Hon. Louis P. Gagne, Mayor, City of Lewiston, Maine.

Dear Sir:

Your attention is hereby directed to a complaint registered with this organization concerning the pregram of World War II dead reburial as set-up by the Mayor, City of Lewiston.

Marcel V. Fortin, an employee in the Dye House section, Pepperel Division, Lewiston, was penalized with loss of pay for attending the funeral of T/3 Joseph L.F. Leblanc, recently returned to this city for reburial under the War Department's plan.

Inasmuchas, all other employers have wholeheartedly cooperated with the Mayor's plan it is,
indeed, distressing to learn that other members of
our World War II Burial Detachment employed at the
above plant have also experienced opposition and a
general uncooperative spirit as concerns their being
able to assist in giving proper military rites to our
returning here dead. Naturally, these men do not wish
to have their names divulged for obvious reasons which
might cause them further repercussions where they work.

It is the belief that higher officials of Pepperel would see that all means are taken for highest respect for Lewiston's war dead. However, there seems to be a snag down lower in the line, either caused by prejudice or misunderstanding which has caused the situation.

I can give you my fullest assurance that Pepperel has not been overburdened and may I inform you that several other employers, much smaller and far less able financhally, are foregoing much more inconvienience to keep faith with those who died. I am certain that a tactful approach by you would immediately remedy the condition.
