Announcement #1 (Rockland):

Maine Community Foundation Awards Grant to Out!...As I Want To Be

The Equity Fund of MCF recently awarded \$7500 to Out!...As I Want To Be to hire a part time staffer to establish collaborative relationships with other youth oriented organizations and the community, and to launch a significant fundraising effort for the future. Dora Lievow was hired in February.

Out!...As I Want To Be has been serving young people on an all-volunteer basis for fifteen years. Known as Outright for its first ten years, Out! is a resource for Gay, Lesbian, Bi-sexual, Transgender, Queer and Questioning (GLBTQ) youth aged 14 – 22 and their parents and allies. From the website: “Our programs and activities are driven by the needs, ideas, and energy of youth, who participate fully in decision-making at every level. At our weekly meetings; make new friends, see old friends, talk, laugh, play games, see movies, learn about GLBTQ life, discuss serious and not-so-serious issues.” The group also has a myspace page.

Coordinator Lis Clark and a rotating group of advisors provide a safe space two evenings a week (Wednesdays, 5 – 8pm, Fridays, from 6 – 9 pm) at Out’s cozy office upstairs at 501 Main Street. Together, young people and an advisor prepare a meal served family style around a large table. Conversation and support is informal and comes as much from other young people, who are often isolated during their days at Rockland, Belfast, Mt. View, Camden, Medomak Valley, or George’s Valley high schools.

Lievow, in her former role as founder and director of The Community School’s residential program in Camden, has been familiar with the needs and strengths of GLBTQ teens. “My affinity with Out!’s mission is strong. And what could be more gratifying than to apply the skills I gleaned at The Community School to another critical resource for young people. Not only can I draw on our success in the organizational development of the School, but I can recall our mistakes and lessons learned!”

Lievow will be setting up meetings with the staff of non-profits and will be working with GLBTQ young people to offer presentations to service groups, churches, and high schools. To contact Lievow through Out, go to the website at www.outmaine.org.

Opinion #1:

An open letter to the GLBTQIA community:

The community is all of us – no matter what letter of the alphabet or what box we choose or are put into by everyone else. Last November, the community suffered a ballot defeat on one issue that seemed to be one that caused disagreement both within the community and outside it. That defeat was at the hands of voters, primarily in rural Maine communities, most of whom seemed to vote the way they did because they do not know (or do not think that they know) any members of our community. The vote was about “those people.” The result of the vote was due to ignorance. The issue at stake for the entire community is not really same-sex marriage – the vote on Question One in November was a symptom of our problem, not the cause. The issue is the right of the entire community to live a life free from interference by others’ ignorance. That ignorance will continue to arise again and again in battles against our fundamental civil rights unless we are able to do something to combat it. There are some things that we can do. One of those things is to get to know those people who think that they do not know any of us. Another is to work together to help each other, not in competition against each other.

Maine used to have a program in which members of our community talked to others about our experiences of discrimination and life to others who may not have ever met someone like us. With that program our individual stories were told and heard. People who thought they did not know someone from our community realized we are all around them. Today, that program is no longer in existence – except for youth speaking to other youth in a school setting – because the (non-GLBTQIA owned or operated) corporation that had acquired it lost the grant that operated it and declined to fund it out of their own budget. As long as our stories are not being told, ignorance will continue. We need to talk to our neighbors. We need to take up the work that had been done by this program. We need to continue to reach out, speak out, and help other Maine citizens and voters who are not part of our community learn our stories and faces. As we tell our stories and make connections other Mainers may begin to realize that we are just like them and just want to be treated equally and respected, as all humans ought to be.

The second thing that we can do – and need to do – is to cooperate with one another. We need to create an environment of cooperation, rather than one of competition. That means that organizations need to stop

purposely excluding others from events. They need to stop protecting information and worrying about territory. We need to learn to work together in order to accomplish our common goals. We need to emphasize our community, not fundraising. Cooperation means not only working together, but also listening to one another. This means that organizations need to learn from the experience of all – not simply issue directives from one part of the state while minimizing the experiences of others. Organizations that purport to represent all of us need to listen to other organizations – and to individuals – before making decisions that affect all of us, statewide. As long as we fail to cooperate, we will be a fractured community. If we are fractured, it is easy for those against us to target one or two of the “letters” in our community. We all need to work together to keep this from happening. If we do not, we are all going to lose more than the right to marry. We are going to lose our right to be.

CAVEATS:
