this bigotry, and I congratulate Governor Sargent for his appointment of her." Representative Frank is an advocate of gay rights who has tried to have legislation passed which would cease discrimination on the basis of sexual preference.

## PORNO INDECISION

"Deep Throat plays in New Jersey, Erotikus is cut in Boston, Carnal Knowledge is declared obscene in Atlanta, even Day of the Jackal is struck down in Memphis." This is how HUB member and Esquire Theatre promoter George Mansour described the "absolute mess" resulting from the recent Supreme Court decision on pornography - a decision he described as "no decision at all." By turning censorship over to local authorities, Mansour claimed, speaking before a HUB audience Sunday, the Burger court has made inevitable the recent series of oppressive, probably unconstitutional state laws and local rulings.

Mansour spelled out other implications of this new oppressive atmosphere -- particularly as regards media discrimination against the gay community. The

major Boston papers, he claimed, will accept no gay ads or gay notices. Even film times of the phrase "all male cast" will not be run in either the Globe or the Herald American. Mansour described this situation as exploitative and "frightening."

The Burger decision has also spawned a series of raids on local bookstores and the confiscation of at least one gay film at Esquire's So. Station Cinema. More threatening, in Mansour's view, is the notion that any government, state, local, or federal, has the right to decide what an individual can or cannot see on the screen. Mansour terms the present laws elitist: those wealthy enough to own projectors and obtain libraries of porno prints are protected by the Court's decisions; those who have only the

price of a ticket run afoul of the law. "We are cutting films in Boston," Mansour said, "and we're cutting them heavily" to avoid what he called the "selective enforcement" of the Boston Vice Squad. Both straight and gay porno theatre operators "are playing Russian roulette with what they show."

Mansour himself is now cutting scenes of ejaculation and insertion - though the first-fucking scene from LA Plays Itself will stay in Erotikus, the current So. Station offering.

The discussion concluded with a plea for sexual and personal freedom and the elimination of porno houses entirely. Such freedom, for Mansour, would eliminate the need to "sit in a dark room" and watch our sexual lives acted out by shadows on a screen.

Police Commissioner Robert Di Grazia has stated that he'd like more minority group members on the Boston police force. One of the largest minority groups in the city, the gay community, is without any up-front representatives in the police force. Although gay people could find it compromising to serve the Department in the traditional role (which might include harassing gays, raiding gay movies, etc.) it would be interesting to see positions created for gay people to serve as paid members of the BPD as police community liaisons. Such posts would not be without precedent. In New York City and some of the gay capitals on the West Coast, gay men and women serve the department and their own community very well in such roles. How about it, Commissioner?

## REACTIONS:

To the Editor:

I don't know what's gotten into you, but I think you had better start paying a little more attention to what you're putting into print.

In many ways the GCN has been a good informative and entertaining sheet, but recently some inexcusable blunders have been made. Your latest error appears on the front page of GCN #14 entitled "Crisis Line" in which you inform us that: "The only hot line serving the area's gay community has been the "Gay Crisis Line" at project place."

### WHAT AN INSULT!

When Gay People have been Manning the phones at DOB, MCC, HCHS, and HUB for years. I know for a fact that even before the demise of "Gay Phone" HUB would receive many calls from people who either found "Gay Phone" impossible to contact or were given such poor inaccurate service that they had to call someone else. HUB's phone referral service answers fifty calls a day; some at the wee hours of the morning and we have an experienced staff of phone workers who rap-out problems, collect information, and give out very up-to-date information on groups, activities, schedules, and other vital facts. A lot of your staff and a lot of potentially useful people at GCC seem to be suffering from the sickness that many new comers to a movement suffer from, myself often included. It is a lack of information, facts, and experience.

What this does to the more advanced and informed organizations is cause a lot of injustice.

Please get with it.

HUB and other groups are with you, supporting your progress, happy for your success, but very misenchanted at your false policy. If you think you can be successful on your own and add to the success of the past and present gay movement in Boston, let's see. If, on the other hand, you do need to use some of our facilities, we'd be more than glad to make arrangements; you might be very surprised at what we do offer at 419 Boylston St.

Ed. Note:

1) Gay Community Center Committee (GCC) has absolutely no connection with GCN. 2) "Crisis Line" also has no connection whatsoever with GCN. If you feel that there is no need for this service, it would be most productive to tell them. 3) If HUB as well as the other organizations are offended, we are sorry, and that was certainly not the intent. The problem seems to be in one's conception of a crisis or hot-line. GCN itself receives numerous calls for information, problems, etc., and we try to effectively deal with these or refer them - yet we do not consider ourselves a hot-line, which involves 24 hour service and trained personnel to deal with suicide, drug overdose, etc. This is such a complicated, professional, and time-consuming task that it requires full-time dedication to this specific problem. The fact that it is not being done does not negate the efforts of others to fill the gap. None of these organizations is primarily devoted to this problem, with the exception of HCHS, which at this time cannot offer specific phone counseling except T W Th 1-9 PM. What the organizers of "Crisis Line" decide to do is up to them and those that work with them in planning. Perhaps a consolidation of present services could be attempted, but nonetheless, GCN has nothing to do with it, except covering their efforts as news.



To the editor of Gay Community News:

The Boston Gay Switchboard Task Force, in only a few weeks of existence, has managed to be the object of much confusion and negative feeling, most of it directed erroneously toward GCN. I feel it is time to clarify some issue about the task force for the gay community in general and HUB in particular.

1. What has been popularly referred to as the "crisis line" is the effort of the Task Force.

2. The Task Force has absolutely no official connection with GCN, GCC or Project Place.

3. Robert Dow, president of HUB, attended a Task Force meeting and expressed a willingness to give support to the effort. At that time he made no mention that HUB had any desire to assume the responsibility for such a hotline (meaning a counselling telephone crisis intervention service with referral back-up). An info and referral line such as HUB has cannot be expected to assume a counselling phone function.

4. We of the Task Force feel that to undertake such a project requires the full-time effort of a specific group. The Task Force is interested in assuming the work. To accomplish this end we are interested in seeking the support and energy of individuals.

It is unfortunate that GCN has been caught up in the nest of misinformation.

Also I would like HUB to realize that I was under the impression that the views of a HUB member related to me during a phone conversation were the official views of HUB.

## The View from the Closet

A Sense of Proportion

Near the end of James Hilton's 1933 classic Goodbye Mr. Chips, there is an encounter between the aged former Latin master and a "new boy" at Brookfield School. Chips tells the youngster that he is growing up into "a very cross sort of world," a world the old man had once scorned for its vulgarity, ostentation, "hectic rotten-ripeness" and lack of humor. What was missing from such a world, what Brookfield ought to be teaching, was a sense of proportion.

Those of us born about the time that story was written have undergone, are undergoing, or will shortly undergo the process known variously as the second identity crisis, the "mid-life transition," or (jocularly) the "male menopause". The first identity crisis, swelling in late

adolescence and receding in the mid-twenties, is well known. The second takes us unsuspecting, like a thief in the night. According to a Yale study recently reported in the Globe, we feel that work is a drag life is a drag. Our energies are depleted, our hearts are no longer young and gay. And we ask ourselves what kind of lives we will be leading for the next thirty years.

For the aging gay, this mid-life crisis has a further twist. He may become conscious of it when he makes the simultaneous discovery that (a) if he wants good sex, he has to pay for it and (b) if he has to pay for it, it isn't good sex. On another level, he may look enviously at the young up-front types, and realize he's played it too close too long, and there's now too much to lose and nothing to gain by "coming out." Or else one fine day he passes an

director of the Yale study, speak:

"It is possible to be in better touch with yourself... more genuinely loving. The important thing about making love is not how many times you can make it, but what you can give and receive in the process." A gracefully aging person could become "more fully a father to young adults, a mentor and a peer." Now, Levinson says (and he's speaking to straights but also to us) is the time "to integrate the masculine-feminine polarity that early adulthood was built upon. The traditional image of masculinity is just as oppressive for the man as for the woman."

There's a sense of proportion. That's what we need to struggle toward, as individuals and as a community.

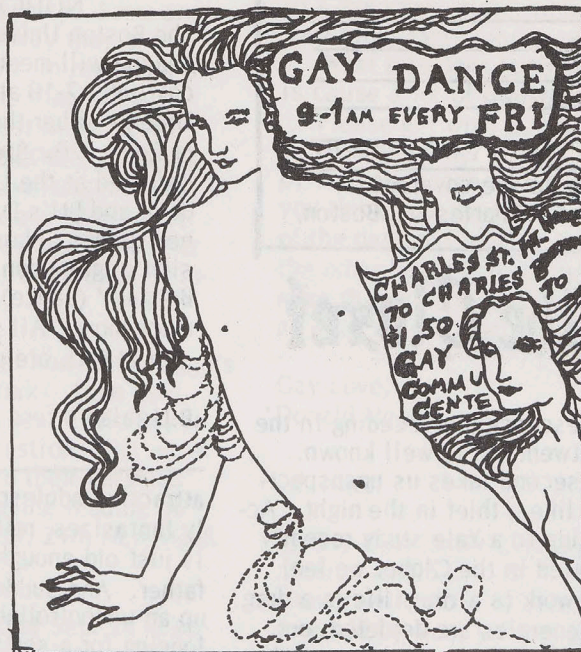
