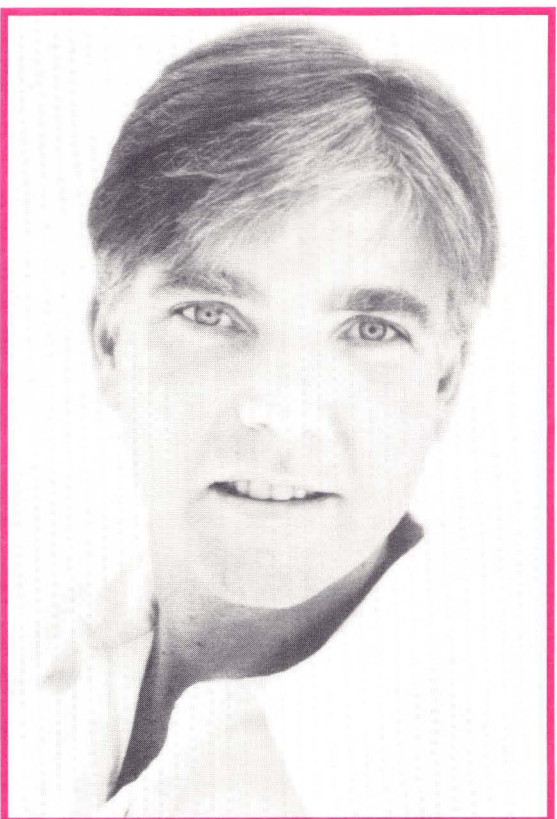

The Moral Wisdom of Queer People about Sex, Power, and Pleasure: On the eve of Valentine's Day, Marvin M. Ellison, a social ethicist and co-chair of the Religious Coalition Against Discrimination, will share insights from his recent book *Erotic Justice: A Liberating Ethic of Sexuality*. Lesbian feminist theologian Carter Heyward describes this as "the best book I've read on sexual ethics" and a "deeply intelligent resource for every person who struggles to understand the causes of the sexual crisis we share and how we might envision and embody a better way."

February 27 - Finding a Job:
Resumes, Interviews and Being G/L/B/T

What does a resume look like, anyway? And when you're writing it, do you talk about being *gulp* gay? Do you bring a picture of your partner to your interview? Larry Bliss is the Director of Career Services at the University of Southern Maine. March 13 It's Elementary

A feature-length documentary which challenges the censorship of the topic of homosexuality in school curricula. Directed by Debra Chasnoff, the film shows what happens when teachers address lesbian and gay issues in the classroom. The film won Best Documentary at the 1996 San Francisco and Chicago International Lesbian and Gay Film Festivals, and premiered in over 30 cities in October 1996.
