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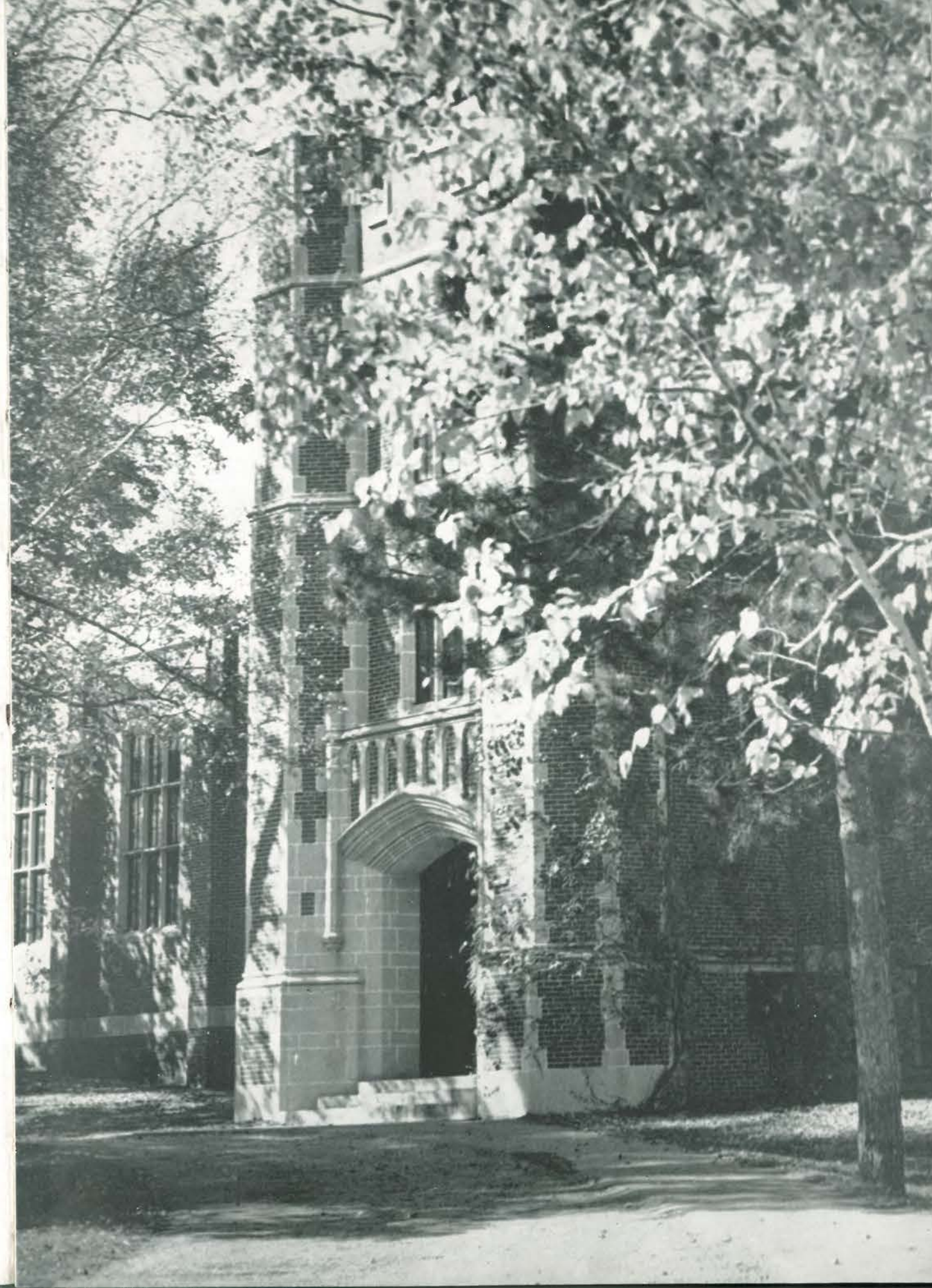

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A TRIBUTE TO OUR TOWERS OF LEARNING



"I like a tower,
It speaks of strength, of might, of power—"
The Honorable Frederick Robie, in his dedication
speech, said of these hilltop towers in 1879,

"Towers of this character, so conspicuous, become public monuments, which indicate the sentiment of the people—they inspire the beholder with confidence in the future."

For many years the bell of Corthell tower rang out its call to learning to the surrounding countryside. The bell itself is no longer heard, but the call to the eager mind has never been stilled. The tower itself has grown, from the first two-year normal school to the present four year college. And with each succeeding year the echoes have carried farther as Gorham Alumni, not only in Maine but also in distant states and nations, have taught little children and brought honor to their alma mater.

Today we look at these towers—the front tower, with its pyramidal roof, a long journey from Egypt and the cradle of learning—these Gothic replicas with the ground plan representing the cross—which now have served for three-quarters of a century. It is a short time in comparison with the long interval mankind travelled descending from the heights of Palestine and Greece and into the depths of the Dark Ages, and slowly up the winding stairs again. The outlook today is disquieting, but





so has it ever been to men of penetration. All times have been troubled to the people living in them. But the lesson of the past is that man may use his God given mind to profit by the experience of the race and to adapt to new problems.

Never before in the history of man has a peacable world order dedicated to the well-being of all individuals been such a vigorous dream. Never before has so much depended upon a single generation of humble teachers—not upon the few great world leaders. These have already made the blueprint. Now the job is that of the teachers of the little children. For education is admittedly the only instrument effective for lasting peace. World wide education of all individuals, and furthermore their complete education, the wholesome development of mind *and* body *and* spirit is the great job calling to us.

Again we look to our towers for inspiration, for realization, of their significance to a struggling world. With Edward Weston, who wrote the hymn to Corthell, we sing,



"Wave the bright banner from steeple and tower;
Open we here on the rock a new fountain,
Fountain of wisdom and knowledge and power."
With Channing we say,
"She still is there, the guardian on the tower,
To open for the world a purer hour."

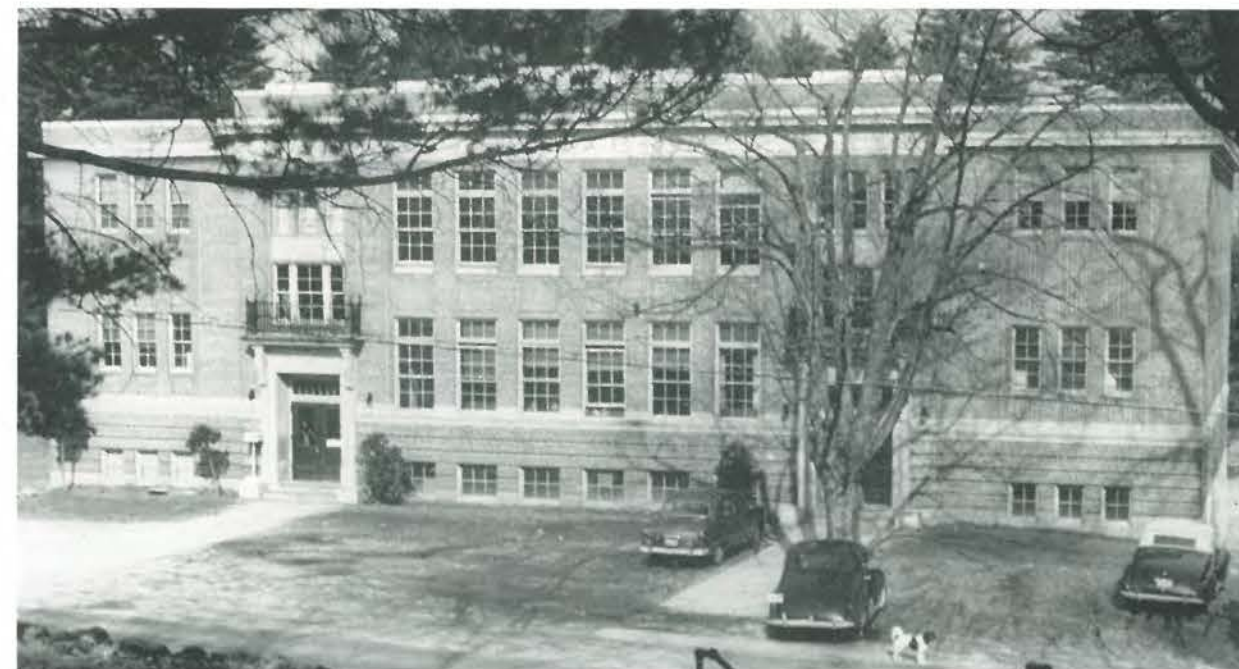

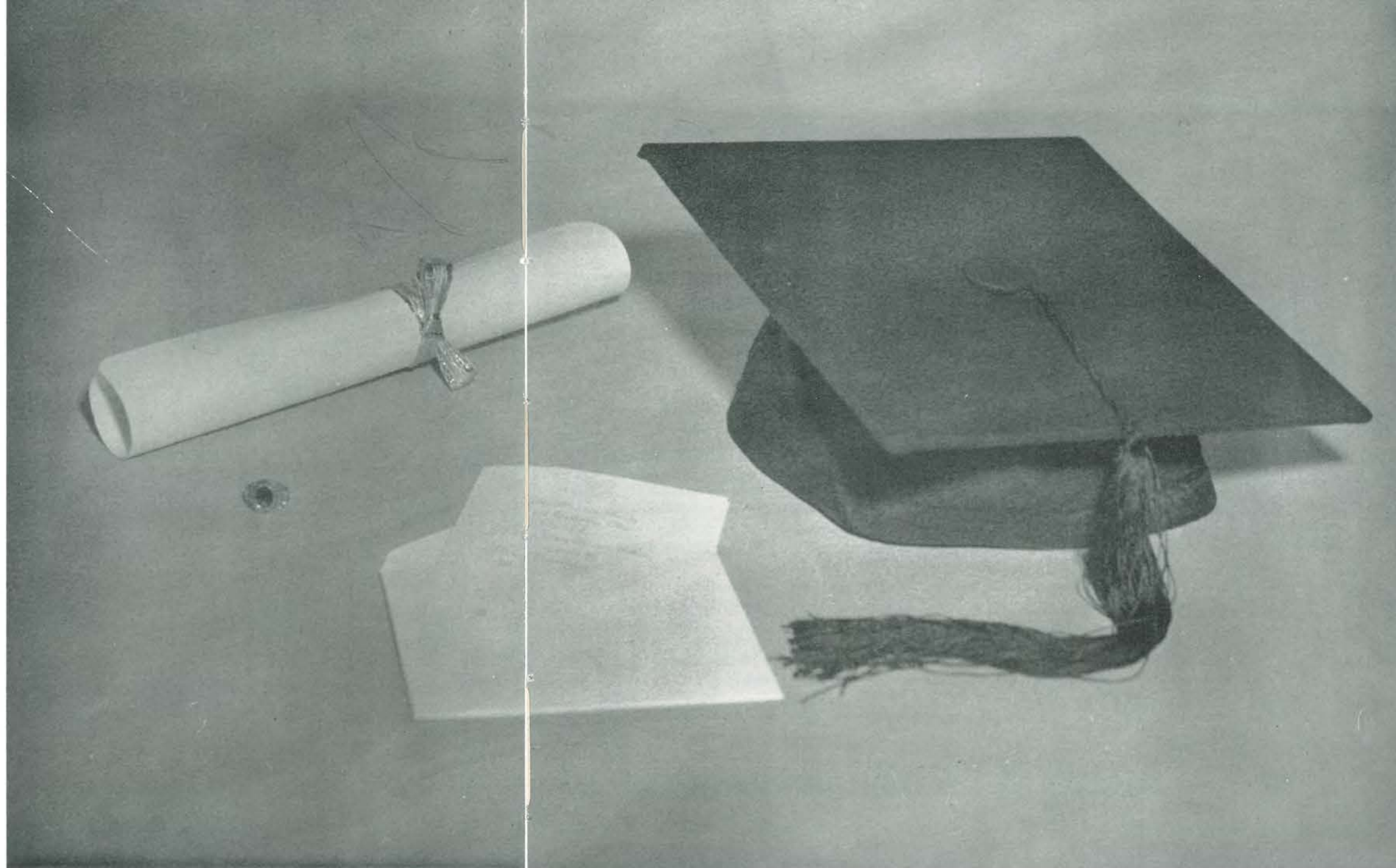

SENIOR HISTORY

If anyone were to name us—the class of '51—they would have to call us the “experimentalists.” We arrived at school in September 1947, 120 strong, raring to go. Where, we weren't sure. We had come from diverse places and for diverse reasons, some conflicting, some conforming but all backed by an exuberance not found in previous classes.

We were restless, filled with contradictions and the officers we chose our freshman year (Robert Greaney, President; Albert Hague, Vice President; Carolla Haglund, Secretary; and Charles Andre, Treasurer) reflected this. We took to dramatics as a thirsty dog to water—lapping it up. Our students filled the casts. Remember “Arsenic and Old Lace”? En masse we lived with the conviction Our Class had something to give and we were going to give it or “bust.” It got us into trouble but it taught us things. It widened our horizons.

Back again we came our sophomore year, in full glory, armed to the teeth, rebels to fight in the battle of modernism. But crafty rebels, for our class had split and our officers (R. Greaney, President; V. Landberg, Vice President; H. Knight, Secretary; and D. Johnson, Treasurer) again showed us a picture of ourselves. We rose to heights and we flopped to depths (i.e., Little Minister). Our class filled the offices in the Campus Clubs. Charlie Andre was president of Outing Club, Bob Greaney, president of Newman Club and Vic Landberg was president of Y. M. C. A. We overran athletics. Remember Pete Hansen and Charlie Andre? We lost some class members, we got married, we conformed and we rebelled with the same restless energy, we had shown in our freshman year.

Our Junior year came! We accepted new ideas, argued pro and con about the split between U. S. and Russia, pacifism and militarism, to study or not to study. But regardless of the side or point of view, the world had better change and meet us. Strong in our convictions, we were nevertheless changing. It might help to conform a bit, now and then. Not too obviously, you know!

Vic Landberg supplanted R. Greaney as President, Mary Sawyer became Vice President and Nancy LeSueur and Beverly Merchant, Secretary and Treasurer, respectively. We rolled “’em” in the aisles with “And the Villain Still Pursued Her,” a mustache twirling melodrama. Nancy LeSueur outdid herself in “Our Hearts Were Young and Gay.” Betsey Cooper hit the top on the House Committee and Helen Stevens was chosen to represent Gorham at the Atlantic Sea Coast Teachers' College Conference at New York. This too was the year, we were on our “honor” to attend Chapel. Oh! but we were good! True there was a senior class and it was perhaps older and wiser by a year but only now and then did our blase attitude slip—to the pleasure of our teachers and our own amazement!

Then came our senior year. Something happened! A metamorphosis perhaps? This world was in a terrible state, something has to be done about it and we've got to do it. We united! What! a split in our ranks? Heaven forbid. We voted Lennie White, President; Barksdale Macbeth, Vice President; Grace Curtis, Secretary; and Mary Sawyer, Treasurer. We had a terrific queen campaign and Barb Wyman won. David Johnson was our representative to the Sea Coast Teachers' College Conference. Rose Maxwell was President of Dramatic Club. We did our practice teaching and came back to tell the class about our experiences “out in the field.” But everything took on the air of unreality. The Korean War was on! Our classmates were being called and we were helpless. We worried about anti-communist laws and what it would do to our democracy. What could we do? Teach! And we will. No future wars for us and we'll be the best teachers ever!

THE INDUSTRIAL ARTS DEPARTMENT

During the past four years we have seen a considerable number of changes in this department. Our director of Industrial Arts, Mr. Arthur I. Martin and Mr. John Mitchell, Instructor of Metalworking came to Gorham with us in September 1947. The following year Mr. Ralph E. Duso, Instructor of Electricity came to the college. Along with Everett S. Packard, Instructor of General Shop and Graphic Arts and Mr. Lawrence N. Cilley, Instructor of Woodworking and Drafting, the staff is now the largest in the history of the department. With such a staff it is now possible to offer an elective course such as other industrial arts teacher training departments do.

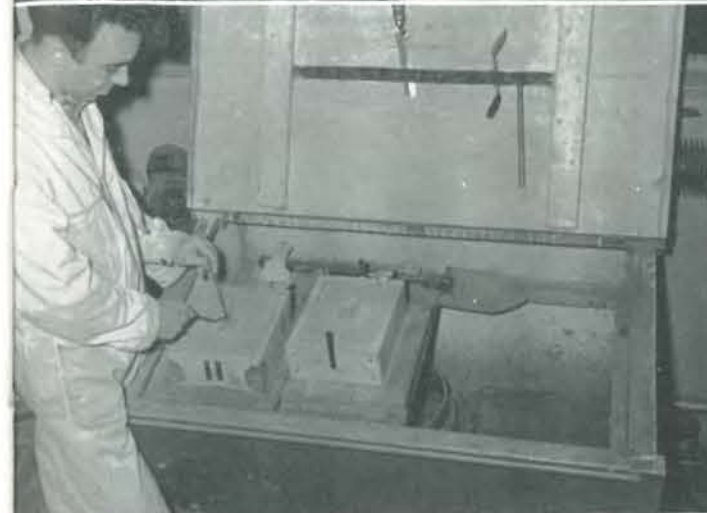
An increase in the size of the staff is not the only improvement in the past four years. The department has been streamlined and new shops added. The new building directly behind the dormitory is a war-surplus one and was moved to Gorham in sections and erected in time for classes to occupy it at the beginning of the second semester of the 1947-48 school year.

The brick building between the Academy building and the new building has been completely reorganized into a Comprehensive General Shop. This is a four area shop that is equipped to give the students first-hand experience in the type of shop that is rapidly becoming the most common in the state. The area studied are Woodworking, Metalworking, Electricity and Transportation. Gorham and South Windham Junior High School students also use this shop for their industrial arts work under the direction of the senior student teachers.

The Academy building houses the woodworking and the electricity shops. The electrical laboratory and classroom and electronics room have been reorganized this year and color-dynamics applied. The woodworking shop is next on the list for color-dynamics. Practically all the reorganizing and painting has been done by the students.

Under the watchful eye of a qualified critic teacher we did our off-campus student teaching our senior year. We were assigned to a shop and conducted classes for a full semester. Visitation by Mr. Martin and Mr. Duso kept us in touch with the campus.

Few colleges offer the complete industrial arts course that we have studied. We have taken forty-one subjects during the four years with the number of class periods per week averaging about 26 out of a possible 28. These subjects were presented to us by instructors who have not only lectured to us about the profession but showed us how to apply ourselves by being a fine example of what they believed in. Having taken this course we feel much better fitted to aid youngsters to become honest and likeable citizens of the future as well as being able to present "a school subject which is organized and offered for its general educational values so that an understanding of our practical arts heritage and modern industrial conditions might grow out of it."

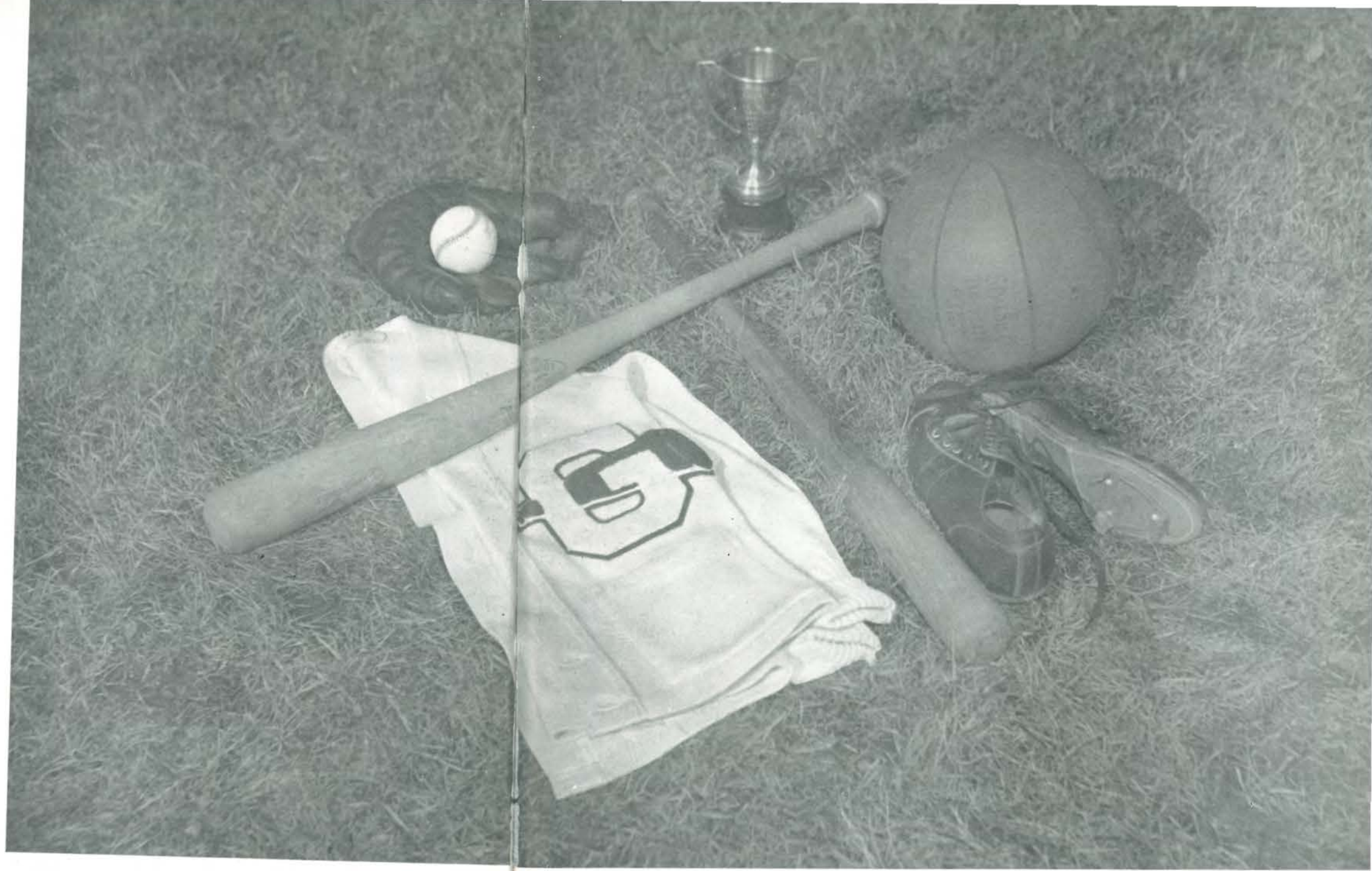

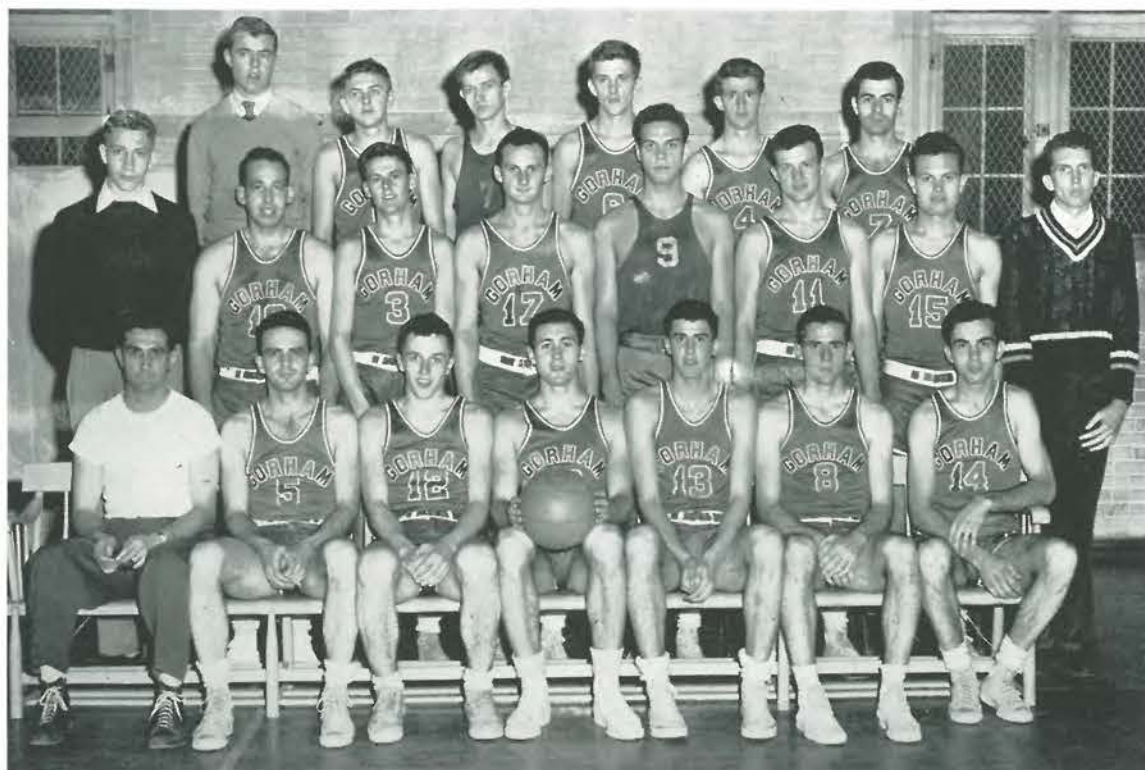

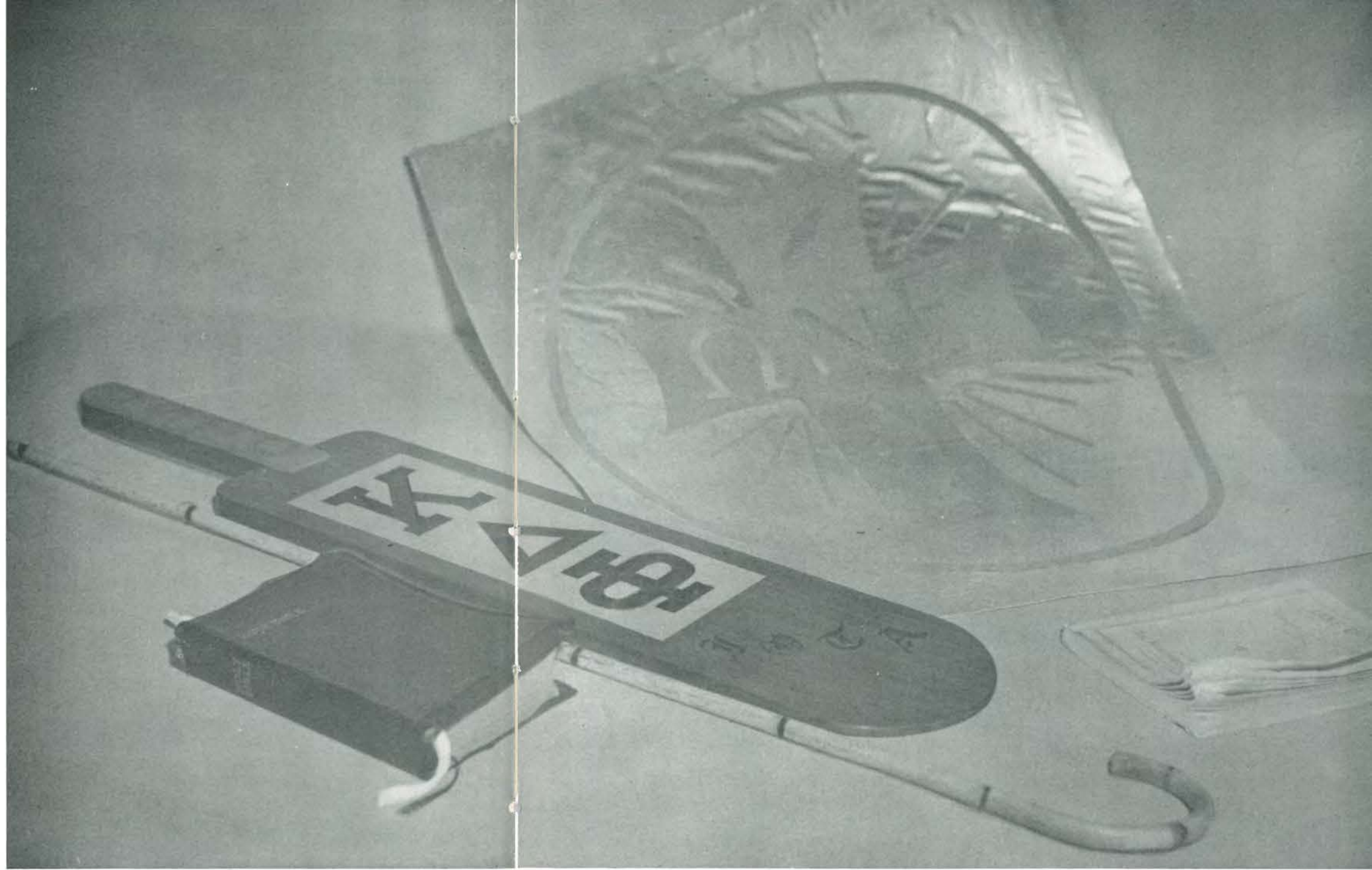

The girls meet every other Monday evening in the East Hall Reception Room. Various teas and other social activities are planned throughout the year.

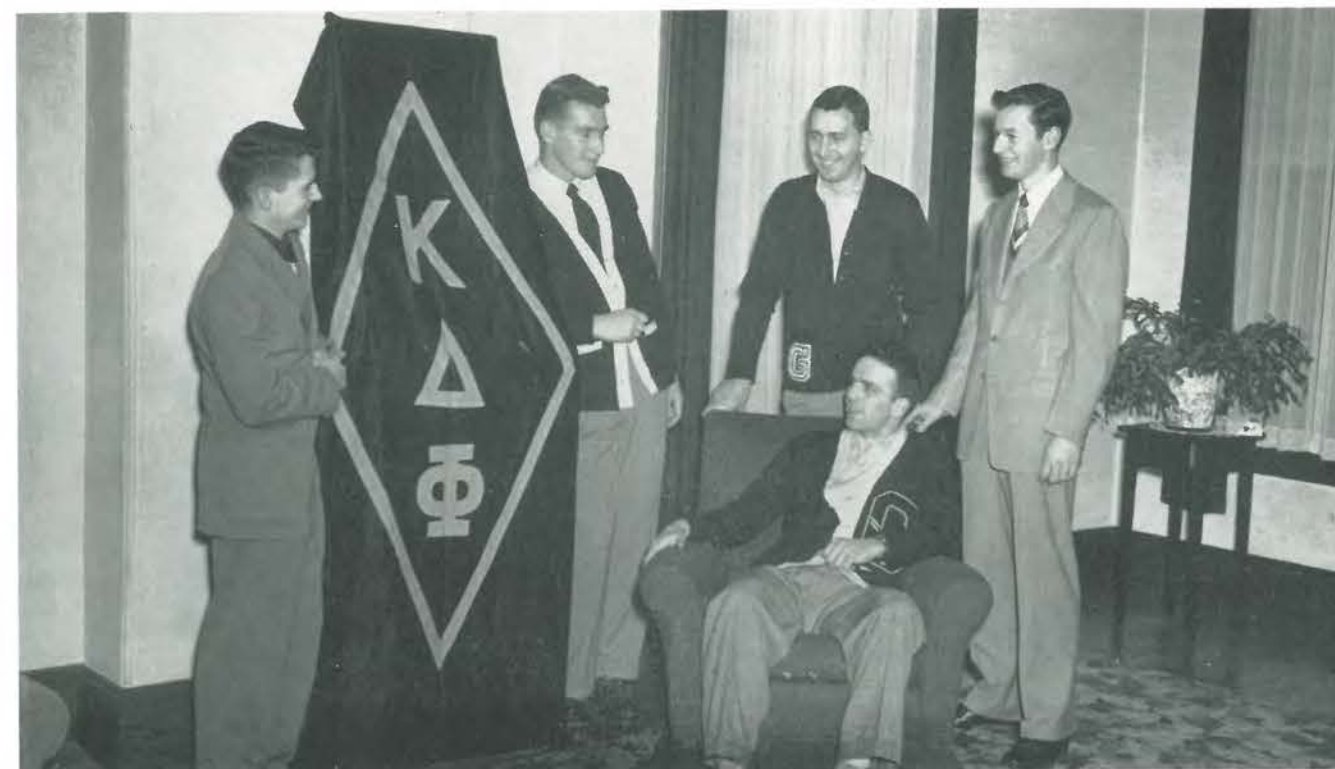

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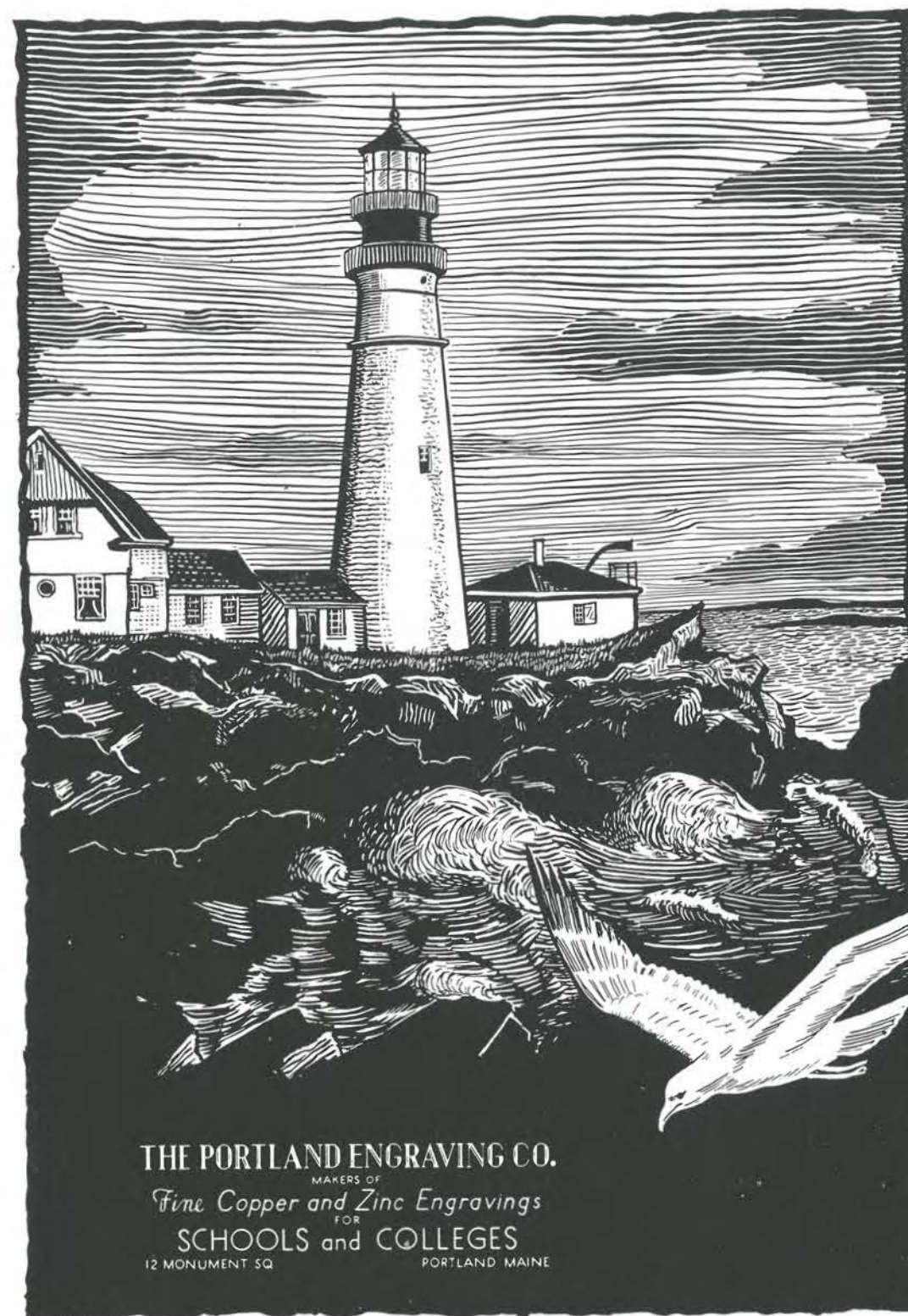
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
