RE: "SOCIALIZING" vs "BEING SOCIAL"

I am rather new to the area and have been one of those legendary "Lurkers", reading the newsletter but not really participating. Here's why:

I think all of us have a certain amount of apprehension about meeting new people. And, like anybody new to an area, I embody the usual qualms: "Will I fit in?" "How do I break the ice?" "Will people think I 'm a total numbskull?" and the ever present self doubt about my own ability to jump into a pool of people who all know each other and share a history. Not knowing the background of the other members of a group, it's impossible NOT to say or do something that someone might take as silly, naive or plain ignorant.

In addition, my tenure in Maine has taught me MOST (again, most, not all) Mainers are a bit standoffish when it comes to those from 'away'. Many a time I have found myself in social situations where a native Mainer turns to me and says, "Oh. You're from away". When I nod, the other person says something like, "Oh." Then, the conversation drops. When I have brazenly walked up to total strangers and started a conversation, I get the "Who are you? Some kind of freak?" look - which of course makes me feel like some kind of leach.

I've wanted to attend groups or get-togethers, but in my mind I see them as social functions of intense intimacy where I'm going to be crashing someone else's party. A situation brought upon myself? Probably. Realist? Totally.

So here's an idea I propose: a 'buddy' system. It's a simple idea, really, and not mine. I borrow this concept from a theatre group I joined in Sacramento. In that troupe, whenever a new actor was brought into the fold, one (or more) people took on the task of going with the 'newbie' to a party / coffee clutch / dinner and introducing the person around. It was a good way to start conversation, letting the established members of the group get to know the new kid while helping everyone avoid that awkwardness that often comes with meeting a new person.

I am thrilled to be a part of the community here and am excited to see such a close knit GLBT group. I would love to become more involved, meet more people and establish myself in my new neighborhood. But, quite frankly, I feel intimidated and self conscious because it seems so difficult for a transplant to meet the community without looking like some kind of psycho.

It was a lot of fun and usually corresponded with the change in the season or a big event. It was not very expensive to do this, but it was time consuming and required work cleaning up after the event. Hours were spent trying to get the stains out of the rug after the drunken boss (or whoever) spilled their drinks. Then there was the wife of the guy who wanted to liven up her rather dull

WHAT IS "FAMILY AFFAIRS" ?

CAN I ORGANIZE AN ACTIVITY THAT DOESN'T INCLUDE "EVERYONE"?

If you want to organize a "women only" camping trip, a "men only" drumming night, a "youth from age 18-24 only" dance, or a day trip to a water park for GLBTI "couples with children", that would be fine.

CAVEATS:

All newsletters are emailed BCC, and the email list is not given out to anyone. Still, keep in mind that while this newsletter is for the GLBTI community, not everyone on the mailing list may be a "family" member. People ask to be put on the list and I put them on. There is no interview process or attempt to verify "queer" status. It's up to you to behave appropriately for whatever level of anonymity/security you feel you need.
