MAYOR'S ADDRESS

Gentlemen of the City Council:—

With proper solemnity you have taken the oaths of office to which your fellow-citizens have confidently called you. It may be needless for me to remind you of the responsibility which you assume and the sacred character of the oath which you have taken.

At the threshold of your official duties, it is well to reflect and consider the fact, that we are the servants and not the masters of the citizens of Lewiston. Our duty is to administer the municipal affairs in an intelligent, economical and businesslike manner.

It should be understood that we are willing at all times to give respectful consideration to the appeals of our citizens, regardless of political affiliation. Every citizen should feel that his rights will be respected and his interests protected upon the selfsame plan of fairness and equality.

Let us now briefly review the status of the more important departments of our City Government.

This splendid financial showing of the past year is deserving and should receive the highest praise and commendation of our citizens. During this year 100,000 4 per cent railroad bonds will mature and provisions must be made to refund the same. I have requested our representatives in the legislature to present an act authorizing this city to refund these bonds, and this request will doubtless be granted.

Under the supervision of our very competent superintendent of streets, much work of a permanent nature has been accomplished, 10,168 sq. yards of bituminous paving, 1523 sq. yards of tar concrete, 3056 feet of 10 inch sewer pipe has been laid. An iron bridge has been placed on Riverside street over the M. C. R. R.. The South bridge has been re-planked and many other bridges in the City proper and rural districts repaired. In all over 11,000 ft. of lumber has been used in this department.

For many years the Franklin Gully sewer has been a menace to the health of the people living in that part of the city. Many promises had been made by previous governments, but nothing of a permanent nature done, until last year, when a special appropriation of \$5,000 was made to build a brick sewer. This work has been begun and I am informed that it is the intention of the Board of Public Works to complete the same this year. This improvement will be greatly appreciated by the citizens of this locality.

PERMANENT WALKS

2217 Feet of tar, concrete and 600 feet of concrete walks has been laid during the past year and I would recommend that we at least double this amount of continuous walks during the present year. I heartily approve of the policy of my immediate predecessor in doing each year

a reasonable amount of permanent street work in the different parts of the city.

I would call to your attention the exceeding poor condition of the paving on Lisbon street. The united efforts of the Chamber of Commerce and business men to boom Lewiston and make the business section more attractive and up to date, have my cordial support.

The removal of all our hanging signs has been a decided improvement. The substitution of iron posts with ornamental lights for the present wooden ones will, when erected, make a most pleasing and attractive sight.

I would ask that a special appropriation be made this year to place that section of Lisbon street between Main and Pine streets, and the adjacent sidewalks more in harmony with these improvements. I am informed that for a very reasonable expense to the city, the present paving blocks can be taken up and laid lengthwise and the same covered with a 4-inch coating of specially prepared tar concrete. At the same time, I would also recommend that the sidewalks on both sides be rebuilt in a most workmanlike manner to conform to the newly established grades.

When this work is completed, Lewiston will have one of the best and most modern business streets in New England. Next year I would advise continuing the same line of work to Cedar street.

POLICE

No department plays so important a part in protection to life and property, in the prevention and detection of crime, as the Police Department. There are few departments upon which demands are more frequently made, and none to which so little credit is given. Work is done of which the average citizen never hears, and service is rendered which the public does not fully appreciate. During the past year much has been done by the members of our Police Force. Over \$2,750 worth of stolen property has been recovered, which is the largest amount ever recovered in any one year. The utmost harmony has prevailed between the marshal, subordinate officers and patrol men, during the year. The Gamewell Police Patrol System which has been in use for more than eighteen years has been out of commission for some time and will have to be thoroughly rebuilt and many additional patrol boxes added as soon as possible.

STREET LIGHTS

The lighting plant has recently been remodelled and much new machinery installed at a cost of over \$17,000. The last city council have voted to install 200 or more additional lights in different parts of the city. In the distribution of these lights, I trust that our citizens will be treated alike. There should be no discrimination for or against any section because of personal friendship or political consideration. For the numerous requests received for new lights, it may be necessary to still further increase the capacity of our lighting plant.

SCHOOLS

In common with every true supporters of our Public Schools, it is a pleasure to know that the utmost harmony and co-operation between teachers and pupils has prevailed in all departments of the School System. Last year Manual Training, Mechanical and Freehand Drawing were introduced in the evening school for males. This year Domestic Science (Cooking) was made a part of the course of study in the Girls' Evening School. These courses have proved very satisfactory and were well attended.

Changes and improvements in the heating plants of our schools have been made that secured economies and greater heating efficiency.

The whole number of pupils registered during the Fall Term of the present school year was:

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This attendance shows the importance of these schools and their usefulness to the City. There are in attendance in private and parochial schools in Lewiston about 2275. The last school census showed there were 8,795 persons of school age in Lewiston.

WATER BOARD

This department shows up strongly in its annual report, and in it Lewiston has a very valuable asset.

An urgent request has been received from citizens living in the vicinity of South Lewiston for an extension of our water service. I trust the Water Board will give this petition their careful consideration, and if advisable, have the extension made as soon as possible.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Fire Department is always a source of pride to our citizens. Without question, it leads every department in the State in its high state of efficiency and its promptness in responding to alarms. Perfect harmony prevails among the officers and men and the splendid work of the chief and department in handling the recent garage fire on Main street, adds new laurels to the high reputation which our department enjoys among the insurance underwriters of New England, and property owners of this city.

The purchasing of the Auto Truck has proven the best investment Lewiston ever made and its real value is becoming more appreciated every day.

The total number of alarms for the year was 261.

The total value of property involved in fires for the year was \$714,861.60.

The total loss was \$72,571.37.

The total insurance was \$301,512.00.

The loss at Central Garage was \$38,434.35, so that the total loss outside this fire for the entire year was only \$34,137.02, and this was nearly, if not quite covered by insurance.

During the year the department has responded to requests for aid from Leeds Junction, Brunswick and Turner, Maine.

A vote of thanks was received from each of these places for the excellent service of the firemen.

I am firmly convinced that with reasonable care and economy in the management of the various departments that a sufficient appropriation can be made to make the intended improvements on Lisbon street, without increasing the tax rate of $17\frac{1}{2}$ mills, and it is my desire to make it lower if possible.

In selecting officers for the different positions it is your duty to elect men of unquestioned honesty, and recognized ability.

The success or failure of this administration will depend in a great measure upon the loyalty and co-operation of the members of the city council, I therefore sincerely

hope that our official relations will be most pleasant and agreeable, and I ask every member of the City Council to join with me in an honest effort to give to the citizens of our city the cleanest and most progressive administration that Lewiston has ever had.

of the City of Lewiston:**

Gentlemen:—In accordance with the requirements of the City Ordinances, I herewith submit my annual report for the year ending Feb. 28th, 1913. The number of buildings inspected for lights and power during the year is 181. Number of motors installed is 27. The total H. P. of motors installed is 112. The number of 16 C. P. lamps is 2984.

There have been no fires, caused by defective wiring during the year. It shows that the companies and the citizens are doing their very best to keep their wires in a good safe condition.

The outside construction has been much bettered in the past year. It seems the disposition of the companies to maintain a very high standard of work as a large amount of money has been expended during the last year by the companies, also the City, in making such changes and improvement. And I think that the City would compare favorably in this respect with any city, and in most cases much better than any city in the State.

**ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF
THE CITY FARM**

Lewiston, Maine, March 1st, 1913.

**To the Honorable Mayor and Board of Overseers
of the Poor:**

Gentlemen:—I herewith respectfully submit the following report of the City Farm and Alms House for the year ending February 28th, 1913.

The crops have been fair this year and I have been able to turn over to the City Treasurer the sum of \$1,305.06 for produce sold.

We have had 100 tons of hay, 150 bu. of oats, 1400 bu. potatoes, 80 bu. turnips, 25 bu. beets, 95 bu. carrots, 11,000 heads of cabbage, 50 bu. green peas, 10 bu. onions, 35 bu. tomatoes, 13 bu. pole beans, 200 heads of lettuce, 200 bunches of radishes, 2 tons of squash, 2 tons of pumpkins, 1000 cucumbers, 145 tons of ensilage corn, 250 doz. ears of sweet corn, 6 tons of straw, 30 barrels of apples.

During the year we have bought one span horses, one mowing machine, and had the barn shingled, we had the inside of the wooden house papered and painted, and the brick house whitewashed, we also bought four new carpets.

The ice house has been filled with 450 cakes of ice without any expense to the City.

The health of the inmates has been very good this year, there is now 75 inmates at the farm.

In conclusion, I wish to thank Mayor Morey and the Board of Aldermen, and Overseers of the Poor, for their kindness and advice during the year, and to P. J. Cronin, their clerk, with whom it has been a pleasure to co-operate to look after the poor, Dr. J. A. Choquette, the City Physician, the City Marshal, and all the other City Officials with whom I have come in contact in doing my work, and also Mrs. Tracy, the Police Matron.

REPORT OF OVERSEERS OF THE POOR

Lewiston, Maine, March 1st, 1913.

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

Gentlemen:—With the close of the municipal year I present the annual report of the Poor Department of the City, ending February 28th, 1913.

Herein may be found a statement of receipts and expenditures of this department, cost of supporting children at the Healy Asylum, and Hospital Annex, and in private families, board of old soldiers, cost of maintaining the poor outside of the Alms House, also cost of maintaining the City Farm. The receipts will show amount collected from other cities and towns for support furnished by this department to individuals and families who belong to other towns in the State, and from State Treasurer for the support of State Paupers and for receipts from the City Farm.

There has been a large amount of sickness in many parts of the city during the past year from many causes, I find that in a great many cases of families where the conditions were such as made it imperative that they apply for such aid as could be furnished by this department and in consequence of this we have been obliged to assist a number of families who under ordinary conditions would not have found it necessary to apply for public aid. The entire cost of the Department for the year is

The difficult and delicate duties of this office, (hard and perplexing as it is) I have tried to perform in such

a manner as to protect the interest of the city, and at the same time to render such aid to the poor that no reasonable person could complain that I had dealt harshly or unjustly with them, I may have made some errors in judgment in dealing with the hundreds who have sought aid of this department but have endeavored to do my duty and if to err at all to do so on the side of humanity.

I have investigated every case of applicants for aid sometimes requiring time and expense in order to place the legal Pauper Settlement of the parties receiving aid, this I have been able to do in nearly all cases and have collected from other cities and towns for the year just ending \$661.64, and from State Treasurer for aid furnished State Paupers the sum of \$996.33. In order to place the burden of State Paupers support on the State requires the proof of their non-settlement and sworn affidavits presented to the Governor and Council, this I have been able to do in nearly all cases, and presented to the Governor and Council, who after due consideration have allowed the same and paid to this department during the year as above stated \$996.33.

I may state that while I have been in this office as clerk of the Overseers of the Poor, I have collected from the State Treasurer, for aid furnished State Paupers, the sum of \$13,884.22.

It has been so well demonstrated that the City Farm is not the proper place for children that the Overseers of the Poor within the past few years have been providing homes and paying board for such children as may from time to time come under their care, either from loss of parent or parents to properly provide for them. Some of them being provided with permanent homes or being boarded at the Healy Asylum and the Hospital Annex, and in private families. Many take advantage of this plan and have their children cared for at the City expense, when if they were to be sent to the City Farm they would make some effort for their support, and therefore lessen the burden of their support for the City. After a careful investigation I find that no city or town in the State is boarding as many children outside the City Farm as Lewiston, the children must be cared for but I would recommend that a more stringent rule be adopted by the Board so as to aid only those that are most worthy. You are aware that the past year has been an exceptionally hard year on account of the increased cost of the necessities of life. The great increase in the cost of wood and coal, has

made the bill in this department much larger than would otherwise have been the case.

The care and protection of our people at the City Farm, is a matter in which all our good citizens are interested, and it is with great satisfaction that I announce that in no instance have I known of any ill treatment to any of our people there; cleanliness, order and harmony prevail, and a general homelike appearance has been manifested throughout the year.

The Superintendent and his wife, Mr. and Mrs. Cyrille Labranche are peculiarly adapted to the place they occupy; their quiet and humane treatment of the inmates has won for them the respect of all, the house and the inmates have been kept in an orderly condition. I have visited the place many times during the past year and unexpectedly too, but always found the same clean and orderly conditions to exist. Mr. Labranche has consulted this office at all times when occasion required and our relations have always been the most pleasant and everything has worked in harmony for the best interest of the taxpayers of our City.

To Mr. and Mrs. Labranche I wish to extend my thanks for the able manner in which they have managed the affairs at the Farm.

The call for medical treatment has been many, this department has cared for a large number of sick people during the past year, and many thanks are hereby tendered to Dr. J. A. Choquette for the efficient manner, in which he has performed his duties as City Physician.

I have but the highest commendation for the efficient services of the Police Matron, Mrs. Catherine V. Tracy. I believe few people realize the benefits derived from her work, both to the city and the suffering humanity. Her experience in the last six years of continuous service has made her an especially valuable aid to this department. During the time she has held the position as Police Matron I have found her a most faithful and hard working assistant, ever ready and willing to perform all duties in such a manner as to indicate that her heart is in her work. I wish to extend to her the thanks of this board for the valuable services rendered.

In conclusion, permit me to express to Mayor Morey and the Board of Overseers of the Poor, appreciation and thanks for the many courtesies and hearty co-operation received during my term of office, and to City Solicitor

Fortunat Belleau for his counsel and advice on matters of importance.

REPORT OF INSPECTOR OF MILK

**To the Honorable Mayor and Members of the
City Council:**

Gentlemen:—I submit for your consideration my annual report as Inspector of Milk for the City of Lewiston.

I am pleased to report that the milk used by our citizens is of exceptional good quality invariably above 10 per cent. and will stand the test of our Maine standard, which is twelve per cent. total solids, of which three per cent must be butter fat.

Nearly all of our Milk dealers, so far as I have been able to ascertain, are willing and anxious to comply with the law. In all the tests I have made during the past year, in nearly every case I have found the milk up to the standard, the Babcock tests being used.

There has been but one change in the Police Department this year and that occurred in the office of Deputy Marshal. The sad event of the death of the late Deputy Marshal Pitman caused a great loss to the department. All the members of the force and myself felt at the time the loss of a friend and a good adviser. The vacancy was filled by the appointment of Lewis E. Davis, who has always seconded my efforts and to whom I am most grateful.

The discipline of the Department as a whole has been good. The members as a rule have endeavored to conform to the request of their superior officers and to faithfully perform all the duties imposed upon them.

The protection afforded by the Department to the property owners of this city has been nearly perfect, except in one or two cases and those breaks were of no consequence being petty larcenies and in most cases the property stolen was recovered as you will see by the report that \$2,705 was recovered. This fact alone, in my mind, speaks very highly of the Department.

The number of tramps and vagabonds constantly increases and statistics show that two-thirds of all trouble requiring police interference arises from this source.

I would recommend that the Gamewell Police Signal System now in use in the Department be given a thorough overhauling. It is giving us considerable trouble. This can be understood as it has now been in use for some

eighteen years. The time stamp, very essential for the efficiency of the Department, is completely out of order.

It will be soon necessary to purchase a new wagon for the Department. In this connection I would suggest, that as the present one has been in use for more than eighteen years, that a covered carriage be purchased, as this is used in all cities in Maine and most in the country. To make the efficiency of the Department greater it should be an automobile, as calls from the suburbs, for patrol or ambulance service are often. In the suburbs especially, as calls often come from there, thus equipped, the department can do more good.

The Police Matron, Mrs. Catherine Tracy, has most acceptably filled that office for the past year and I feel that, for procuring situations for those that are able to work, distributing food, clothing and other needed articles donated by philanthropic citizens to those whom the City must otherwise help that the office is more than self sustaining and I have found Mrs. Tracy ever ready to perform all duties in such a manner as to indicate that her heart is in her work.

The Police Department and the Poor Department have close relations and I wish to say that the assistance afforded us by Mr. P. J. Cronin cannot be too highly estimated.

The Deputy Marshal, Mr. Davis, and the Captain of the Night Watch, Mr. Walsh, have most heartily cooperated with me and for this I wish to extend to them my most heartfelt thanks.

In closing this report I wish to extend also my thanks to Judge Brann, Clerk Curran and Miss Metcalf for the advice often given, and so helpful, to the Department.

REPORT OF POLICE MATRON

Lewiston, Maine, March 1st, 1913.

To the Honorable Mayor and Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen:—I hereby present my sixth annual report as Police Matron of the City of Lewiston, for the year ending February 28th, 1913.

I have reported daily at the Police Station and attended women prisoners, whenever the officers reported finding any women at the different railway stations, strangers in our city. I have assisted them in every way possible and often have found employment for them.

Last May a clothes line robbery on Webster Street was reported, when I heard of it I was suspicious of a certain woman, upon investigating my suspicions were verified and before night the woman was arrested. The next morning she was sentenced to two months in jail. While serving her sentence her child was properly cared for and upon being released she and the child went to relatives in another state.

A telephone message was received from the Superintendent of the Home for Feeble Minded, stating that a girl, and inmate of the home had been allowed to come to Lewiston on a visit and the people whom she was visiting refused to send her back at the proper time. I located her and saw that she was promptly returned.

A young girl who had no one to look after her and was in danger of going astray was committed to the State Industrial School through the Probate Court.

As we have no State Reformatory for women, I have twice appealed outside of the State; one young woman was sent to the Salvation Army Rescue Home in Boston, and another received permission to enter the Home of the Good Shepherd in Roxbury. Neither of these young women remained any length of time thus showing how badly we need a State Reformatory in Maine, where such women could be sent by order of the Court, and obliged to stay long enough to benefit them.

I have at all times tried to fulfill any call from the Police Department for my services. A short time ago the officers thought it necessary to have someone go to Sabbathus and remain in the home of an important witness, I was asked to go and upon consenting remained on duty about fourteen hours.

Of course my work is closely connected with the Overseer of the Poor, and in connection with that department

I have accompanied him to the Hospital in Augusta, with women insane patients, and to nearby cities and towns to return families and thus save expense to our city.

A young girl was returned to the Home for Destitute Children in Boston, thus relieving the City of Lewiston and placing the responsibility where it belonged.

A boy four years old was taken to the Children's Hospital in Portland and operated upon, the child was completely cured; in connection with this case I wish to say that the Childrens' Hospital does a great deal of good, they have always been very good to me when asked to treat crippled children, brought to the attention of the Poor Department.

Four children have been placed in permanent homes, one legally adopted, and one placed in the Children's Home in Augusta.

A young girl who came to Lewiston without the knowledge of her parents, was reported to me, I succeeded in getting her father's address and upon notifying him he came here and took her home.

Two children who had become city charges, were taken to Halifax, N. S., and placed in the care of their grandmother, where they will have an exceptionally good home.

These are only a few of the many calls made upon the Police Matron for her services.

As usual in my work among the poor I have made hundreds of calls and given away articles of clothing, furniture, etc. During the Christmas season one of our mill owners gave me a number of blankets, among them many crib blankets, thus providing good warm bedding for many poor people. I also received many gifts of clothing, money, food and two barrels of apples from different parties.

Considering the many calls upon the people at Christmas time, I wish to thank most sincerely those I have mentioned, and all who contributed to me in any way at that time. There are many who never fail to send me their Christmas contributions for the poor, no matter how many other calls are made upon them. To those I am especially grateful.

In closing I wish to thank all employees of the City Building, who have always kindly assisted be in my work.

**REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF STREET
LIGHT DEPARTMENT**

**To the Honorable Board of Mayor and Aldermen
of the City of Lewiston:**

Gentlemen:—I have the honor of submitting my fifth report for the year ending February 28, 1913.

I have installed a new 250 Kilo Watt electric machine with belts and pulleys, and 2 regulators for street lighting. I put up 100 new poles, 200 cross arms, 12 miles of new wire and completely changed the old street light system to the new one now in existence. 100 new lights were put up in different parts of the city.

The new system works admirably and seems to give perfect satisfaction. I think the city lighting plant is now as good as that of any city in the State.

I will also remark that the power now in use is generated by water and communicated to the dynamos by the old system requiring numerous belts, consequently about one half of the energy is lost. I would recommend the installing of turbines that would do away with the belts and double the power now generated. While it would be quite an expense to make this change, it would be a saving in the long run, would give far better lighting power and consequently better satisfaction to the citizens.

Report of Public Library Trustees

Lewiston, March 1st, 1913.

To the Honorable City Council of the City of Lewiston:

Gentlemen:—We herewith respectfully submit our tenth annual report of the financial standing of the Lewiston Public Library covering receipts and expenditures for the year ending February 28th, 1913, together with the detailed report of the Librarian, which contains many items of interest and which we commend to your careful consideration. There has been quite an expenditure of money during the year for new books to replace many old volumes that were badly worn and very much soiled, so much so the Trustees considered them unsanitary and they were committed to the furnace. Very many of these had been in the Library for a long time, and by reason of being popular books they were in constant use. These expenditures together with quite a large amount for recent popular publications put the general condition of the Library in much better form than it has been for a number of years. Quite a number of books and periodicals have been presented to the Library, and the names of the donors appear in the Library report. The total number of books taken out during the year has been over 56,000, and the number would have been undoubtedly larger if the scare occasioned by the epidemic early in the year could have been avoided. About four-fifths of our circulation goes to the adult portion of the community and one-fifth to the juvenile, and the percentage of fiction reading has been about the same as heretofore, covering not far from eighty-four (84) per cent. We are still troubled with mutilation of some of the books and the stealing of magazines and papers, and the Trustees would appreciate any information that will lead to the detection of such transactions. A new Remington typewriter has recently been purchased to replace the old one which had been in use for a number of years and had become almost worthless. Whenever a vacancy for any reason exists in the ranks of our Library force we are obliged to secure the services of some one to supply and it is not always an easy task for the Trustees to find individuals who are in any way familiar with the work. It would be gratifying to us if some of our Lewiston young ladies could find it convenient and agreeable to qualify for this work by devoting a few weeks in learning the methods, and have their names

placed upon the waiting list so that whenever vacancies do occur we may have some one to call upon. If there should be at any time young ladies in the City who would like to thus apply and qualify, they can leave their names with the Librarian, Miss Gilmore.

REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN

(1912-1913)

To the Honorable Board of Trustees of the Lewiston Public Library:

Gentlemen:—Herewith is presented for your consideration the tenth annual report of the Lewiston Public Library.

No change has been made in the methods or general administration (so that the history of the past year differs little in detail from that of previous times).

The total number of books taken from the library for home use is 56,193. Marked increase in the circulation during the past six months makes it evident that, but for the decrease consequent upon the recent epidemic of small pox, which affected the earlier part of the year, a much higher figure might have been reached.

No correct account can be kept of the reference work of the library, and this is regrettable, as passing over the most important feature of the institution. During the months of December and January 563 volumes were given out for use in the building; and probably as many more were consulted by students who themselves took the books from the shelves. The aim of every librarian is, of course, to strengthen the reference department as much as possible; and this is particularly to be sought in a locality where there are many calls from school and college students. In connection should be mentioned the valuable reference books which have been purchased within the last twelve months, to the great satisfaction of the public.

Among these are:—Rand & McNally's "Library atlas of the world"; Monroe's "Cyclopedia of education"; Bailey's "Cyclopedia of agriculture"; the concluding volumes of that monumental work, the "Catholic encyclopaedia"; Quain's "Anatomy"; the last "United States catalog of books in print"; Meier-Graefe's "History of modern art; Knecht's "Manual of dyeing"; Rawson's "Dictionary of dyes"; Hannan's "Textile fibers of commerce"; Skeat's "Etymological dictionary of the English language"; Calthrop's "English costume" and two volumes of New England history—Young's *Chronicles of the Pilgrim Fathers* and "*Chronicles of Massachusetts Bay*".

One hundred and seven bound volumes have been given to the library, including the usual publications of the Government and State. The treasury department of

Washington have presented a set of interesting Confederate bills, on condition that they shall be so disposed as to ensure their preservation and their inspection by the people. This has not yet been done, but the matter is in the hands of a committee and will probably be carried through before long.

Two new periodicals have been added to the list; the Bulletin of the "Pan-American Union" and "Popular mechanics".

CHANGE ON THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

At the last annual meeting of the Board, Mr. A. T. Gastonguay was elected to fill the position left vacant by the death of Dr. Merton O. Edwards.

CHANGE ON THE STAFF OF THE LIBRARY

In May, 1912, Miss Shirley White severed her connection with the library; and in her stead, till action should be taken by the Board, the librarian was instructed to employ Mrs. Grace Barnes, then a student of the library's methods and the only person in the city who was qualified and available to assist at the desk. This occurrence calls attention once more to the desirability of having trained substitutes at hand, in case of emergencies which are likely to affect the force of the library.

The trustees have as yet taken no action, and Mrs. Barnes is still filling the place formerly held by Miss White.

LIBRARY EXPERIENCES AND NEEDS

In the month of June, permission was given to Miss Tracy to attend the convention of the American Library Association, held at Ottawa; and she was absent for ten days. In the fall Mrs. Barnes was ill for two weeks; and, as no one of experience was at hand, the assistants were obliged to do the daily duties without extra help. This further emphasizes the need of substitutes. With the growth of the library, they are becoming a necessity during the vacation time of the staff, as well as when absences are unavoidable.

OTHER PRESSING NEEDS OF THE LIBRARY

The students are still asking for a room where they may practice for their debates or compare their papers; the club women speak often of their wish for a small lecture hall; and the children's department still goes ne-

glected, save for such care as may be given in the leisure moments of the staff. Most of the children frequenting the room are too small to read for themselves and all of them should be taught the proper care of books, so that they may not handle the volumes roughly or with soiled fingers. Someone of sufficient literary appreciation to scan the books and give the young people advice about their reading, someone who understands and can control children—such a person would be invaluable to the library.

VANDALISM IN DIFFERENT ROOMS OF LIBRARY

The usual mutilation of books and the purloining of magazines and papers give the assistants much trouble. Rarely does a week pass unmarked by a gap in the files of papers, and often a magazine is missing. Recently a new atlas, which had been in the reference room less than a month, was ruthlessly stripped of two important maps. The bound periodicals suffer the same fate; and for that reason it is hoped that all who have unbound volumes of magazines which they are willing to donate to the library, may do so without fail, as these may be used to supplement the mutilated copies.

GRATITUDE OF NON-RESIDENTS

Permission to non-residents to borrow books from the library upon payment of a small fee was granted by the Board early in the year; and this has called forth many thanks from the readers who have heretofore been obliged to do without the favors of the "People's University." Seventy-three have taken advantage of the opportunity; twenty-eight of these registered as regular borrowers.

Perhaps this liberal treatment of outsiders may be the first step toward that inter-communal spirit which has long been desired for the "Twin Cities" by their three librarians. If the separate collections of books might be selected partly with an eye to complement one another, they could be much more valuable to the vicinity than if they so often duplicated, as they do, the neighboring choice.

NEED OF MUSICAL BOOKS

Within the last few months, the vocal scores of several operas have been purchased for the Lewiston library, and the reception with which they have met assures the librarian that many more such works would be welcome.

She would be glad of advice upon the selection of musical literature from anyone who is interested in the subject.

EXTENSION

Now that the library of Lewiston has become firmly established and the work is systematically going on, is it not time to think about its extension? Many other libraries, possessing fewer books than this one has, are doing good work in this direction, and why should not this library follow their example? There are distant and bookless quarters of the city where a branch might be of great service. The librarian recently paid a visit to one of Lewiston's evening schools and became convinced of the tremendous power for good that they are carrying among the people. School and library are allies, and each should reach out to those who will not or can not come to the ordinary centres of learning.

Concerning this, as well as other topics pertaining to the library's advancement, the librarian is always glad to hear comment or suggestion. For co-operation and interest in her plans she is happily conscious that she has to thank many true friends; and this fact enables her to forget all that might otherwise discourage or displease.

1528 feet of 10 inch sewer has been laid on the following streets:

7 new catch basins and 3 manholes have been built during the year.

The Franklin Gully sewer has long been a difficult problem to solve as it is an open sewer and as that part of the city has been growing rapidly for the past few years it had become a nuisance and since action had to be taken and through the active efforts of Alderman Russell the City Government made a special appropriation of \$5,000 for the purpose of constructing a brick sewer and the work was started, 420 feet of it completed and it is the intention of the Board to finish the job the coming year.

PERMANENT STREETS AND PAVING

10.168 sq. yds. of Bituminous Paving have been laid during the year on the following streets:

3748 Sq. Yds. on Main Street. (State Road).

2000 Sq. Yds. on Pine Street.

1810 Sq. Yds. on Blake Street.

1875 Sq. Yds. on Park Street.

735 Sq. Yds. on River Street.

1523 Sq. Yds. of Tar Concrete have been laid in various parts of the City.

The Alley from Park Street to Lisbon Street in the rear of Central Block has been paved with the same material and I would recommend that the other alleys in the city receive the same treatment.

NEW STREETS AND BRIDGES

A large amount of work has been done in this division during the year.

A new iron bridge has been placed on Riverside St., over the M. C. R. R. Ry. The South bridge has been replanked and all of bridges both in the City proper and the rural districts have been repaired more or less.

Some 104,077 feet of lumber has been used in bridges alone, besides 8496 feet which has been used in driveways and boxes. Both the North and South bridges should be painted the coming year.

This branch of the department has received a large share of attention the past year 2217 feet of Tar Concrete walk has been laid at an average width of six feet on the following streets:

550 feet on Horton Street, (with gutters).

650 feet on Wood Street, (with gutters).

BRICK WALKS

A large amount of brick walk has been relaid and some new has been laid. Some 1500 feet of new ash walks have been built in various parts of the City and about 2000 feet of old walk recoated.

753 feet of new curbing has been set and 1876 feet of old curbing reset.

There having been very little snow to handle during the past winter the teams have been able to haul and deposit a large amount of gravel and ashes in various places for use the coming season.

One pair of horses has been purchased for use in the department the past year and three have been sold.

A new concrete wall and cement cellar has been put under the wooden stable on Bates St., and connection made with the sewer, the stable repaired and put in good condition.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF FIRE AND POLICE ALARMS

To the Honorable Board of Fire and Police Commissioners
of the City of Lewiston:

Gentlemen:—I have the honor of submitting herewith my second annual report for the year ending February 28th, 1913.

The system has worked very satisfactorily. What few breaks we have had in the system have been found very promptly, owing to the ten circuits being so much shorter and taking so much less time to go over than it did when there were but three.

The new repeater switch and protector boards have worked in a very satisfactory manner.

For permanent improvements during the year there has been two miles of old wire taken from the circuit and new put in its place.

There has been two new boxes installed. Number 39 at Pumping Station, Number 612 at corner of Maple and Blake Streets. These boxes were placed where they were very much needed.

I would recommend for permanent improvements Cole key guards put on all street boxes. While this would not be very expensive, it would add much to the reliability of the boxes.

As we all know so well that very much depends on the department getting the alarm in the quickest time after a fire starts, in order to save life and property, I shall, as usual, recommend a number of street signal boxes to be placed in the following locations: One on Upper Main Street near Fair Grounds; one at corner of Main and Ware Streets; near Home for Aged Women; one near the Wallace School Building on Main Street; one on the corner of Lisbon and Chestnut Streets; one on Lisbon street, near Music Hall, and a small interior box in City Hall and in the Empire Theatre. I do not expect them all this year, but it is good insurance and worthy of consideration. I would also recommend a tower striker to be placed on the Frye Grammar School Building.

Before closing this report I wish to call attention to the frequent breaking of glass in fire-boxes, the taking of keys and opening of box doors, leaving them inoperative under certain conditions. There is a heavy penalty attached to this act, but until a reward is offered for convictions, I do not think many will be made.

I would recommend a new police system, as the one we now have is in very poor condition and needs a general remodelling. A part of it is of very old style and badly worn. It has seen hard service and had no remodelling.

The following is a list of apparatus under my charge:

In Lewiston:—One ten-circuit repeater, with the switchboards and protector board, belonging to it; fifty-three signal boxes; two engine house gongs; two engine house indicators; one engine house gong and indicator combined; three door-openers; two emergency electric light switches; one small switchboard, with switches complete, 262 cells of storage battery; one tower striker; one 2000-lb. bell, 14 mechanical gongs, one compressed air whistle plant; three sets of private telephone instruments and about 38 miles of line wire.

In Auburn:—Thirty-one signal boxes, one engine house gong and indicator combined; one indicator and vibrating bell combined; one tower bell striker; two door openers; ten mechanical gongs; one automatic main line cut-outs and 20 miles of line wire.

The police system consists of a 4-circuit central office apparatus, a bell and register for the stable; eleven street signal boxes; thirteen sets Bell telephones; 68 jars of battery, and about 6 miles of line wire.

In closing this report, I wish to thank the Board of Fire Commissioners, Chief, and Board of Engineers, officers and members of the Department, for their help and kindness to me in the discharging of my duties in the Department.

To the Honorable Board of Fire Commissioners:

Gentlemen:—Herewith I have the honor to submit to you the annual report of the Fire Department for the year ending February 28, 1913.

The manual force of the Department is as follows:

Permanent men.—One Chief Engineer; one Superintendent of Fire Alarms; one driver for Hose Co., No. 1; one Lieutenant for Combination Chemical and Hose Motor Car No. 1; one tankman; one hoseman; one chauffeur.

Call men.—Four Assistant Engineers; one Department Surgeon; two Engine men; two Stokers; forty-six hosemen; twelve laddermen; eight drivers and three fire police.

During the year the Department responded to 261 alarms. The following table gives their classification:

BUILDINGS

The apparatus rooms at the Central Fire Station and Park St. Station should have new floors, the interior and exterior of the buildings painted.

The roof of the annex to the Central Fire Station should be repaired.

The rooms at the Lincoln St. Station should have new ceilings.

These repairs would put the buildings in good condition.

APPARATUS

The apparatus consists of the following:

HOSE

During the year there has been 2000 feet of new hose purchased, so that we have on hand at the present time 13,800 feet of cotton rubber lined hose, of this amount 2000 feet is unserviceable.

HORSES

Five horses are owned by the department, these are in good condition with the exception of the horse at the Lincoln Street Station. This horse is unfit for service and should be replaced by a new one.

RECOMMENDATIONS

In order to increase the efficiency of the Department, I would call your attention to the following recommendations:

A permanent team for the use of the Chief Engineer of the Department.

A permanent horse and driver for Hose No. 2, Central Fire Station, Ash St.

A permanent team and driver for Engine No. 3, Central Fire Station, Ash St.

A permanent team and driver for Ladder No. 2, Park Street Station.

A permanent horse and driver for Hose No. 4, Lincoln Street Station.

The purchase of a new hose wagon to replace the old reel used by Hose Co., No. 3.

Engines No. 3 and No. 4 should be touched and varnished.

Hose No. 2, No. 4, Exercising Wagon and Ladder No. 2 should have rubber tires.

Ladder Truck No. 1 should be painted.

The installing of two sets of roll tracks for winter service, one for Hose No. 1, Central Fire Station, and one for Ladder No. 2, Park Street Station.

The installing of a tower bell striker in the tower of the Grammar School Building on Horton Street.

The purchase of 6000 feet of 2½-inch cotton rubber-lined hose.

The purchase of four new Fire Alarm boxes.

**To the Honorable Board of Water Commissioners for
the City of Lewiston:**

Gentlemen:—Herewith I have the honor to present the thirty-third annual report of the Water Works Inspector for the fiscal year ending Feb. 28, 1913.

My work during the year has been of a varied nature and much time has been given to leaks and vacant tenements. A brief summary of the work follows:

From Mar. 1 to Oct. 1, 1912, I inspected 360 rents and found 140 leaks in sink faucets, 341 leaks in closets and other fixtures which have been repaired after notice was sent from the office.

Have repaired 30 meters, assisted in installing 25 new meters and assisted in reading 1060 meters.

Have sealed 21 sill-cocks and removed seals from 15.

Have been employed in the office 88 days and have worked at Pumping Station 12 days.

On Oct. 1, 1912 I started a general house-to-house inspection and up to this date have inspected 1498 houses and other fixtures. I find that a great number of families let their fixtures remain open during cold weather which causes a great loss of water and incurs an extra expense to the department.

I have visited all vacant tenements when such were reported to the office, in order that proper abatements could be allowed.

At this time I wish to extend by thanks to the President, Superintendent, Clerk, and Members of the Water Board.

Report of the Superintendent of Water Works

To the Honorable Board of Water Commissioners for
the City of Lewiston:

Gentlemen:—I have the honor to present the thirty-third annual report of the Superintendent, showing the general condition of the works for the fiscal year ending February 28, 1913.

CONSTRUCTION

There has been a smaller amount of pipe laid on construction this year than for a number of years. The main pipe has been extended on Howard Street 186 feet of 6 inch with hydrant at the corner of Ash Street at a cost of \$221.50; on King Ave. 515 feet of 2 inch at a cost of \$187.18; on Montello Street 77 feet of 1½ inch and 66 feet of 1 inch at a cost of \$72.00; on upper Main Street 130 feet of 2 inch pipe to the last building on the left.

FIRE SERVICE

6 inch fire service at the Bates Street Co., corner Bates and Lowell Street.

RELAYS

On Skinner Street we relaid from end of 6 inch pipe at Bardwell Street to corner of Central Ave. 592 feet of 6 inch with hydrant; on Central Ave. 275 feet of 2 inch to line of building at a cost of \$740.25; on Strawberry Ave. 562 feet of 6 inch with hydrant to replace the old 1½ inch which was filled up with rust at a cost of \$582; on Granite Street 258 feet of 4 inch to replace the 1½ inch that was not large enough to supply the buildings that are there, at a cost of \$170.25; have taken out the old 3 inch pipe at City Hall and relaid with a 4 inch.

So in the future if the Committee on City Buildings think best they can put standpipe in the building or a fire curtain on the end and back side of the building, which I think ought to be done.

With the repairs at reservoir, painting the fence 235.00; new floor in gate house at reservoir at a cost of \$141.00; screen hoist at pumping station at a cost of \$85.27; repairing of the overflow at the pumping station of \$17.00; new gravel roof on the pumping station over the electric light department at a cost of \$258.28; work and supplies for the Municipal Ice Plant \$62.50; fire service at the pumping station \$261.13; one 20 inch gate and vault at corner of Main and Lincoln Sts. \$310.00; new

covering for pipe on bridges, 2 on Lincoln and 1 on Cedar \$179.00; painting 4 pipebridges \$56.28; the exchanging of the old Smith tapping machine for a new 8 inch machine; the purchasing of a No. 3 Mullar tapping machine at a cost of \$100, the relaying of 127 old services, 54 of which were under permanent streets; 67 new taps; the purchasing of 4,000 feet of 6 inch pipe at a cost of \$1,483.12; the purchasing of 6,000 feet of 1 inch lead lined pipe at a cost of \$1,367.55; the purchasing of 4,000 feet of 1 inch galvanized pipe at a cost of \$398.00; the purchasing of \$779.00 worth of meters. This with the monthly payroll, salary of superintendent and clerk, inspector and engineers at the pumping station and for all supplies makes the running expenses for the year \$23,777.44 as you will see by the clerk's report.

WHEELS

As is the custom, the water wheels were all looked over in the fall. The 34 inch Risdoms that run the Worthington pumps were in good condition. They have not caused any trouble except regular repairs, since put in five years ago. The 39 inch Risdom that runs the Dean pump for which we got the new racks and pinions will have to be repaired this season when the other repairs to the Dean pump are made that were contemplated last fall, but had to be put over until such time as the pump could be taken off duty.

PUMPS

Have put new cogs in one of the Worthington pump gears and a partial set in two others. There will have to be something done to them this season. There has not been anything done on the recommendations which were made last year in regard to changing them over, only I was instructed to visit Holyoke on my return from the Superintendent's Convention and which I did and got an estimate on what it would cost to change the gears only. The changing of the foundation and shaft and pinion gears would have to be made by an engineer from the factory, which I think ought to be looked into as early as possible as it costs considerable to keep the old gears up. Have taken both of the Worthington pump cylinders apart and put in 96 new valves. They are doing good work when you take it into consideration that they have been running 32 years. Nothing has been done on the Dean pump as yet on the repairs ordered by the board last fall on account of the lateness of the arrival of the

material to make the change before cold weather. As the pump cannot be spared only at certain times when the water consumption is the lowest which comes early in the fall or spring of the year, in April or May what repairs are done on the pumps will have to be made then.

PIPE LINE

Have had but very little trouble with the main pipe line this year. In February, 1912 a lead joint blew out of the 20 inch gate at the corner of Main and Lincoln Sts., made a temporary repair at that time, later in the season took the old 20 inch gate out and put in a new one with a by-pass, built a large brick vault around it, so that in the future if there is any trouble with it, it can be repaired without much bother. March 4th, 1913, the 6 inch pipe on Pettingill Street broke in two, repaired with a sleeve. Repaired three joints in the Lake Auburn supply in Howard's pasture, two on West Pitch and one at the Stone bridge, have replaced nine old gate boxes on the main gates and put in four new hydrants.

RESERVOIR

The rip-rapping at the reservoir ought to be repaired this season. There has been a new floor laid at the gatehouse at the reservoir and the fence has been painted.

METERS

There are 256 meters in use, 10 have been added this year, 54 have been changed for various reasons, 12 have been removed from buildings on account of fires, buildings being moved and the closing up of business.

6 inch fire service at the Bates Street Shirt Co., corner Bates and Lowell Streets.

RECOMMENDATIONS

There are a number of sections in different localities where the pipe is too small to supply the demand. I would recommend the relaying of all the small pipe in these places with larger pipe, especially on Holland Street which ought to be extended through to Winter about 1500 feet and on Spring Street from Holland on Spring 600 feet to Whipple.

PLUMBING

**Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Lewiston
as follows:**

Section 1. No plumbing shall hereafter be done on any pipes or fixtures for the use of water from the City Water Works, unless by a plumber licensed by the Board of Water Commissioners of said City. Said Board of Commissioners are authorized to grant and revoke licenses.

Sec. 2. Every plumber who shall set up any pipes or fixtures for the use of water from said City Water Works, or shall make repairs upon, additions to, or alterations of any pipes or fixtures set up previously thereto, shall within eight days after the same shall be completed, fill up and return to the Superintendent a report describing all fixtures, both old and new, for the use of water on the premises.

Sec. 3. For any misrepresentation or omission in the report of the work done, said plumber shall be liable to suspension or to have his license revoked by said board, and to pay a fine of not less than five or more than twenty-five dollars to be recovered in an action of debt, in the name of the Water Commissioners or City Treasurer before the Municipal Court of said City.

Sec. 4. Water from the Lewiston Water Works will be supplied hereafter only to pipes and fixtures that have been set up and completed and examined and tested by a plumber licensed by the Water Commissioners, and which have been fully enumerated and described in a report made by said plumber to the Superintendent, and approved by him or his inspector.

Sec. 5. If any plumber or person not duly licensed, shall set up any pipes or fixtures for the use of water from the Lewiston Water Works, or make any repairs upon, additions to, or alterations of any pipes or fixtures previously thereto set up, he shall forfeit and pay a sum of not less than five, nor more than twenty-five dollars, to be recovered by complaint, or in action of debt in the name of the Water Commissioners or the City Treasurer, before the Municipal Court of said City.

Finally passed and approved by City Council, March 15, 1881, and March 22, 1893.

SPECIAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

In all cases where the water is turned off at the request of the owner, or agent of the property, a charge of fifty cents shall be made, which amount must be paid before the water is turned on.

No discount will be made for vacant tenements or premises unless notice is given at the time of vacancy and the water shut off. In case two or more takers are supplied by the same service pipe seals will be attached to the fixtures not in use.

No charge will be made for water for extra persons above the limited number in family rates, in one and the same family—but in Boarding Houses and consolidated families, extra will be charged to the amount of fifty cents to each person above this limit of seven (7) persons.

No water motor shall be attached to any of the water pipes, without permission of the Water Board, and the Superintendent is authorized and instructed to shut off the water at once on premises where any violation of this rule occurs.

No person or persons using city water for motive power, shall sub-let to other parties.

No abatement shall be allowed on vacant tenements unless the tenements have been vacant two months or more. The vacancies for a less time of several tenements in the same building, owned by the same person, are not to be added together to make the requisite time (two months or more) for abatement.

All persons using meters are holden responsible for all damage to said meters occasioned by neglect, misuse, or freezing, and the Superintendent will cause printed slips to be placed upon all meters to this effect.

When bills are due and not paid within the limited time, the water shall be turned off for non-payment, unless the bills are under consideration by the Committee on Rates and Abatements.

NEW SERVICES

Pipe bills and water bills must be paid before the water is let on.

Sec. 9. The following regulations shall be considered a part of the contract with every person who takes the water, and every such person, by taking the water shall be considered to express his asset to be bound thereby. They shall be printed upon every bill for water

rent, and whenever any one of them is violated, the water shall be cut off from the building, or place of such violation, although two or more parties may receive water through the same pipe, and shall not be let on again, except by order of the Water Board, and on payment of two dollars; and in case of such violation the said Board shall have the right to declare any payment made for the water by the person committing such violation, to be forfeited, and the same shall thereupon be forfeited.

REGULATIONS

First. All persons taking water shall keep the service pipes within their premises, including any area beneath the sidewalk, in good repair and protected from frost at their own expense; and they shall be held liable for all damages which may result from their failure to do so.

Second. They shall prevent all unnecessary waste of water, and there shall be no concealment for the purpose for which it is used.

Third. No alterations shall be made in any of the pipes or fixtures inserted by the city, except by its agent, who is to be allowed to enter the premises supplied, to examine the apparatus, and to ascertain whether there is any unnecessary waste.

Fourth. No water is allowed to be supplied to parties not entitled to the use of it under the city ordinances, unless by special permission.

Fifth. The Clerk and Superintendent with the necessary agents and assistants, may enter the premises of any water taker to examine the quantity used and the manner of use, and to cut off the water for non-payment of rents or fines, or any violation of the foregoing rules.

Sec. 10. The occupants of any premises, when any unnecessary waste of water occurs, shall be liable to a fine of two dollars for the first offense and four dollars for the second offense during the same year, and shall be notified thereof in writing, and if such waste shall not be prevented and the fine aforesaid paid within two days from the time when said notice was given, the water shall be cut off from said premises, and shall not be again let on until the waste be stopped and a fine paid, together with the additional sum of two dollars for cutting off and letting on the water; and in case of a third or subsequent offense, the water shall be cut off, and shall not

again be let on, except by a vote of the Board and the payment of such fine, not exceeding ten dollars, as the Board may impose.

Sec. 11. The commissioners shall have power to establish such regulations as they may deem expedient for the introduction and use of water; and the water shall not be supplied to any building unless the pipes and fixtures shall be made conformable to said regulations.

Sec. 12. The water rates shall be fixed by the Commissioners, subject to the approval of the City Council.

Sec. 13. Any person considering his water rates excessive, may apply to said Board for a meter, to be set at his expense, and the amount of his rent may be determined thereby; and said Board may cause a meter to be attached to any premises where they have reason to believe that an unnecessary or fraudulent use of water is being made, and may assess rates upon such premises thereby.

Sec. 14. All water rates, except for building purposes, meter rates, lawn and street sprinklers, shall be due and payable at the office of said Board, quarterly, in advance on the first day of January, April, July and October. Meter rates will be due and payable at the same place on the first day of the succeeding quarter; and the rates for garden, lawn, and street sprinklers will be due and payable in advance, at the said office on the first day of April and July of each year.

The City Ordinance as adopted July 1, 1889, read under Sec. 10, Plumbing Laws, XII:

“Water-closets supplied with water otherwise than from a tank with flush pipe of at least 1¼-inch shall only be used with special permission of the Board of Health.”

Section 16. Any person who shall injure any public pipe or reservoir connected with the Lewiston Water Works, or who shall break and enter the same, or draw off, or cause to be removed any water therefrom, or shall turn off or on the water in any such water pipe or reservoir, or shall make an opening or connection with such pipe or reservoir or remove the cover of any hydrant, except in case of fire, without the license or permit of the Water Commissioners, or by authority of the Mayor and Aldermen, or Chief Engineer of the Fire Department, shall forfeit and pay for each offense not less than three nor more than twenty dollars.
