Dear Ernest:-

It is raining quite hard. I have just got home from meeting. Eunice has got to Portland to spend Sunday with Captain Webster so I am staying with Grace. I saw the marriage of Frank Farwell in the Argus this morning where is he going to live?

Last night after school I went down to the Station with the girls and after they had gone we went down to Frederic Robie Field and saw part of a ^{football} game. They had

been playing a little while when
we got there. The Goshams beat the
Westbrooks 29 to 0. Just before
we got there they carried one fellow
off of the field to a house near by.
I guess he was not hurt very bad.
How did the game at home come
off? We had a great time last night.
A good many of the girls stayed
down in the library and sang
until nearly nine and then
we had a flash light taken
in Grace's room.

Yesterday we had rhetorical
exercises and one of the girls
spoke, "Dot my Fritz," and after she
got through Prof. Conther got and
said they might stop there and
that hereafter they might have

English pieces. This girl had
practiced on the piece and
rehearsed it to me of the other
teachers so there was quite a
stir. The teacher who had
charge of these exercises went
home and so did the girl
who spoke the Dutch piece.

Friday noon we had some
pie that no one could eat
it was made out of some
cranberry sauce that we could
not eat the night before.
Some of the girls got mad and
so they went around and got at
many of the girls as they could
and said they were going to
complain to the matron. They
tried to get the girls to go but

them all into the library after
dinner yesterday. Prof. Corbett
was awful mad about it.

I have seen him now when
he was mad but I don't
think he would kill anybody.
