Coming Out and the New Gay Identity in the Media #108 M.T. Bldg. Victoria Zavasnik. Dialog among participants addressing the topic of coming out as it is happening all around daily, the effect of the news coverage for the gay issue and it's impact on programming such as The Ellen Program. The therapist will act as facilitator and encourage all participants to voice their opinions and experience on how this new gay identity in the media is affecting us personally, professionally, and privately.

Practicing Self Acceptance Day-to-Day, #109 M.T. Bldg. Ann Hastings. Most people have a hard time accepting themselves as being good enough on a consistent basis. The challenge of self acceptance can be even greater for gay and lesbian people, yet the effort of self examination that opens the door to acceptance of self, as well as others, is extremely fulfilling. This workshop will offer a unique approach, arising from channeled teachings, that redefines the meaning of self acceptance, and how it can be integrated into our daily lives.

Outright - Issues for L/G/B/T Youth. Campus Center, 2nd Flr. Boardroom. Being facilitated by a panel of youth from Outright. Listening to queer youth - what it's like today.

Drumming - the Beat Goes On. #105 Hildreth. The workshop welcomes wanna-be drummers of all levels. Bring your drums!! The purpose of the drum circle is to bring us together, in unity, rhythm, and spirit. Several different rhythms will be taught to encourage drummers to explore various influences in drumming. A fun workshop - no experience necessary - dancers welcome! As often happens, the men and women who have attended this workshop gather later for a jam session or evening drumming circle. Come express your rhythms!!

The Transgender Phenomenon. Auditorium, M.T. Ari Kane. The workshop will provide an overview of the world of the transgendered individual. After some general concepts and a brief glossary of terms, we will focus on some of the social, personal and spiritual issues through some fun exercises to heighten gender awareness and experience some of the ecstacy and agony of being a happy transgendered spirit in a gender rigid culture.

Making Community: Gay Parenting in the Nineties. #110 M.T. Bldg. Jo Moser. This workshop is for those considering parenthood and those already parenting. What issues are unique to being gay and what are the challenges we face as parents? How do we create community? How do we integrate parenting with the rest of our lives? How do we educate others (other parents, schools, work place) as gay parents? Come explore these issues in an exciting interactive format.

HIV Disease in 1997 - Communities Still at Risk. Today's workshops will examine issues that affect us differently as lesbians and gay/bisexual men.

AIDS - Lesbians at Risk - Myth or Reality?.

#108 M.T. Bldg. Linda Pfaffinger and Victoria Rash.
Who are we versus what we do. Are we at risk? The different medical concerns of women and other gender-based differences: access to clinical trials; differences in treatment efficacies; the affect of race and socio-economic status, etc.

AIDS - Gay/Bisexual Men - The Epidemic: 16 Years and Counting - Renewing Our Commitment to Ourselves and Our Brothers. Auditorium, M.T. Bldg. Gerry Scoppettuolo. What are the long term effects on the quality of our lives and our relationships? What is the meaning of our sexual behaviors?

Establishing a Legal Relationship Without Marriage. #110 M.T. Bldg. Ann Hastings. This workshop will discuss the various legal mechanisms now available to allow couples who cannot marry to establish the right to make decisions on behalf of each other while they live and to transfer to the surviving partner ownership of property and other rights after the death of one partner. This workshop would be particularly helpful for those couples who have accumulated property together and for those couples who would like to be sure that their roles in relation to each other would not be threatened if one partner were to become disabled.

<u>Living in Rural Areas</u>. #109 M.T. Bldg. Lin Gould. How do we survive it? Let's share strategies for lessening the burden of isolation.

Abuse in Lesbian Relationships. #121 P.S. Bldg. Janie Waterhouse & Aimee DesRoehs. Internalized homophobia - what it is and what it does. Power and control - why people batter - barriers to leaving. Parts of the video, "My Girlfriend Did It", will be shown as time permits.

Bisexuality 101. #128 M.T. Bobbi Keppel and Alan Hamilton, What is bisexuality? What are the myths and what are the facts? A chance to talk about your questions and the meaning of bisexuality in any area of your life.

Self Help for Your Soul: Using the Imagination to Heal Old Wounds. #105 Hildreth Bldg. Patricia Burke. The imagination is a sixth sense that can help us make meaning of our life experience and develop a different relationship to our sometimes painful past. In this workshop Patricia will help participants unleash the unlimited healing potential of the imagination and touch the innermost longing of the soul.

Feel free to take advantage of this great location to kayak, walk along the beach, explore the lighthouse, play volleyball and just relax with friends. The lounges in the Campus Center are available for your use and Black Tie Catering will havecoffee/tea/sparkling water/munchies for sale there on Saturday.

Couples: Issues and Communication. #110 M.T. Bldg. Victoria Zavasnik. There will be a short presentation followed by some group and individual hands on work. The workshop will spotlight one aspect of couple communication -- called couple dialogue. Several steps will be pointed out that couples can use and practice to develop and maintain more direct communication with each other, and developing the skills of empathetic listening and dialoguing. The experiences will be light-hearted but the context can be quite serious.

The Internet - Just Another Resource. Computer Lab. Campus Center. Paul Fortier. While much ballyhooed, the Internet, in many cases, has done for computing what cable did for television. Join me in dispelling some of the myths as we cut through the jargon jungle, and hopefully, find that there can be benefit gained in using the Internet. Basic terminology and access methods will be discussed.

Policing Desire: A Queer Response to Public Sex, Prostitution and Pornography. Auditorium, M.T. Bldg. Wendy Chapkis and Roger Mayo. In recent years, the Portland police department has been energetically "policing desire", by making use of new "anti-cruising" laws and campaigns to entrap men having sex with men in local adult movie theaters. This workshop will consider the role such "social purity crusades" historically have played in efforts to discipline and silence sexual minorities and will discuss possible responses by the gay/lesbian/bisexual/transgendered community against criminalizing consensual adult sexual activity.

Singles - Looking at Love Pain. #108 M.T. Bldg. Carol Jenkins. Have you been stuck in the pain of an old relationship? Has this unhappy memory made it difficult for you to move ahead into a new place? Here is a surprisingly light workshop, designed primarily for singles, to look at the relationships from the past and to finally let go of the pain that might still surround those events. Using the energy releasing properties of Thought Field Therapy, members of the group will be able to recover from the past discomfort with a few simple exercises. This work has been described by those who have experienced it as a "feeling of a warm rush of calmness passing through their body, taking with it the discomfort and pain". Afterwards, it is difficult to remember what the discomfort was like, anyway.

<u>Perspective</u>. #108 M.T. Bldg. Nanci Little. Lesbian author, Nanci Little, will mediate an open forum and offer her perspective on the crafts of writing and editing fiction, and the business of publishing. All writers of correspondence, journals, essays, novels, what have you --published or not-- are welcome to participate.






