Opportunity For Boys And Girls To Write For Radio

A novel method of arousing interest in the early history of their native State is offered to Maine high school girls and boys by T. A. Huston & Co., the "Down East Bakers" of Portland, sponsors of the Maine Historical Sketches broadcast weekly on Thursday evenings from Station WCSH of The Eastland Hotel in this City.

T. A. Huston & Co., now observing its 60th anniversary, announced in its radio broadcast of Thursday evening the conditions of a contest in which three prizes will be offered to the three Maine high school boys or girls who submit the best authentic historical data concerning some outstanding historical or traditional episode in Maine's early days, suitable for radio dramatized presentation.

Prizes of \$25, \$15 and \$10 respectively will be paid for the three best papers submitted in the opinion of competent judges. The data desired may be written in narrative or essay form and must be suitable for dramatizing in radio presentation by a small cast of characters, such as the sketches being broadcast in the current Huston series from WCSH. The sponsors of the contest do not expect the high school contestants to prepare their material in dramatic or sketch form, but they do ask that such material contain the nucleus of an outstanding historical or traditional episode in Maine history, in which early Maine citizens played the principal parts.

Contestants will be given until March 1st to prepare and submit their material. The narratives or essays should be confined to 3,000 to 4,000 words if possible. They should be carefully written, though not necessarily typewritten. The facts contained in these stories of Maine history should be absolutely accurate and authentic as to history, names, places, dates, etc. Imagination should play no part in the writing, as fiction is not desired, only true and interesting historical record concerning Maine and its early peoples.

All stories or papers should be mailed to T. A. Huston & Co., at Portland, Me., to arrive not later than March 1, 1929.

The big bakery and candy factory of T. A. Huston & Co., which is to be constructed in this City, at the corner of Forest avenue and Bedford street, will be started as early in the Spring as the ground can be worked, according to the Moulton Engineering Corporation, the designers of the big factory.

There will be nothing like it in America, and it will be constructed along the most sanitary lines that could be devised, while light will be one of the paramount features of the structure.

To satisfy these conditions it was decided to build the new structure of concrete on account of the sanitary value of that material and on account of the light and ventilating facilities an enormous amount of window space has been arranged for in the structure.

It will be one of the show places in the way of a factory building of Maine and will be of all white enamel finish paint inside.

The machinery is to be of the most approved type and all of the latest and most up-to-date model, while a specialty is to be made of the gravity conveyors which are to be of a most intricate pattern, and the entire system will be most elaborate.

Especial provision for the help has been planned, there being a lunch room and rest room on the roof with ample space for a roof garden should this modern convenience be desired.

In the basement the space is to be devoted to a flour supply and storage room as well as a large amount of space which will be allotted to a refrigeration system.

On the first floor the general offices will be located and in addition to these the packing and shipping will also be carried out there.

On the second floor of the building the bakery department will have its packing room. In the candy department on this floor there will be a coating room, dipping room and a fancy packing room. The candy coating room on the second floor is especially insulated and the rooms are chilled in order to obtain an even coating for the candies.

Icing machines for fancy biscuits, the can room and firing room for the ovens, special bread baking rooms are to be located in the bakery department on the third floor, while there are also depositing machines for the marshmallows and dipping tables for special frostings to be found here. The centers are to be made in the candy department on this floor.

The ovens, mixing rooms, peeling and cutting machines where the dough is prepared and brought to the ovens automatically, are to be situated on the fourth floor. An important room in this section of the bakery is where all of the sponge goods are raised.

Hard candies and corn cakes are to be manufactured in the candy department.

On the fifth floor of the big building is to be located the flour room, where all of the flour will be seasoned, sifted and blended. The candy stock room is also to be nicely situated there, while the girls' rest room and the big restaurant for the employees takes up an important part of the top floor.

Something entirely new are the stairways in this building. They are designed under the trade name of Philadelphia Towers, and are to be entirely encased with concrete walls, which have double fire doors so that there can be a fire on any floor and yet the occupants can pass the fire without being exposed to it.

Reinforced concrete throughout is the style of construction and the building will have all metallic sash.
