I was recently reading a textbook used in a graduate-level counseling at a Maine university, and was disappointed—but not surprised—when I read the book's chapter on trans issues.

IT'S TIME TO ACT

Concerning your op-ed on "no more studies" I can only say, Amen. You hit that nail right on the head.

I am TG and in the final stage of my transition. Over the past 1-1/2 years I have come to realize that all this commotion about getting more legislation passed and conducting more studies (I myself have volunteered for a couple) is essentially doing very little if anything for the TG community here in Maine.

I could not agree more when you said, "But there must come a time in the struggle for equality that every minority group goes through... when it simply has to stand up and say the evidence is there, it is overwhelming, and now it's time to do something about it." Along those same lines, it is my opinion that what is truly needed at this time is what I refer to as "feet on the street". What do I mean by that? Simply that we need to be seen by John Q. Public in his supermarkets, malls, theaters, restaurants, and all other venues of public life and we need to be seen in large numbers. The fact that there are most likely thousands of us needs to be driven home. We are here, we have always been here, and it's time to openly claim our place in society.

It is one thing to read about someone who is transgendered in the newspaper or see a video clip on television. If one finds the subject unpleasant then all one has to do is just skip to the next article or change the channel. It's different though when it's a coworker, a neighbor, or a fellow student in your class who is openly TG. Then it is personal and very hard to ignore, especially when all of a sudden they are popping up everywhere, like dandelions on a spring lawn.

Many of you may remember the 80's and 90's when the Gay community decided to finally take matters into their own hands and staged Gay Pride parades in several major cities. Yes, they were gaudy and lewd but those parades achieved two important objectives for them. The first was national television coverage and with that came the second more important thing, public awareness that there were not just a few Gays as was previously believed but thousands and thousands of them and they were everywhere. Now it was no longer impersonal and easy to ignore, gays were out in large numbers and suddenly, almost everyone knew someone or heaven forbid, had a family member who was gay. As a result of that, look how far the Gay community has come in being accepted into our society since then. They may have a long way to go still, but they are way ahead of us.

Now, I am not advocating anything such as a parade by transgendered people. I don't think that concept would work for us. On the other hand, I am getting a little tired of going to meetings, support groups, and other events where I hear Transfolk going on about "Why can't we just be accepted or wouldn't it be so nice just to go out in public anytime and anywhere you want." Well brace yourself because, if you really want it, you can. The only catch is that just as Dr. Cox on the television show Scrubs is so fond of saying, "You've got to have the stones Alice".

I know, I know, we've all heard the horror stories about being read or caught in public. I myself fell prey to the fear they generate for a very long time and even delayed starting my transition because of them. But don't you see, by staying in hiding we are playing

into the hands of our detractors. We are empowering their sick ideas and allowing them to inhibit, isolate, and harm us; even worse, by doing so we validate their outlandish accusations in the eyes of the public. More studies or scholarly dissertations in ivy covered halls will not do a darn thing for us. We need to been seen in numbers, we need the general public to realize how many of us there really are, and we need John Q. Public to see us as a co-worker, a neighbor, or a fellow student in his class. Only then will we begin to be accepted into our society.

I realize it is a scary step to take and many may never be capable of such action for whatever their reasons but if those who can, do so, then conditions could conceivably be changed so that they no longer are so frightening. I'm sure you're all familiar with the snowball rolling down the hill scenario? It's small at first but it just keeps getting bigger and bigger.

I must be honest with you and say that in the 1-1/2 years I have been living full time as Joan I have had a couple of bad experiences, but they have been far outweighed by positive ones. Whenever I am read by someone I do not flee in panic but instead use it as an opportunity to engage that person in ordinary conversation. I don't push the fact that I am TG on them but if they ask I am more than willing to discuss the subject without fear, shame, or embarrassment. Almost without exception, every person I have had such a conversation with has had some previous exposure to the concept of transgenderism either through newspaper or magazine articles, specials on cable networks such as Discovery Health, or shows like Oprah. These venues have given us visibility, a sort of legitimacy and because of that, people are now curious to learn more. I feel now is the time that we need to capitalize on this situation and add to its momentum. It has been my experience that a large segment of the public is ready and willing to learn about and accept us.

That acceptance comes with conditions though, and probably the most important condition is that of our public relations image. Where the Gay community many times used "shock and awe" in their parades to get the public's attention, we can't. If we want to be accepted as the girl or guy next door and be allowed to live our lives as such, then we have to dress and act the part. Six inch stilettos, net stockings, and a vinyl mini-skirt in the local supermarket are not going to help the cause, if you must dress that way then save it for when you go night clubbing.

Can we ever be accepted into mainstream society? I may be a dreamer, but I would like to think that the answer is yes. When the average citizen becomes accustomed to seeing us on a daily basis and is no longer threatened by our presence, then and only then will it happen. Until that day, all the conferences, studies, and legislation in the world will not do us much good.

Many of you may disagree with my point of view but after all, this is an op-ed isn't it? But ask yourself, "Is the writer wrong or is my reluctance motivated by some deep rooted fear"? Each time I leave my house now, I do it as Joan. Many people I have daily dealings with know I'm TG and it doesn't seem to matter one bit to them. I cannot begin to tell you what a wonderful feeling it is to go about my day as my true self and that has only come about because, and I'm speaking very figuratively here, I had "the stones" to do it. My dream is for every TG person to experience this life too. Acceptance is out there, all that needs to be done is seize the moment and live the part. That's my opinion and I'm sticking to it. I'll be looking for you.

There is no interview process or attempt to verify "queer" status. It's up to you to behave appropriately for whatever level of anonymity/security you feel you need.
