Dear Sumner:

I became so tied up in the office that I had to forego my yearning to be with Mother in Boston and did not spend Wednesday with her. I will be with her Friday, Saturday and Sunday. In the meantime I kept in touch with Aunt Ann and last night when I talked with her she told me that Dr. Sachs plans to have her leave the hospital probably this week-end but that he has not yet looked into her eye. His technique is entirely different from what it was in the first instance in that he has not examined her eye since the operation. Evidently he is waiting he is waiting the maximum period of time. So once more all we can do is hope and pray that God will be good to her and restore most of the sight in that eye. I shall write to you from Aunt Sarah's.

Aunt Selma went to New York to be operated on for a minor repair and the operation was performed Wednesday morning. Uncle Louie left last night to be with her for a day or two. He has been assured that the operation was successful and that she will be out of the hospital within ten days. Then she will go to her folks for convalescence and, since Passover will be on us by the 16th, she will stay over until after the holidays. When she returns Uncle Louie hopes that the weather will permit them to live at the cottage from then on until the Fall.

No doubt you will want to drop her a line. So write to her care of Leroy Sanatorium, East 61st Street, New York City. I sent flowers in the name of Mother, Helen, yourself and myself.

No special news except that I deposited Grandpa's check of \$10.00 together with a \$5.00 fee that I earned for attending a special meeting of the Bank committee, in your savings account.

Keep your fingers crossed and hope that the rumor turns out to be true and that you will be out much sooner than you had expected.
