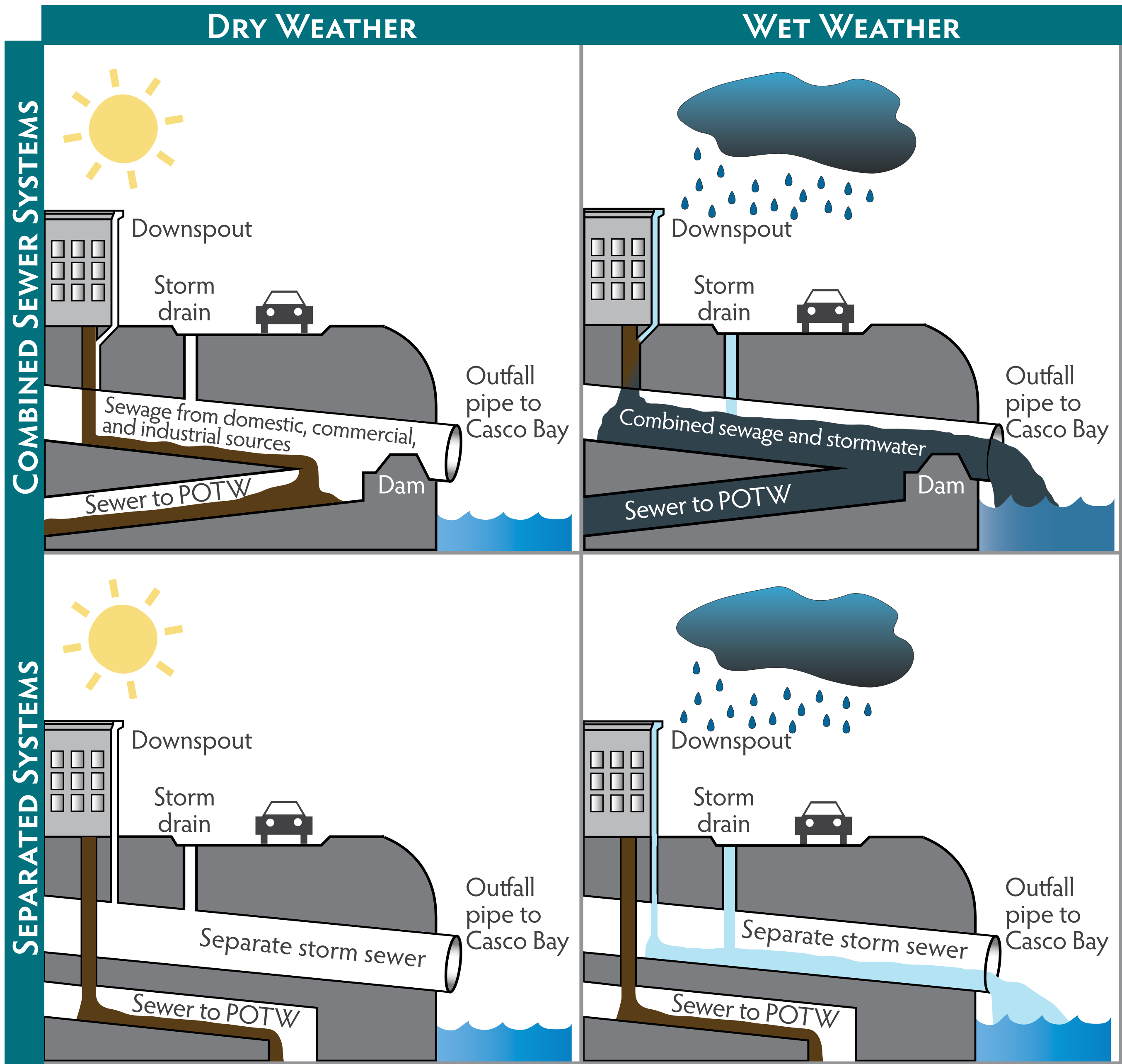
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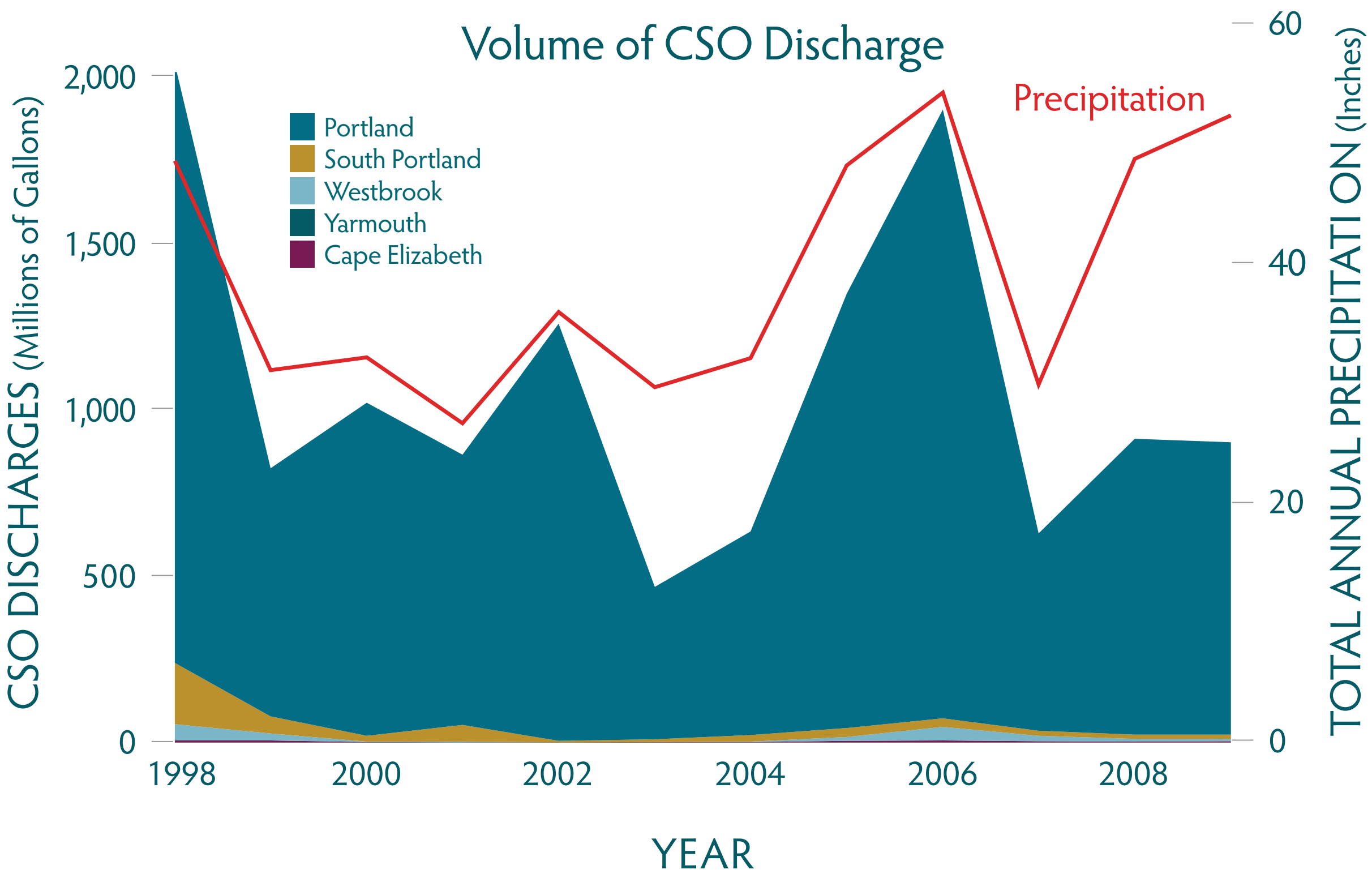

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Combined Sewer Overflows (CSOs)



In **combined sewer systems** stormwater mixes with sewage, which can overwhelm sewer systems and sewage treatment systems, leading to discharges to Casco Bay. In **separated systems**, stormwater and sewage are never mixed, eliminating the problem. “POTW” is publicly owned treatment works.



- Over the last two decades, the number of CSO outfalls across the watershed has dropped from 80 in 1990 to 45 at the end of 2009.
- Despite community efforts at CSO reduction, total CSO discharges have not dropped consistently over the past decade (see graph above) because recent years have been especially wet.
