# FROM THE RABBI...



Hi Everyone.

This month we get to celebrate Lag BaOmer!

Imagine a young boy in an Old-Country cheder (one-room Hebrew school), expected to sit and study from morning to night, six days a week, with the only break being Shabbes— where you get to spend most of the day in shul. Or, a young boy in a Yeshiva (many-roomed Hebrew school) in Queens, NY (me), expected to sit and study from morning to night, six

days a week, with the only break being Shabbes—where you get to spend most of the day in shul. (Full disclosure: we were released early on Friday so we had at least a couple of hours to ride our bikes, etc.).

But one day of the school year, hopefully a nice day, in May, cheder and yeshiva children got to close our religious books and play—outdoors! In a park! Where we got to see our Rebbes play softball!

That was Lag BaOmer. A day whose significance we barely understood but looked forward to the entire year. As I grew older, I became aware of other Lag BaOmer celebrations, most notably, around the gravesite of the Talmudic sage, Shimon Bar Yochai, considered to be the father of all Kabbalistic teaching. In Meron, an ancient Israeli town in the Galilee, thousands upon thousands of Hasidic, Yeshiva, and other Jewish men and women annually gather around huge bonfires, and the singing and dancing—and drinking—goes on all night. Additionally, old-country and modern Israeli children customarily shoot at each other with (toy) bows and arrows.

Although, the origins of this Holiday are somewhat obscure and confusing, the message is consistent. Disunity brings destruction—specifically, the Roman exile and destruction of the Second Temple in Jerusalem. Lag BaOmer comes, therefore, to promote unity. For Cheder and Yeshiva kids, unity is fostered through the playing of outdoor games. For lucky Israelis, by dancing in Meron. And for us, by bonding as a community around our very own bonfire, singing, drumming and storytelling—on Thursday, May 26 at 5:30. Don't miss this very special—outdoor—happening.

May we bask in the glow of a holy Lag Ba'Omer fire for many years to come.

Some exciting news: Our Rebbetzin, Lisa Mayer, has agreed to lead the discussion for our next



book. It's titled ReVisions: Seeing Torah Through a Feminist Lens by Rabbi Elyse Goldstein. But I want to make one thing perfectly clear: Book Group is not just for women! All our members are welcome to participate, and I hope you will.

We decided to read this book even though it was not readily available in the Maine library system. Amazon has it for your kindle, or

you can order it used for as low as \$0.01 (plus (\$3.99 shipping). So order your book NOW so you'll have time to read it before our next meeting, which is MONDAY, MAY 9 at 4 PM.

This is how author Rabbi Goldstein explains what she means by 'ReVisions':

"I use the title *ReVisions* for this book because I want readers both to revise—in the classic definition of reexamine and alter—and to see the text anew, to have a new vision, a 'revision,' of Torah.... It begins with the notion that women see the text differently than men do, ask different questions and bring different answers.... This book is not about rewriting the Torah. It is about rereading it." Rabbi Elyse Goldstein—woman, rabbi, scholar, and feminist—challenges and defends, rereads and reinterprets the ancient text, revealing to modern readers a way to see Judaism anew, for a new vision—a "revision"—of the Torah. Goldstein boldly brings the Torah into a contemporary context at the same time she honestly reconciles its past.

You may notice that I am writing this article backwards, with our next book first, because I am so excited about having Lisa join us. But I do want to tell you about the book we read for April because we are recommending you read it. *The Marriage of Opposites* by Alice Hoffman is a beautifully atmospheric work of historical fiction set in the 19th century on the tropical island of St. Thomas where the reader learns about the life of Rachel Pomie, who later becomes known as the mother of the famous painter Camille Pissarro, a father of Impressionism. There were so many topics to discuss including religion, race, class, forbidden love, family, and of course, marriage. The mystical world of the island juxtaposes with the Jewish traditions of Paris. I dare not give away any more as I know you are going to want to read this one!
