FROM THE RABBI



A story from the Jerusalem Post, July 12th, 2019: It is not unusual for a wedding to leave many of the guests in tears. However, a wedding in Israel last week did not leave a dry eye in the house for a very special reason. Muawiya Kabha, a Muslim paramedic in a response unit of United Hatzalah, made a special appearance at the wedding of Shahar Kugelmas and Nir David, and recounted to the guests present how in April 2009, he had arrived at the scene of a car crash to find Shahar dead. The car that Shahar was a passenger in had crashed into

a tree.

"When I arrived there after two minutes, the doctor told me 'this injured girl, don't touch her. I have already declared her dead. Let's treat the driver," Kabha recalled through the microphone. "I told him okay you treat the driver and I stayed treating Shahar. When I got to Shahar, she was in cardiac arrest. And per protocol, the doctor was right, we needed to declare the death. But what I felt from above is that I still need to try and save her," Kabha said to applause from the wedding guests.

Kabha explained how he continued CPR on Shahar for about 40 minutes whilst she was still stuck in the car before accompanying her on the way to the hospital. "We continued CPR on the way to the hospital and at the entrance to the hospital she had a heartbeat. Her heart started to beat. I want to tell you that when I returned home that night, I didn't have any hope," Kabha recalled. "I put my head on the pillow and thought the Angel of Death had beaten me. But at least I knew that I did everything I could to try and save her. In the end, I must have done what I needed to do, because look, Shahar is with us."

Kabha concluded: "Because I saved your body, you saved my soul. Thank you, thank you. Mazal Tov. I love you both."

As much as I want it too, I know that this story has nothing to tell us about politics or the conflict. But it has a lot to tell us about humanity. That this Muslim paramedic serves in a volunteer ambulance service operated by (and mostly for) observant Jews. His unbelievable dedication to saving the life of someone from "the other side." That he became an honored guest at a Jewish wedding. That divine inspiration finds all humans and motivates the most extraordinary behavior. How guilty we should feel when we demonize based on stereotype. And of course, the infinite power of love.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



Twice now, I have been present as people have chosen to be Jewish and taken the final steps in conversion.

The second time was this evening, July 21 at our cottage on Taylor Pond. The weather was perfect as three people made the choice to become Jews...the choice to be a part of our Community...the choice to be part of a People that stretches back over 5000 years.

Of the three who converted today, each may have begun

their individual journey to join our people for different reasons, but each came to love the Jewish religion...what it means and what it represents. Each converted for the right reasons. Each converted because, in their hearts, they feel Jewish. Each wants to be part of this 5000 year history that continues to bring meaning to so many.

In many cases, one who converts knows more about Judaism than one born into our faith, much like a new American citizen, at times, knows more about our American history than one born here.

At times, those born Jewish, again like Americans born here, take what we have, our traditions, our sense of community, for Americans, our freedom, our free speech, for granted. Yet, those who convert can treasure and enjoy the feelings of being Jewish differently and, often with a greater sense of appreciation.

Does this stem from how we often value something we worked for more than something we were given? Is this because we tend to value something that is new to us more than the things we have had for a long time? Do those of us, born Jewish, take our Judaism for granted? Do we not know the value of what we have?


I think, at times, we may take it for granted. However, we are reminded, again and again, of who we are as a People. Each of us may have a different trigger that reminds us...maybe it is going to services on Shabbat or Thursday morning minyan or a holiday or even just eating a Jewish food. For others, it may be a Jewish tragedy that reminds us of the People we are and that we are one People...that our religion and our traditions mean something.

Whether you chose Judaism or were born Jewish, think of ways that you can be a little more Jewish. Think of ways to remind yourself of why you are Jewish. Think of ways to be Jewish. And most importantly, think of what being Jewish means to *you*.

"Joseph, a literature student at Berkeley, is the son of a Jewish mother and a Muslim father. One day, a mysterious package arrives on his doorstep, pulling him into a mesmerizing adventure to uncover the tangled history that binds the two sides of his family. For generations, the men of the al-Raqb family have served as watchmen of the storied Ibn Ezra Synagogue in Old Cairo, built at the site where the infant Moses was taken from the Nile. Joseph learns of his ancestor Ali, a Muslim orphan who nearly a thousand years earlier was entrusted as the first watchman of the synagogue and became enchanted by its legendary perhaps magical—Ezra Scroll. The story of Joseph's family is entwined with that of the British twin sisters Agnes and Margaret, who in 1897 depart their hallowed Cambridge halls on a mission to rescue sacred texts that have begun to disappear from the synagogue.

The Last Watchman of Old Cairo is a moving page-turner of a novel from acclaimed storyteller Michael David Lukas. This tightly woven multigenerational tale illuminates the tensions that have torn communities apart and the unlikely forces—potent magic, forbidden love—that boldly attempt to bridge that divide."
