FROM THE RABBI...



Hi Everyone.

Why do we do the things we do? Or, why do Jews do the things that Jews do? Of course, there are specific answers to the question of why we observe particular rituals—some more compelling than others. But is there a big answer? One that encompasses all of our rituals?

For me, that answer has always been Purim. While our Shabbat and Holiday rituals include much joyous celebration, Purim takes joy to a whole new level. Let's call it "Extreme Joy!" While most other Jewish celebrations encourage the drinking of a glass—or four—of wine, only on Purim are we actually instructed to get

plastered! Really! (This is according to the Talmud, and only during the festive meal). On Shabbat and other Holidays, we dress in finery but on Purim we dress for fun! Most of our Synagogue services encourage respectful restraint even while we sing and dance; on Purim, we are told to bring loud noisemakers to the service! While charity is a year-round Jewish obligation, only on Purim are we taught to give freely and generously to ALL who ask!

The days wherein the Jews had rest from their enemies, and the month which was turned unto them from sorrow to gladness, and from mourning into celebration; that they should make them days of feasting and gladness, and of sending portions one to another, and gifts to the poor. Book of Esther, 9:22.

While we obviously cannot sustain the extreme joy of Purim for more than a day or so, the idea is for Simchat Purim—Purim Joy—to inform and infect everything that we do Jewishly for the rest of the year.

Show me a joyless Jewish community and I will show you a community that ignores Purim (or considers it a holiday only for kids). Conversely, communities that embrace Purim with enthusiasm, I mean, really do Purim justice, are filled with joy—every day of the year.

So how can we make sure that we are a joy-filled community? Make Purim a priority! Be sure to be a part of our Temple's Purim celebration! Make noise, lots of noise! There is no better way to show the young people in our lives that Jewish practice is joyous than letting them see us old folks making crazy noises, wearing silly masks or costumes and singing at the top of our lungs. Be part of our Mishloach Manot swap—bring a basket filled with treats and take a different one home (please be sure to include your name with your basket).

Extreme Joy isn't easy. Extreme Joy can be exhausting. Extreme Joy asks us to let go of our inhibitions and pretenses. But it's the best way to imbue our lives and the lives of future generation with the true joy that comes with living a Jewish life.

May we always embrace the joy in our rituals and practices.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



At Temple today, Feb 19, 2017, we had a speaker, Bernard Fishman. He is the director of the Maine State Museum. He gave a talk and showed 3D pictures of mostly Jewish life in Europe and the mid-east from 1860-1910. His talk made me think once again of what it took for our recent ancestors to come to this country.

My grandmother, May Tetenman, for instance, left Russia at about 14 years old, in about 1918. She made a four-year journey to America. She left shortly after a pogrom. One that killed hundreds of Jews. She came for life. She came for a better life for her and her children. However she, as many of our parents, grandparents and great grandparents, left everything behind. They left family behind. They left friends behind. They left their homes behind. They left life, as they knew it, behind. All of this to come to America. To come to an unknown land. To come and learn a new language. To learn new customs. To make a new life. But really to come to the land of opportunity.

How hard must it have been? Remember, phones were in their infancy at that time. The internet was not even science fiction. To communicate with the old country, would have meant writing letters that could take weeks or months. Once arriving in this country, there was no going back. Each person figured a way to make a life in America. Each figured a way to make a living in America. Most figured how to remain a Jew in America.

I have such respect for those who made the journey. Would I, or any of us, have been strong enough and brave enough to leave everything, everything we knew, behind and go to the New World? To the unknown? Think for a moment. Think how hard this must have been. If we did not have modern communications, would you, could you, just pick up and journey, with the wish, hope, dream of a better life, to an unknown land?

I am so grateful to be an American Jew. Grateful, thankful and appreciative that May Fischer and Abe Tetenman made the journey, had the bravery, had the chutzpah, to leave the only lives they ever knew, to come to America, to make a better life for all of us.

I know some of the history of my family, but over the next couple of months, I will sit down and film my mother telling our family's story. We'll ask questions and see where the conversation goes. I'm sure I will learn many new things about my family, how we came to America and maybe a little more of what it took to leave home for a new land and new hope.

I encourage each of you, to sit down with your children or your parents and learn your family's story. Don't let your personal history be lost to time.

Love and Treasure by Ayelet Waldman was the book we discussed on February 20. Present were Melissa Johnson, Bertha Bodenheimer, Adele Silverman, Helene Perry, Judy Abromson and me, Lesli Weiner. The group was small as it was rescheduled because of snow the previous week. We would definitely recommend this novel that was based on the infamous Hungarian "gold train" of World War II. The story revolves around an American soldier in charge of cataloging and safekeeping the possessions the Nazis had stolen from Hungarian Jews who had been shipped off to concentration camps, the Hungarian survivor he fell in love with, and a piece of jewelry that haunted him until his dying day. And if that doesn't intrigue you enough, I will send out one more hook: there's even a Maine connection.

Waldman was born in Israel, and so was our next Palestinian author, Sayed Kashua. He made a name for himself as a journalist addressing the problems faced by Arabs in Israel, using a humorous, tongue-in-cheek style. This carried over into his very popular satirical sitcom called *Arab Labor*. His first novel, *Dancing Arabs*, has been made into a movie, and a film adaptation of his second novel, *Let It Be Morning*, is slated to begin production early this year. However, since he writes about racism and ignorance on both sides of the ethnic divide, the Arab world grew increasingly hostile to his jabs at their life, and Kashua felt unsafe living in Israel anymore. He teaches in Chicago where he lives with his family since 2014.

We are reading Kashua's third novel, *Second Person Singular* which "follows two men, a successful Arab criminal attorney and a social worker-turned-artist, whose lives intersect under the most curious of circumstances. The lawyer has a thriving practice in the Jewish part of Jerusalem, a large house, a Mercedes, speaks both Arabic and Hebrew, and is in love with his wife and two young children. In an effort to uphold his image as a sophisticated Israeli Arab, he often makes weekly visits to a local bookstore to pick up popular novels. On one fateful evening, he decides to buy a used copy of Tolstoy's *The Kreutzer Sonata*, a book his wife once recommended." This innocent purchase evolves into "a gripping tale of love and betrayal, honesty and artifice, which asks whether it is possible to truly reinvent ourselves, to shed our old skin and start anew." "*Second Person Singular* is a deliciously complex psychological mystery and a searing dissection of the individuals that comprise a divided society."

Pick up your copy at the library or order it on Kindle. Then join us in the discussion on MONDAY, MARCH 13 at 4 PM. We will also be choosing our next group of books, so bring your suggestions with synopses and reviews. Please be sure they are readily available in the Maine Library system. See you then.....lesli

PAUL GOODMAN CHANGED MY LIFE

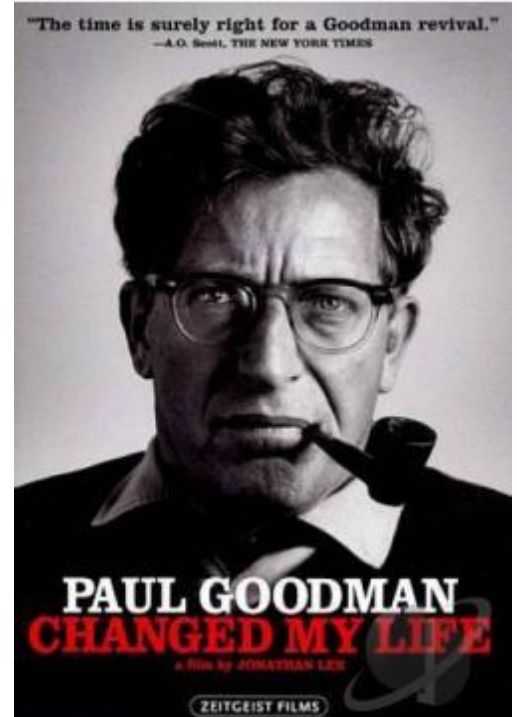

This 89 minute documentary will be presented by its
director/producer
(and Auburn, Maine native), Jonathan Lee,
who will also lead a discussion following the movie.

Paul Goodman was a major figure in modern American art culture. Author of legendary bestseller *Growing Up Absurd* (1960), Goodman was also a poet, 1940s out queer (and family man), pacifist, visionary, co-founder of Gestalt therapy—and a moral compass for many in the burgeoning counterculture of the '60s.

Paul Goodman Changed My Life immerses you in an era of high intellect (that heady, cocktail-glass juncture that *Mad Men* has so effectively exploited) when New York was peaking culturally and artistically; when ideas, and the people who propounded them, seemed to punch in at a higher weight class than they do now. Using a treasure trove of archival multimedia—selections from Goodman's poetry (read by Garrison Keillor and Edmund White); quotes from Susan Sontag, Martin Luther King, Jr. and Noam Chomsky; plentiful footage of Goodman himself; plus interviews with his family, peers and activists—director/producer Jonathan Lee and producer/editor Kimberly Reed (*Prodigal Sons*) have woven together a rich portrait of an intellectual heavyweight whose ideas are long overdue for rediscovery.
