


Pets are not allowed in any campus building. Smoking is not allowed in any campus building.

The UMF Health and Fitness Center Features:


Four multipurpose courts

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



When Colorado used that claim in its unseccessful attempt to defend the constitutionality of the anit-gay measure known as Amendment 2, the Court said:

"We find nothing special in the protections Amendment 2 witholds. These are protections taken for granted by most people either because they already have them or do not need them; these are protections against exclusion from an almost limitless number of transactions and endeavors that constitute ordinary civic life in a free society."

Late Bloomers

Randy Browning and Brett Kinney call themselves Late bloomers because they think of their music as a plant – one that's always growing and changing. Their acoustic guitar music is an original combination of styles, including Folk, Blues, Ragtime, Jazz and Bluegrass. They perform instrumentals as well as vocal tunes, and a few covers among the originals.

Keynote Speaker Paul Fuller

He has hiked the Appalachian Trail and The Pacific Crest Trail. This winter he walked 395 miles from Van Buren to Kittery to call attention to the recent Civil Rights Veto referendum. We will hear unique first-hand experiences from Paul's journey the length of Maine.

Naomi Falcone: Rural Organizing - Maine's Final Frontier?

Naomi Falcone and Madeleine Winter live in Standish and have been active in the lesbian and gay community of Maine for the last seven years. For four years they were part of the collective that published APEX. Both are members of the Maine Rural Network organizing committee.

Brian Kaufman: Exploration of Safer Sex Practices for Men Who Have Sex with Men

Brian Kaufman has lived in rural Maine since moving here by way of New York City and Norfolk, Virginia seven years ago. He has a doctoral degree in Industrial/Organizational Psychology, and is an OUT and tenured professor of psychology at the University of Maine at Farmington. He has conducted research on employment discrimination as a function of sexual identity, and offered UMF's first course in LGBT issues. Brian has been a board member of MLGPA for several years and has worked with the Maine AIDS Alliance, ACT UP/Maine, Equal Protection Lewiston, Maine Won't Discriminate, The AIDS Project, Advocates for Equality in Family Benefits, the Q-Squad Support Group at UMF, and the AIDS Coalition of Lewiston/Auburn.

Richard Steinman: LGBT Age Across the Lifespan

Richard Steinman came out to the world at age 48 (24 years ago). Parent of 4 children (one, a lesbian). At USM, teach social gerontology and in 1978 created the first LGBT studies course north of Boston. Research: (1) LGB's coming out to straights in Norway, England, Scotland, Ireland, USA; (2) dynamics of gay men's age-divergent relationships. For Boston's Gay Community News; (1) in 1979 observed and reported the trial of Charlie Howard's murderers; (2) in 1988 in Poland, attended and reported the 2nd Eastern European International LG Conference.

Ernie Guimond: Strategies for Coming Out

Ernie Guimond is an out teacher at John Bapst Memorial High School in Bangor. His recent reminders to the world were in the pharmacy when the clerk asked if he wanted some free flowers for his wife and at school when the new secretary asked if his wife was coming to the spring concert. Can you believe nobody told her?

Jean Vermette: Trans-Personal Workshop

Jean is a male-to-female transsexual, active in political and social issues, and the founding director of the Maine Gender Resource and Support Service.

Penny White and Rev. Bill Gordon: Religion in the Community

Penny White is a Deacon with Northern Lights Metropolitan Church in Augusta. She will co-facilitate with Rev. Bill Gordon, the church's Minister.

Mitzi Lichtman: Social Strategies for Singles

Mitzi has been a political and social activist in Maine for 21 years. Originally from the Bronx, New York, she is one of the most eligible activists around.

David Fisher and Paul Alpert: Gays Families with Kids

David has two grown children and two grandchildren. Paul has three married children and is awaiting the arrival of the seventh grandchild. Partners for seven years, the pair have lots of experience with children and grandchildren.

Vickey Zavasnik: Long Term Relationships

Vickey has practiced psychotherapy in Maine for 23 years and has been president of the Rainbow Business and Professional Association. She practices traditional psychotherapy with gestalt and systems perspectives and conducts corporate therapy for family and small businesses. She has taught courses in perspectives on chemical dependency.

Jonathan Lee: The Maine Speak Out Project

Jonathan is the executive director of the Maine Speak Out Project, working to create acceptance of differences among Maine's people.

Susan Farnsworth: Defusing Special Rights / Fighting Job Discrimination

Susan is a community activist, attorney and former Legislator.

Marta Varee Pearson: Race and Ethnicity Issues


Marta is a professional speaker and trainer and for 14 years has been atrauma recovery specialist in the treatment of adults violated sexually as children.
