3. CIVIL RIGHTS: A Changing Debate: Human Rights Campaign, the nation's largest gay civil rights group, announced the first-ever televised presidential forum devoted solely to issues concerning lesbian/gay/bisexual/transgender Americans, to be aired on Aug. 9 on the Logo network. All presidential candidates were invited. "Hillary Clinton, Barack Obama, John Edwards and Christopher Dodd have agreed to participate in the forum, with questions to be posed by a panel that includes singer Melissa Etheridge and Joe Solmonese, president of the Human Rights Campaign."

4. Partners in Prevention. Partners in Prevention is a class for gay men that discusses health issues related to HIV and STD's. A simple curriculum for all ages that focuses on the many definitions of what a relationship is, how to maintain a healthy relationship and ways to protect yourself from unhealthy relationships. The class discusses personal triggers that we all have which "trigger us" to make unhealthy decisions.

The Partners in Prevention class will be offered again in August. This class offers an incentive of \$150 to each member who attends all three sessions. Your responses to my thoughts about the most recent FAN poll.

Your responses were almost non-existent! While over 60 people responded to the poll itself, only 9 responded to my request for feedback about the poll analysis. Why so few? I can't explain it ... and you know what ... I'm not going to try. I can only take what I'm given, no second-guessing, no hard feelings, and no regrets. Of the 9 folks who answered, 4 pretty much responded to the original poll question, 4 agreed with the analysis, and one person agreed in part and disagreed in part. Several of the responses to the original poll question were quite lengthy, so I don't have room to reprint them completely here; but I will put them into the file with the original poll responses. Anyone who would like to see them is still welcome to request a copy of those responses (with names and other identifiers removed). Here, in a nutshell, is what the respondents had to say about "Rural vs Urban PRIDE".

1. Your born-again Christian neighbor will probably still accept a jump-start from GLBT-you when it's 20-below and he (or she) can't get the car started. And you'll probably still accept the same from them.

True enough, but I live in that small town and am still who I am without apology. Maybe I live in a funky little town, but I don't think so. I am me. I offer assistance to neighbors, I say hello and volunteer on committees and fish in the brook that runs through the village. And I am very queer. I think city dwellers have an option that we country mice do not: they can voluntarily "ghetto-ize" or segregate themselves by surrounding themselves with queer community. They can shop at queer bakeries and queer grocery markets and go to queer-owned restaurants and mechanics and house painters and the rest. While it sounds like nirvana, it is an

alternate reality to the greater world society. We are about 10 percent of the population, and where I live, that is about right. We are about 10 percent of the population here. Certainly I support queer businesses in my community, but not to the exclusion of others. After all, if I only patronized queer businesses and then I started a business, it would be hypocritical for me to expect the straight people I have been boycotting to shop with me. I support local businesses, and in particular the ones that are friendly and welcoming to me and my partner. Any time I am treated rudely or experience anti-gay stuff, I bail out immediately and then let the management know why I won't be back. A boycott does no good if the person you're boycotting doesn't know what he or she has done.

I want to agree with (*my partner*) in that I also am a big butch dyke, but I have been told countless times by straight friends and co-workers that they didn't know I was gay. This frustrates me, I know it is wierd, but I don't want to be thought of as anything but a lesbian, until there is no difference legally and finacially between me and my straight counterparts. Our town has a year round population of about 2,100 people our village probably makes up a tenth of that, but that doesn't stop us from being visible.

2. ... interesting interpretation of the Pride question. I agree with some of what you argue and disagree with a lot of it. We need to remember that Gay Pride started as an urban thing. That's where there were enough Gay people who were out to announce it in the streets. Which brings me to important fundamental difference from what you say, Pride is not just an urban event or urban vs. rural, it is simply the number of people willing to make a public statement about their sexual preference. It is political, always has been always will be.

Many people I know say they feel no need for gay pride any more. That after all the years of fighting for equal rights etc. they are now comfortable with their lifestyle so they have no interest in helping others. Apathy at its worst.

Urban Pride is what the majority of people want, the anonymous factor is I would say the driving force behind it.

Because as I see it, we are living in unsafe times and being out in a rural environment takes guts. Not many people want to endure the cost of being out in the area. Even in cities, if you took the percentages of people who attend a gay pride event, you would be surprised to find an even lower percentage of the population from a city then a rural. It all comes down to numbers.

3. I think that was a very good way to put things that are correct. ... Having lived in a small town, been a single parent, on welfare and mother born on the wrong side of the tracks, it is absolutely true about how one is perceived in the rural areas. People do know other people and are catagorized by birth, class, money, influence and last but not least, sexual orientation. I have learned that most of my school mates have opted to live in the rural areas because of family roots, they're safe. They live their lives very quietly and are known to have room mates. They feel safe, accepted and live they way they want to. In rural Maine, as long as you "don't rock the boat" then anyone can be living they want to live. In my for instance, I wasn't lucky enough to have that kind of safety. Ironic isn't it? A straight, divorced single parent and I wasn't safe in the country? The mores of rural people are complex but if it works for people, all the power to them. I feel that you put a good interepretation on your poll results.

4. I think you are right on target about the difference between rural and urban gay communities.

5. I for one feel you have hit the nail on the head, you did an excellent job of putting yourself in every persons moccasins, knowing, what it must be like to be in these rural areas. Knowing, that not everyone is going to jump out and shout I am Gay, Lesbian, even though they are out to some or even in some cases to everyone.

6. I think you have summed it up pretty well to the way it fits those of us that live in rural Maine. These small communities know everyones business and as long as you aren't flamboyant and don't rock the boat as the saying goes, you can pretty much enjoy a very good life. Neighbors help neighbors no matter what your affiliation is. I do have one other thing as to why I don't usually participate in Gay Pride events. I find the parades etc. a form of exhibitionism and I just can't do that.

In Defense of Christianity

In your July 1 editorial you mentioned a "born-again Christian neighbor" who would still "accept a jump-start from GLBT you when it's 20-below." Sadly, each and every one of us knew exactly who you were talking about. For many of us, that label contains memories of intolerance, anger and hatred. As someone who has occasionally been on the "wrong side" when it comes to the "born-again Christian" I often tense up when reading or hearing the phrase.

Yet, I consider myself a Christian and am a regular church goer. I am also a heterosexual woman, a mother, a liberal, an independent, a peace activist, a military parent, a pro-choice supporter, and a friend, ally, supporter, activist and parent to those in the GLBT community. How society rushes to label each of us and yet most of us just don't fit neatly into any one category, do we! When it comes to being a "Christian" I feel conflicted sometimes accepting a label that means different things to different people and not all of them good! For me, and for those I worship with, the term Christian is filled with love and acceptance. In the years since the religious right has high-jacked the term, I find myself on the defensive more often than not.

My message to the readership of the FAN is this; religion may not be for you, and that's fine, but if you feel the need for a community of faith don't believe those who will tell you there is no place for you! There are many, many of us "Christians" who believe in a God who is loving, not a God of hatred and anger. There are religious communities, even in rural Maine, who are accepting and supportive of all God's children! In the words of the people of Hammond Street Church "We welcome all people regardless of backgrounds, circumstances, ethnicity, family configuration, gender identity, or sexual orientation into our faith community, and affirm the worth of all persons and acknowledge God's love for all people" – all people, no exceptions!

CAVEATS:

All newsletters are emailed BCC, and the email list is not given out to anyone. Still, keep in mind that while this newsletter is for the GLBTI community, not everyone on the mailing list may be a "family" member. People ask to be put on the list and I put them on. There is no interview process or attempt to verify "queer" status. It's up to you to behave appropriately for whatever level of anonymity/security you feel you need.
