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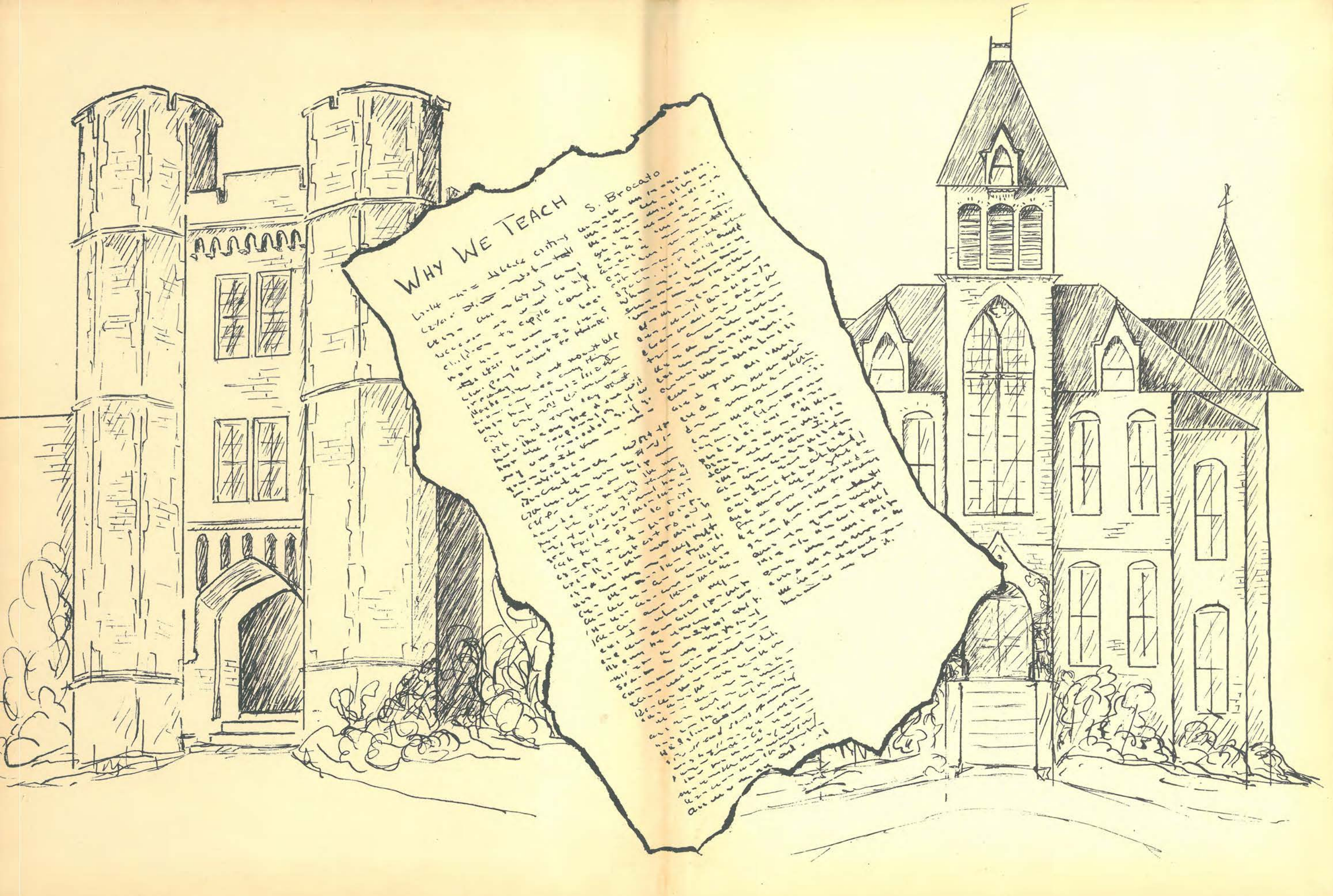

WHY WE TEACH

SAMUEL BROCATO

Since my first year in teaching—twenty-two years ago—I held the philosophical ideal that Teaching Is A Privileged Service, Not A Salaried Job. And, without in the least denying the need for much improvement in the economic condition of teaching, I still hold that fundamentally, teaching is a privileged service First. Hence, my title is not intended to stress the What we are teaching for in terms of monetary rewards. Rather my aim is toward the objective For in terms of service and achievement for our own people, and for humanity in general. THIS IS THE TRUE FUNCTION OF *TEACHING* as exemplified by the Master Teacher—the Nazarene.

My approach to this brief discussion is undertaken on a basis of defense against undue attacks on public school education, because attacks have been many and serious, and because through that defense I may set forth our objective ideals. We do not mind honest criticism because constructive criticism enables us to evaluate ourselves and so improve our efforts. But repeated undeserved attacks on the American Public School can do more harm to the fabric of American life than all the propaganda moths bombarding the nation's screen doors from without . . . *The American Public School is the only social agency in our democracy exerting a wholly-unifying force* generally approaching a more normal practiced-equality. . . . All of the children of all the people, rich, poor, of whatever creed, racial background, or political affiliation are exposed to the same educational experiences and opportunities. . . .

Most often, the attackers of public school education charge that students no longer know how to spell; and they complain, we should scrap all the "frills" and return to the fundamental three—R's. . . . The best defense being a strong offense, I would meet these diatribes somewhat as follows:

1. There are no *good-natured spellers* in the English language. There are only varying degrees of memorizers—from college professors down. The fault lies not with individuals; the fault lies in the endless irregular forms of the language itself. . . .

2. Returning to the "fundamentals" would be a very good way for us to commit national suicide. I know we need not point this out to ourselves as educators, but it seems to be periodically necessary that we bring it to the attention of Mr. and Mrs. America. Discarding our hard-won gains in public school education would be like disarming our future generations in the ever increasing struggle for men's minds. . . . *We teach to liberate thinking and the truth shall make us freer than we are.* Future national greatness will not much longer be measured by strength of arms. It will be achieved rather by general enlightenment.

Critics of our public schools sometimes find fault with so-called "progressive" education. They object to the freedom of the democratic procedure involved which they choose to interpret as chaos. But the modern teacher, knowing what she is about, is creating learning situations which are related to life. Nearly nobody pretends to know anything about medicine and law. Hence, little or no criticisms there. But nearly everybody and his second cousin knows all about teaching merely by passing by and looking into our schools.

Fundamentals in education must necessarily change with the needs of progressive society. Hence, those fundamentals which suffered fifty years ago are no longer adequate. Such needs then, are in no wise "frills." They are essentials. Briefly, I want to list what I feel are considered essential fundamentals in the educational endeavor of our modern society. I do this with apologies to the specialized teachers who are experts in their fields.

SCIENCE: The sciences are absolutely indispensable to the very life of a modern nation. Our children should be steeped in the sciences from first grade on. (And we do expose them through integrating experiences.) . . . *We deal in the scientific approach.*

LANGUAGES: Five or six major tongues should be included even in our elementary schools, at least on a conversational basis. Nothing helps people understand one another more than having a "feeling" for the idioms of one another's languages. . . . *We teach for world understandings.*

THE SOCIAL STUDIES represent knowledges of human events and trends—past and present. Our future citizens must possess a wealth of knowledges and understandings in these areas in order to deal intelligently with world problems. . . . *We teach for world concepts.*

HEALTH AND PHYSICAL EDUCATION, together with clean, uncommercialized sports represent the safeguarding of healthy, happy future American citizens. Games teach co-ordination, self-reliance, team-work, and co-operation. Our men in battle situations have given ample proof of superiority in all branches of the armed forces. Reason? When unusual situations arise, they are able to meet them, individually through self-reliance, and collectively through team-work because they have not been restricted by regimented discipline. *We teach to achieve the ideal: sound minds in healthy bodies.*

ART AND MUSIC are cultural aesthetics which lend beauty and enjoyment to living. These universal languages foster intellectual appreciations among all peoples and helps us to teach that *man liveth not by bread alone!*

I am making no attempt to develop this discussion as fully as I might have done from the Maine Teachers' Association convention platform for which event this presentation was originally intended. But an extended summary would have brought out other—What We Are Teaching Fors:

By our own social attitudes

We teach to perpetuate the spirit of independence compatible with democracy.

We teach to preserve and protect our freedoms, especially the freedom of worship, freedom of speech and of the press in which we dare question even presidential interference . . .

We teach to strip condescending hypocrisy from the ideal of tolerance. In its place we would instill *The Brotherhood of Man, and the Fatherhood of God!*

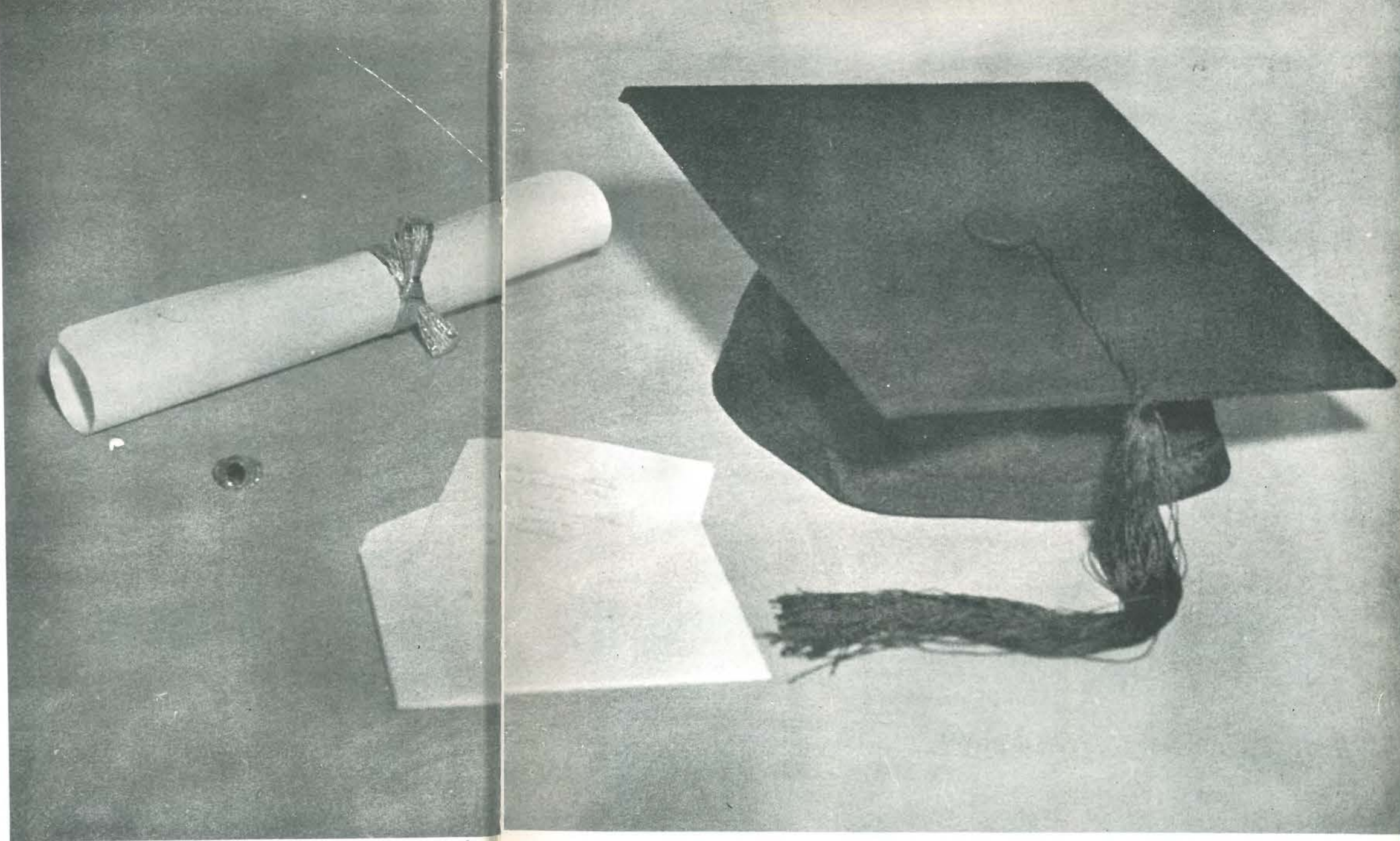

All of a sudden, seniors had gone contract crazy. To leave (the state) or not to leave—that was the question. The last month found us in a whirlwind of activities—arrangements for graduation, rehearsals, meetings, banquets, outings, and Commencement Ball.

June had come and four years had gone. Where had we been? Where were we going? What would we do? These were only a few of the questions in our minds as we came to the end of the chapter entitled, "G. S. T. C.—September 1948 to June 1952."

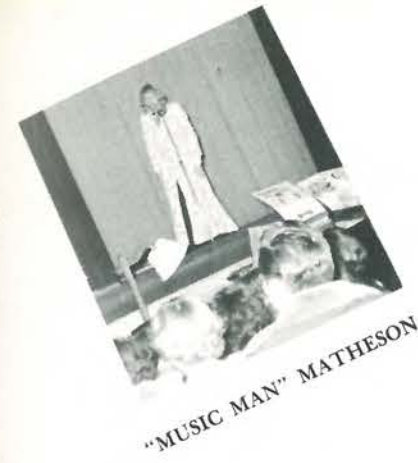

Basketball

This year the Gorham varsity basketball squad may be justly proud of itself, for several reasons. It lists among its accomplishments a fine over-all season record of 10 wins and 6 losses, and a New England Teachers College Conference record of 9 wins and 3 losses. The team not only deserves credit for this fine record, but also for the championship which they brought home to Gorham, that of the N. E. T. C. C. crown. This team was truly a team, having an equal balance of shooting power, speed and defensive ability in its starting five as well as a strength of reserves who were always potential dangers. The coaching of John Bodnarik and his able assistant Frank Pollard were integral parts of the team's success as well as the combination of the healthy attitude of the players and their ability and along with the staunch support of the Gorham fans who turned out, whenever possible, in large numbers.

The season opened with Bates College, where the boys turned in their second consecutive victory over the Bobcats in two years. The fine shooting of Jay Darling and Ted Jackson who garnered 50 points between them was augmented by the fine floor play of Captain Don Kenney and 6 foot 2 inch Gus Phillips, Gorham's backboard men, in turning in the impressive 74-67 victory. The presence of big Larry Quimby posed the most sizable opposition of the contest.

When Gorham faced traditional rival Farmington, it turned on all its jets for an outstanding early season victory on Farmington's home court and a later victory on its own floor. In these games, G. S. T. C. showed an accurate and extremely fast team to the spectators.

The closest and most exciting game of the year occurred on December 12 when Plymouth came to Gorham to be defeated by the narrow margin of two points in a hectic see-saw battle which was only broken by the insertion of Joe Pecoraro and Chet Koceika at a crucial moment. These two men sparked a game winning rally which was carried on by their teammates and which resulted in a win for Gorham.

The season's first defeat came at the hands of power laden Brandeis University in which only Pinky True and Jay Darling managed to break the scoring column with any degree of proficiency, while the visitors, led by Red Sokolow and Bobby Sheriden, won by an impressive margin.

After the Christmas vacation, Gorham traveled to Colby to play the Maine champions at Waterville. In this game the players gave a good account for Gorham, although going down to defeat 88-67. It was not until the late stages of the game that Gorham began to fade after having been ahead 20-19 at the end of the first quarter. The Colby depth with Ted Wiegand and Frank Piacentini leading it was a little too much for Gorham and Colby scored heavily in the last two periods to gain the victory. Jay Darling was the high scorer of the game with 25 points, which brought his total to 106 points scored against Maine opponents in four games. This game, however, gave Gorham added prestige, for it proved that Gorham was able to stay with the best in the state.

The following weeks brought a win sandwiched between two losses. Gorham lost at Fitchburg and at Salem and defeated Keene on its home court in one of the best games of the season 77-66. In this game, Gorham's boys really went to town, with Jay Darling, Ted Jackson, Pinky True and Gus Phillips all reaching double figure totals with 24, 20, 16, and 10 respectively. Keith Springer also played a fine game. After these games, G. S. T. C. settled down to win all but one of its remaining games in the Conference. G. S. T. C. defeated Keene again on its home floor with Jay Darling throwing in 33 points to tie the Russell Hall record, which he broke the following week with an all-time record mark of 40 points scored in the game against Salem State Teachers College. At New Britain the team went down to defeat to a larger and more formidable opponent, although the performance of Larry Golder offset the loss to a degree.

The season closed at Waltham where G. S. T. C. was defeated by Brandeis in a game that was close for a half, but which was decided by the greater depth displayed by the University team. Jay Darling scored 25 points in this game, his last for Gorham, to run his total to 388 points for the season and an average point total per game of 24.3 thruout the season.

This team, the greatest to come from Gorham since the fabulous 1938 team, played the most difficult schedule that it has ever played and next year the schedule of opposition will be even more ambitious with the addition of a few larger schools, but if the boys turn in another season like this one, G. S. T. C. will have nothing to worry about. Of course, it will miss the six seniors who contributed their experience and ability to make the fine season. They are Captain Don Kenney, Ted Jackson, Jay Darling, Gus Phillips, and Keith Springer. That will take a sizable slice out of next year's team, but the future remains fairly bright with the advent of such men as Chet Koceika, Larry Golder, Pinky True, Joe Pecoraro, and such Junior Varsity stars as Dick Tibbetts, Dick Ayer, Bob Hapworth, Bob Green and Darrell Payson. Coach John Bodnarik deserves a great deal of credit for a fine season as does Frank Pollard for a good J. V. record. The managers were Bob Pickett and Dick Gilpatrick who, of course, were another part of a winning combination.

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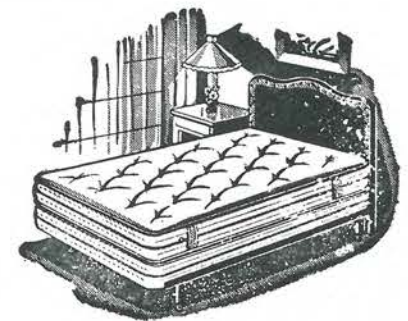
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
