 Sept 22<sup>d</sup> 1898

Dear papa:—

You wanted me  
 to let you know if I had money

 a half. My board for eight  
 weeks was twenty six dollars.  
 I have had to pay about two  
 dollars out for note books and  
 drawing materials. The only  
 money besides this that I have



was yesterday. I went to the  
Gorham Fair. All the Normal  
scholars had half fare tickets  
and Grace, Eunice and I  
walked up to the grounds  
on the railroad. The grounds  
are about a mile from the  
village. We saw Mr. Porter  
but I don't think he knew  
who we were but he spoke to  
us. I saw Marion and Marthy  
Blanchard there and I guess  
that was all the ones I knew.

We came home on the train.  
The ride was free from  
the grounds to Gorham and  
the train was so long that
