RURAL PRIDE

The result of the most recent FAN poll: why do you (or why do you not) attend the PRIDE events in the Bangor area? was very interesting! I got a response rate of about 12% of the readership, which may seem low, but which for <u>anyone's</u> poll is actually quite good. In my naivety, I thought there would be a simple answer to the question. Instead, there was LOTS of complexity and multiple-reasoning ... too much complexity to really state it simply. So here is *my* analysis of things, and I will concentrate only on the reasons folks gave for <u>not</u> attending since those made up the vast majority of responses. Those reasons seemed to fall into four broad categories, with some inter-connectedness between them.

The smallest category I'll call: "logistical problems of folks attending". In this category were all the folks who had to work when events were happening, who couldn't get to events for lack of transport, who simply had other things already planned during

PRIDE week, or who thought it was too far to travel to Bangor.

The next most frequently cited category I'll call: "troubles with Northern Maine PRIDE". A few of the complaints here said that NMP was poorly organized, but most of the complaints in this category said simply that there was not enough advertising ... that folks simply didn't know what, where, or when things were going on. The FAN was not enough, they thought. They wanted to see detailed ads in the papers, hear detailed ads on the radio, and see fliers and posters ... and lots of them.

The second largest category is what I'll call: "homophobia and non-acceptance". In this category are all the folks who either felt that Bangor was an unfriendly and unaccepting place for GLBT people and/or who felt that Portland was more friendly and accepting. Most folks in this category (even some of those who professed to be "out") were fearful, to at least some degree, of publicly presenting their queer status. Some folks mentioned internalized-homophobia in the local GLBT community and a perceived lack of acceptance of the diversity within the GLBT community. There was also a perception that straight allies were not appreciated and welcomed.

The largest category I'll call: "it doesn't meet my needs." In this category were all the folks who (mostly based on attending past Northern Maine PRIDE events) felt the events would be unappealing because of low attendance, who felt the events would not be "entertaining" enough, who wanted to meet new people, who felt that those people who did show up were unfriendly, or who thought the whole PRIDE thing had become too political. All these folks either stated that Bangor did not have enough appeal or that Portland had more appeal.

I realize that as you read this you haven't seen the actual responses, so you can't have a feel for all the nuances contained in them; but can we gather anything from all of this? Well, after some thought, this is what I gather: that being an "out and proud" rural GLBT person is fundamentally different from being an "out and proud" urban GLBT person.

First of all, it seems clear that being "out" is a relative thing. Most folks who consider themselves "out" are usually not actually out to everyone. Their parents or family may not know, they may be out to everyone except their co-workers, or they may even be openly sharing a house and a life with a same-sex partner and yet never utter the words "I am gay" or "I am lesbian" to any of their straight friends. Even those folks who claim to be completely out (myself included), still usually don't introduce themselves to strangers by saying: "Hi, I'm Paul, and I'm gay."

Being "proud" is also relative. Some GLBT folks may think that they have more pride than others because they walk in a large, public parade and carry a sign once each year announcing to the world what their sexual orientation is. But who will argue that that action, done in the safety of large numbers and in a place where one can afterwards melt anonymously back into the population of the city, is more proud than the individuals or same-sex couples who quietly (but authentically and openly) live their GLBT lives 365 days a year in Maine's many small towns, where everyone knows them and knows where they are?

I think the word "anonymity" here is very important and meaningful because *my* perception is that what <u>generally</u> makes the big city more accepting of most minorities, including the GLBT community, is the very real sense of anonymity that a large population provides. In most instances, even if you are completely out to all your friends, neighbors, and co-workers in a city, you are still anonymous to the rest of the city's population, including those city folks (and we know they exist) who are homophobic and non-accepting of GLBT individuals. Remember, "out" is a relative thing. Even those city-dwellers who are completely out to their circle of 100 or 200 or even 300 friends, seldom purchase a full-page ad in the city newspaper with their photo, name, and address announcing "I AM GAY" or "I AM LESBIAN".

Is that generalization absolute? Of course not. There are still GLBT individuals in the cities who get themselves into trouble, and we read about them in the newspapers. And there are also the well-known GLBT "celebrities" whose money (in many cases) allows them to provide themselves with substitute safety buffers when the buffer of anonymity falls aside.

Being a rural, small-town person, on the other hand, is a little like living on a submarine. You live in a small area where everyone knows you and everyone knows where you are, and it's not unusual for everyone to know a variety of details about your personal life. I don't think I know any rural, small-town people (of <u>any</u> persuasion) who live rural lives because they have to ... they live where they live because they <u>want</u> to. Like all the sailors who sign-on to live on a submarine, rural folks know that certain adjustments and allowances and protocols have to be made so that everyone can get along together and so that the crew doesn't go stir-crazy. Even if you hate guns and snowmobiles, you allow your neighbors to hunt once-a-year on your property (as long as they do it safely) and you allow them to run their sleds on your land (as long as they stay within certain boundaries). Your neighbors do the same for you. Your born-again Christian neighbor will probably still accept a jump-start from GLBT-you when it's 20-below and he (or she) can't get the car started. And you'll probably still accept the same from them.

Every rural, small-town person (and that includes GLBT persons) needs to "accommodate" in some ways. Those ways will vary from town to town, and each local GLBT person should have a feel for what the local needs are; but if someone is really a part of their community (and not just a misanthrope hiding out in the woods), then those local protocols will usually allow you to lead your GLBT life in an authentic, out, and proud manner.

Would it be out and proud the way the <u>city</u> thinks is out and proud? Of course not, and I believe *that's* where we really have the seat of our problem. Someone somewhere (probably in a city) decided that <u>everyone's</u> PRIDE celebration should look basically

the same, and that everyone should be "out" in the same way. But the city version of PRIDE is simply not going to work in rural areas. Asking rural, small-town folks to produce a "city" PRIDE would be akin to asking American Jews to show their patriotism by celebrating Christmas. What we rural folks haven't realized is that we need something different because our experience of PRIDE is something different. We've just been trying to copy Portland, or Boston, or New York, and then we can't understand why no one shows up ... or why many who do show up end up feeling uncomfortable about the whole thing. I don't think it's who we are. I think we need something completely different, something crafted to our needs, and something which takes into account the "accommodations" that we, as rural people (who just happen to be GLBT) are familiar and comfortable with.

Those are *my* thoughts anyway, now how about some feedback. Am I on the mark, or am I just plain crazy? What do you think? Send me your responses and I'll put them all in the next FAN.

And if you want to see what everyone actually said in response to the poll, email me and ask for a copy of the responses. I've removed all personally-identifying info from them, so you won't know who said what, but you can still see for yourself what was said.

There is no interview process or attempt to verify "queer" status. It's up to you to behave appropriately for whatever level of anonymity/security you feel you need.
