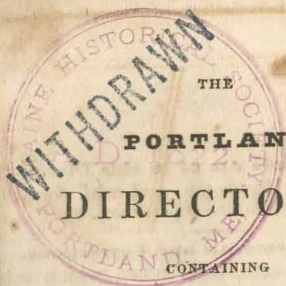
PORTLAND DIRECTORY.

CITY OF PORTLAND.

A brief sketch of the history of Portland, may not be an inappropriate preface to the following work. We shall therefore venture to occupy a few pages with such a notice.

Portland was originally a part of Falmouth; its Indian name was Machigonne: it was, however, more generally known in ancient times, as *Old Casco*, to distinguish it from New Casco, which was on the east side of Presumpscot river. It was afterwards successively designated by the English names, Cleeves' Neck, Munjoy's Neck, and Falmouth Neck, until they were all merged in its present corporate title. This Neck was first occupied by George Cleeves and Richard Tucker, who came from Plymouth, Eng. to the mouth of Spurwink river, in 1630; but finding the land which they had seized, claimed by a prior title, they moved to this neck in 1632. In January, 1637, Cleeves and Tucker purchased the territory of Sir Ferdinando Gorges, and were joined the same year, by Michael Milton. The latter married Cleeves' only child and commenced a settlement at the west end of the town, on Clark's point. Cleeves' and Tucker's residence was at the east end of the town, on broad bay.

Previous to the first Indian war, which broke out in 1675, and in which the settlement was entirely destroyed, but little progress had been made in population and improvement; Cleeves and Milton had died and Tucker had moved away; their places were supplied by George and John Munjoy, Thomas Brackett and Thaddeus Clark. The two latter had married daughters of Milton, and have perpetuated the family of the first settler, although his name is extinct.

After the peace which took place in 1678, the attention of government was turned to the Neck, as a suitable position for a garrison, and a strong frontier post. For this purpose, a fort was constructed at the foot of King street, and numerous house lots were laid out around it and granted to actual settlers; a meeting-house was erected on what is now called Jordan's point, in which the Rev. George Burroughs who was executed in 1692, at Salem, for witchcraft, preached, and the whole settlement as-

sumed a very flourishing aspect. Their hopes however, were doomed to be blasted by the second Indian war, which commenced in 1688. The population of the Neck at this time, was about 200, in other parts of Falmouth, it was a little rising 400. In 1690, the whole settlement was utterly laid waste, all the buildings destroyed, and the inhabitants entirely dispersed.

The town remained in this desolate condition until about 1716, when some of the old settlers and their descendants straggled back; they were soon joined by soldiers, who had been stationed in the vicinity and who were let loose by the peace. In 1718, twenty families had collected upon the Neck; in that year the town was invested with municipal powers, lands were distributed among the settlers and offered as an inducement to others to come among them, and although a check was given to their prosperity, by the Indian war of 1772, yet the settlement went steadily on, increasing in its population and resources. The inhabitants, however, were very poor for a number of years; in 1721, they erected the frame of a small meeting-house, on the corner of King and Middle-streets, which was not finished upon the outside and glazed, until 1726, and seats were not put into it until 1728. They had occasional preaching only, for the first nine years after their organization; the Rev. Thomas Smith was ordained in March, 1728, and from that time to the present, the parish over which he was settled, has never for a day, been destitute of a pastor. The Neck outstripped the other parts of the town, and became the centre of business; the lumber operations were very considerable and lucrative, and previous to the Revolution, the coasting and West India trade had become important branches of industry and wealth.

At the commencement of the revolutionary war, there were owned upon the Neck, 2,555 tons of shipping; the population was about 1900, occupying 230 houses. There were two flourishing religious societies, one Congregational, the other Episcopalian, and the whole character of the place was marked by enterprize and prosperity. But it was destined a third time to be prostrated by the ravages of war. In 1775, it was destroyed by a British fleet; in this catastrophe, 136 of the principal houses were burnt, together with a new court-house, the Episcopal church, and the town-house. The loss of the inhabitants in this cruel visitation was over £54,000.

After the war was at an end, the favorable location of the place and the spirit of the people revived the fortunes of the town, with great rapidity. Within nine years after the peace, 234 dwelling houses were erected, several of which were of brick, the population had advanced to 2500, and trade increased in similar proportion. In 1786, the Neck was incorporated as a separate town, under its present name, and although then the smallest town in the State, in point of territory, it surpassed all others in the number of its vessels, and its commercial activity.

The growth of the town from this period until 1807, when restrictions were imposed upon our commerce, was almost unexampled. The amount of tonnage from this port, which in 1789 was but 5000 tons, had increased in 1807, to 39,000 tons, and the amount received for duties, had advanced from \$8,000 to \$346,000. The effects of that disastrous policy on a town supported like ours, wholly by foreign commerce, may easily be conceived; so severe a shock was given to it, that it required many years to revive its credit and prosperity. But the enterprize and vigor of the people could not be permanently depressed; after the peace of 1815, the old channels of trade were revisited, and new ones opened, with still increasing success, and at this time, a bright sun of promise pours his genial beams upon our flourishing community. The quantity of shipping in 1830, was 43,071 tons, and in 1832, there were owned in this port, 412 vessels, employing 2,700 seamen, of which were *registered*, 28 ships, 90 brigs and 12 schooners; *enrolled and licensed*, 12 brigs, 203 schooners, 33 sloops and 3 steam boats. The population too, has advanced in a similar ratio: in 1790, it was 2,240; 1800, 3,704; 1810, 7,169; 1820, 8,581; 1830, 12,601.

In 1828, an inconvenience being supposed to exist in the management of town affairs, under the old system of government, an attempt was made to obtain the consent of the inhabitants to adopt a city form. The project did not succeed at this time, but by persevering efforts, the measure was at length accomplished, and a city charter was procured in 1832, and the government, consisting of a Mayor, 7 Aldermen and 21 Common Councilmen, was duly organized under it in April, of the same year.

The number of religious societies in the city, are 15, divided as follows, viz.: 4 Congregationalists, 1 Baptist,

2 Methodists, 2 Christians, 1 Episcopalian, 1 Friends, 1 Universalist, 1 Swedenborgian, 1 Roman Catholic, and 1 of colored people, called the Abyssinian society ; all these, except the Swedenborgians, have convenient houses for public worship. In addition to these, there is an elegant church for seamen.

There are established in the city, 7 local Banks and a Branch of the U. S. Bank. The local banks employ a capital of \$1,310,000 and have a loan of nearly \$2,000,000. The loan of the Branch bank is from \$700,000 to \$800,000.

Portland is pleasantly situated on a neck of land extending to Casco bay, between Fore, or Casco river and Cove, which makes up in the rear of the town ; and is nearly surrounded by water ; its length is 3 miles and its average width is 3-4 of a mile. The location is calculated to exhibit the town very favorably to one approaching from the sea, as the buildings rise between two hills, in the form of an amphitheatre. The access to it by sea is easy, and its harbor spacious and safe. It has a water communication with the country, to a distance of nearly 50 miles, by the Cumberland and Oxford Canal, and it is the nearest sea-board market for the rich and beautiful country on the upper waters of the Connecticut river, through the Franconia and White mountain notches, and from Lancaster, north of the White mountains, over a more level road. Let but the spirit and enterprize of her people in opening new avenues from our interior, and in offering inducements for trade, but equal the local advantages of our city, and who may predict its future destinies and glory ?

Portland Benevolent Society.

The Portland Benevolent Society is, next to the Marine Society, the oldest Charitable institution in the city. It was incorporated in 1803, and a subscription of \$6000 was obtained to establish a fund. But owing to the commercial embarrassments of that day, many of the subscribers not only failed to pay the amount subscribed, but actually became beneficiaries of the Society. The late worthy Samuel Freeman was its leading and most efficient patron—The present fund is about \$4000—the income of which, with such other means as the Society can obtain, is annually distributed among the meritorious poor of the town, reference being had in the distribution to those who have seen better days. The charity is conducted by a President, Vice President, Treasurer, Secretary & seven Managers, elected from different religious Societies. The present officers are the Rev. Elijah Kellogg, President, Rev. I. Nichols, Vice president, Wm. Swan, Treasurer, and Wm. Willis, Secretary.

Maine Historical Society.

The Maine Historical Society holds its annual meeting at the Atheneum, in Portland, on the 3rd Wednesday in January. The object of the institution is, to collect and preserve such interesting matters of fact rela-

ting to the history, resources & character of our State, as may be valuable to the present and a future age. One volume of their collections has already been published, which is spoken of as highly honorable to the Society. The Officers are Rev. I. Nichols, President, Parker Cleaveland, corresponding Secretary, Wm. Willis, Recording Secretary & Treasurer, Samuel P. Newman, Librarian and Cabinet keeper.

The Portland Marine Society

Portland Atheneum.

This institution was incorporated in March 1826. The proprietors having purchased the Portland Library, which was commenced in the year 1765. From that period to the incorporation of the Atheneum, it received a gradual increase, when it was united with the property of another association, and assumed its present name and character. The following extract from Willis's History of Portland, will furnish further particulars rel-

ative to this valuable institution, which is now kept over the Canal Bank, in Union Street:—

“The plan of the Atheneum was favorably received by our inhabitants; one hundred and thirty-three persons became proprietors at \$100 a share, and the first year of its operation there were, in addition to the proprietors, ninety-four subscribers to the Reading Room at \$5 a year. Under these auspicious circumstances, large commercial and literary reading rooms were opened on the first of Jan. 1827, supplied with the principal commercial newspapers of the country and periodical publications at home and from abroad. The library also received a very valuable addition by the importation from England and France of rare and standard works at an expense of about \$1500. Additions have since been annually made to the library, which in proportion to its size, is one of the most valuable in the country, containing a large number of the best works in literature and science, and the periodical literature of the last half century; the institution is an honor and an ornament to the town, and well entitled to the encouragement and support of its intelligent citizens. The above table gives the average temperature at Portland, 43 1-3 degrees, nearly.

In the course of the above 14 years, the number of days that the mercury has descended below zero, are in the several Januaries, 59 times; in Februaries, 32; in March, 8; and in Decembers 12. During the same space of time, the mercury has been at or above 90 degrees—in the different Mays, 3 times; in Junes, 5; in Julys, 23; in Augusts, 6; in Septembers, twice. On July 12, 1825, the mercury arose to 100 degrees in the shade, the highest point ever before recorded for Portland; and the lowest degree ever indicated by the same Thermometer, was 24 degrees below zero, on the 1st of February, 1826.

WARDS,

AS DIVIDED AND ESTABLISHED BY THE SELECTMEN IN PURSUANCE OF "AN ACT ESTABLISHING THE CITY OF PORTLAND."

No. 1.—From the foot through the centre of King to Congress St.—thence on the centre of Congress to Franklin St.—thence on the centre of Franklin St. to Back Cove. All N. & E. of these lines including the Islands, constitute Ward No. 1.

No. 2.—Runs from Fore River, through the centre of Deer to Middle St.—thence through the middle of Church, Federal, School, Congress, and Wilmot Streets, to Back Cove, including all between these and the bounds of the 1st Ward.

No. 3.—Consists of all the Inhabitants S. & W. of the bounds of No. 2, running through the centre of Exchange, Court, Congress, and Myrtle Streets, to Back Cove.

No. 4.—Embraces all S. & W. of Ward No. 3, through the middle of Centre, Congress, and Elm Streets, to Back Cove.

No. 5.—Extends S. & W. from the preceding line to Deering's Bridge, up through the centre of Green, Cumberland, and Oak Streets—across Main, Free, and Spring, to Pleasant Streets—and through that to Centre Street.

No. 6.—Includes all above the preceding line to the middle of State Street, running from Fore River to Main Street—down that to Harding's Court—through the centre of which, and on the same line, across the new county road to Westbrook line.

No. 7.—All to the westward of the above described line.

This Directory contains the names of upward of 3000 persons—of whom about 256 are laborers—220 mariners—209 dealers in W. I. Goods—145 Joiners—131 Shipmasters—100 cordwainers—48 blacksmiths—45 dealers in dry Goods—45 masons—42 truckman—23 teamsters—42 Shipcarpenters—13 dealers in Shoes—20 tailors—16 Auctioneers—2 gunsmiths—and 376 widows. The latter item falls far short of the reality. The gentlemen who canvassed a part of the city were not particular on this head.

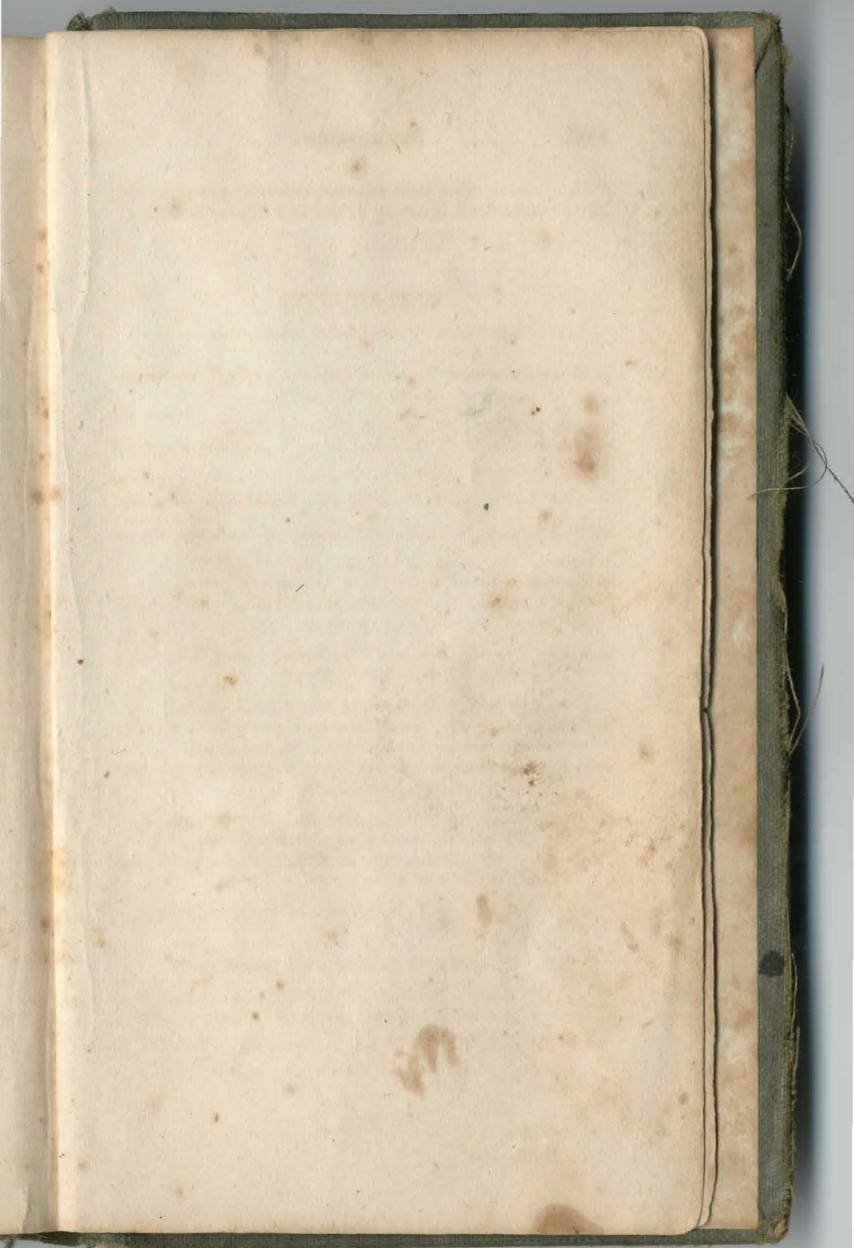

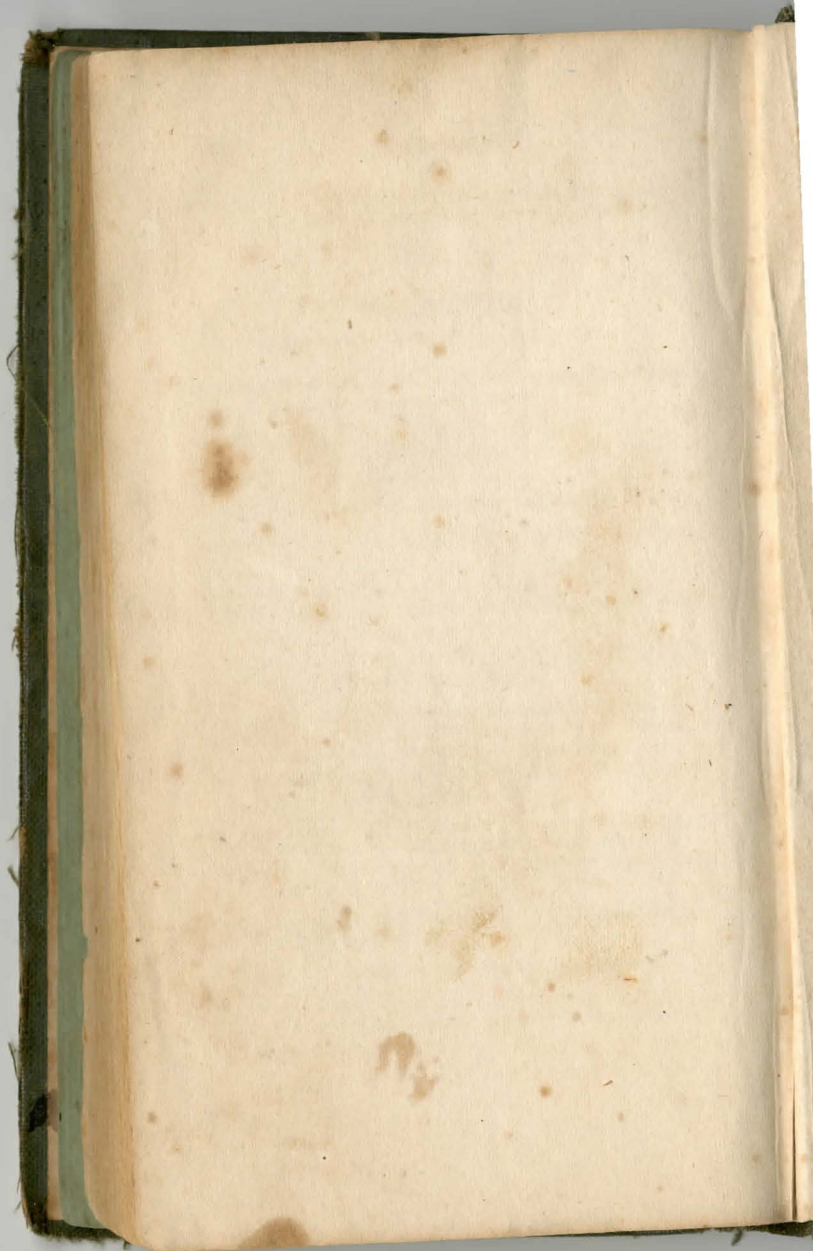
