Dear Sumner:

I talked to Aunt Ann last night over the telephone and she told me that Dr. Sachs raised Mother's bed so that she could sit up while having her meals and that he had put her back on a normal diet. Up to now she had been on what is called a "low-residue diet", meaning that the food should be easily digestible and soft. All these are symptoms for the good; but this time we must not build our hopes too high and expect results that may not follow. We must pray to the Almighty that He will restore Mother's sight. Dr. Sachs has not yet looked into her eye but evidently he is going to do so within a day or two, as he is preparing her for leaving the hospital to go to Aunt Sarah's. I shall spend Wednesday with Mother and then go down for the week-end beginning Friday.

I am herewith enclosing the list of addresses which we found exactly where you said you had put it. Add to this list Neil Clark, 860 Yale Station, New Haven, Connecticut. I met his Father yesterday and he gave me the new address. Neil is back at Yale to finish up his last year.

No special news. Helen is doing excellent work at school and she appreciated very much your postal card to her. Hoping you had a pleasant Sunday.
