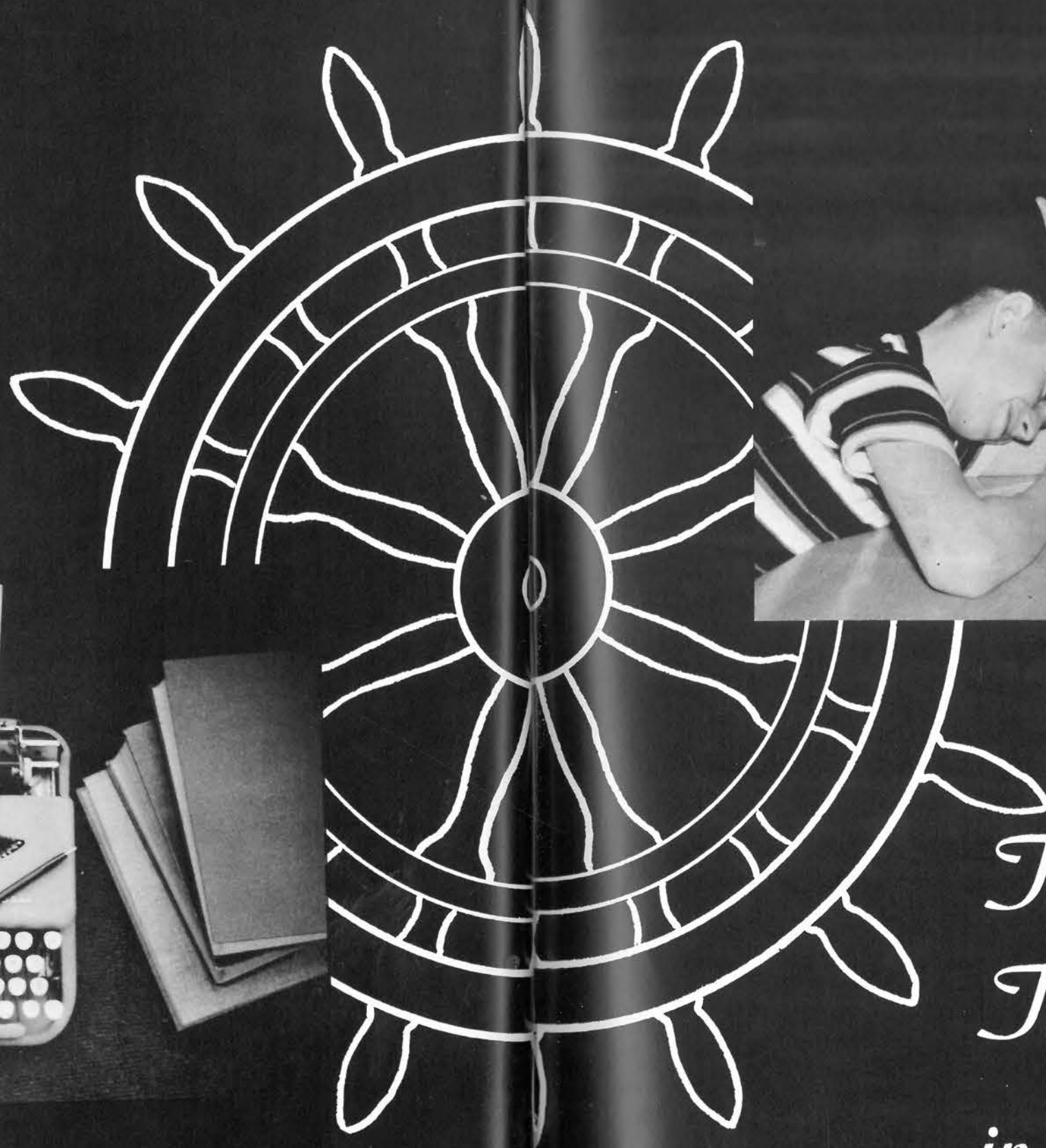


Mr. Wensel Moberg, teacher of geography, is indeed one who deserves to share in the dedication of this yearbook.

STUDENT teaching is generally considered to be the most exciting, revealing, and interesting phase of the entire teacher education program. It is the culmination of three years of study and preparation for the teaching profession. Its purpose is to provide each senior an opportunity to experience all the requisites of teaching: preparing, planning, demonstrating, discussing, evaluating, guiding, counseling, reacting to the needs of girls and boys as well as those of the community, and associating with fellow teachers and administrators.

Student teaching is conducted for one half year in the campus school and cooperating schools throughout the state. The latter, as well as the grade levels and the supervising teachers, are carefully selected to meet needs of the program. The principals, supervisors, and superintendents of schools in addition to the college faculty provide encouragement and assistance along the way. Assignment to centers, supervision, and evaluation are shared by college faculty charged with that responsibility. Frequent visitations provide the link between the college and the student in terms of accomplishment and evaluation.

Closely related to student teaching is the role played by the Placement Office. Its director notifies all eligible teacher candidates of available openings and arranges for interviews where necessary. Through its efforts students who have successfully completed their college requirements are introduced to their first teaching position.

The success of the student teaching program has been insured by the many dedicated and professionally-minded teachers and administrators who give their time and effort to make the teacher of tomorrow worthy members of the profession.

PHYSICAL Education is presently a required subject during the first two years at Gorham State Teachers College. Miss Doris Fitz and Miss Jeanette Goodwin supervise the program for women. Mr. Richard Costello and Mr. Richard Wescott serve in the same capacity in the men's department. Sufficient hours, on an elective basis, may be secured from the department to establish a Physical Education Minor for interested students. This plan is expected to be formally introduced during the 1958-59 school year. Many students, men and women, have expressed a desire to secure the necessary credits for certification in Physical Education as established by the State Department of Education.

The program is handicapped primarily by the lack of facilities. Russell Gymnasium is no longer capable of handling the number of students enrolled in the physical education program. For this reason certain phases of the women's program are being conducted in Robie Center. In order to compensate for the lack of space, class sections have been combined so that additional classes may be scheduled in the gymnasium. However, by attempting to solve the problem of presenting each student with an opportunity to participate in the gym activities, combining sections has resulted in overcrowding of certain classes. Another result of the lack of available free time in the gym has been the inability of the Physical Education Staff to schedule the elective courses it feels should be included in the curriculum.

The solution to the physical education problems at Gorham rests in the erection of a new physical plant suitable to the growth pattern of the college. With additional dormitories and increasing enrollment, the problem becomes more acute each year. If Gorham State Teachers College is to continue to prepare well-rounded teachers, facilities in the area of physical education must be improved. Today's problems concerning the fitness of youth and their use of leisure time have become national and international in scope. They are problems that hold special implications for the elementary and junior high school teacher graduating from our teachers colleges. We at Gorham are hoping the Legislature will recognize our needs and remedy the situation in the very near future.

E DUCATION has the responsibility of providing youth with those experiences and understandings which will aid in their development as better producers, consumers, and more socially competent citizens. Industrial Arts is unique in its contribution to this goal. It concerns itself primarily with that phase of education through which every individual has an opportunity to learn about his industrial environment.

This is the basic philosophy of Industrial Arts education.

The preparation of teachers who are competent to provide this kind of education in secondary and elementary schools is of major concern to the Industrial Arts Department. Its program is designed:

First, to provide an understanding of the industrial environment through a mastery of the technical skills and related information in over 30 specific areas of work, broadly defined as woodwork, metalwork, electricity and electronics, transportation, graphic arts, drafting, and arts and crafts;

Second, to develop a professional attitude as well as provide a background of information and teaching skills necessary to impart the technical understandings and relationships; and

Third, to provide the opportunity for a general or cultural education so that the prospective teacher may find his place in the school, in the community, and in society.

It is toward these goals that the students strive and to which the Industrial Arts faculty, both departmental and academic, are dedicated.

THE music department, now in the third year of its new program for music Majors, has increased its enrollment to twenty-five students. The program is designed to prepare music supervisors who will have the necessary skills and experience to teach all phases of music from the elementary grades through high school. The curriculum includes courses in music history, theory, vocal and instrumental conducting, methods and instrumental classes, as well as liberal arts and educational subjects. Through these courses, as well as numerous public performances, the music department hopes to fulfill the following aims:

1. To fulfill the musical potential of students by intensive technical and theoretical training.
2. To broaden the student's outlook by liberal arts background.
3. To develop a sense of aesthetics, a personal discipline, and an appreciation of educational and moral values.
4. To stress that the above means serve toward the development of a well-integrated and balanced personality.
5. To have students become a vital force in the growth of musical and educational standards in the State of Maine.

In addition to the above subjects, the music department also presents music appreciation, fundamentals, elementary and junior high methods, which are required subjects for the general student body. Aesthetics and instrumental classes are offered as electives to all students.

"Great oaks from little acorns grow." Some fifteen years ago the little acorn of an idea became an ideal, then an aspiration, and finally a reality. In the Spring of 1958 the State Board of Education approved Art Education to be instituted at Gorham State Teachers College as a major course. Graduates of this course will be certified by the State Department of Education to teach and supervise Art in the elementary high schools of the state. Of course, certain basic talents and minimum requirements will be necessary for enrollment in the course to insure the best possible product at the end of the four-year period.

Perhaps one of the best advantages of preparing art teachers in an institution like ours is that talent-skill development is achieved along with professional integration, which in turn is essential to purposeful use in the classroom.

Social Studies

THE Social Studies Department aims to give Gorham's prospective teachers a broad knowledge of the past and to alert them to the problems of the present.

The required courses lay a strong framework for basic understandings. The freshmen take a two-semester course in the History of Civilization, with Mr. James Whitten teaching the ancient and medieval periods and Miss Edna Dickey teaching the modern period. The sophomores are required to take a semester course in Sociology, which is ably taught by Mr. Paul Barker, who enlivens the class with symposiums and field trips. Another second-year required course is United States History, 1783-1958. This two-semester course is presented by Mr. Allen Pease and Miss Esther Wood. Mr. Wensel Moberg teaches Principles of Geography, a required course for sophomores. The junior required subjects are Economics and Maine History, which are taught by Mr. Barker and Miss Wood. The seniors take American Government, which is offered by Mr. Pease, who joined the Gorham faculty in 1957 and has become a popular and highly valued member of the department.

The electives offered by the department are varied. Miss Dickey's course on the Bible is a favorite with those who enjoy literature and history. Mr. Moberg varies his electives from year to year so that his rich offering includes political, economic, and regional geography. Mr. Pease offers courses in Europe since 1914 and Modern Russia. Mr. Barker's electives, Criminology, Marriage, and Anthropology, are always popular. Mr. Whitten's well-liked course in Canadian History includes a visit to Quebec. Miss Wood's electives are not the same every year; they include Colonial History of the United States, Diplomatic History of the United States, and the West.

The members of the department feel that wide reading and travel are essential to an understanding of the world today. Mr. Moberg and the N.A.T.A. take a lead in promoting the latter. All members of the department take pride in the wide use made of magazines and books by the students of the college.

Education And Psychology

IN recent years much has happened to raise psychology from its earlier questionable status of introspective philosophy to a position of respect as an important science. To the end that psychology employs the scientific method and has the scientific inquiring spirit, we can truly refer to it as a science.

One must face the sobering fact that present knowledge and understanding of human relations and individual adjustments are not adequate. Psychology accepts the challenge presented to it, namely: that man must gain new knowledge of men and must strive for friendly intelligent cooperation at home as well as in the international community. In this process, everyone must work out his personal adjustment to himself and the difficult world in which he finds himself. Realizing the variability of the "human equation," most psychologists do not pretend to claim that the field ever will contain all the valuable knowledge of human nature.

The College Library, centrally located on the second floor of Corthell Hall, consists of three rooms—the reading room, periodical room, and librarian's office, which also serves as the cataloging room. The main reading room houses the general collection of approximately twenty thousand books, microfilm reader, and card catalog. It has a seating capacity of ninety. Open shelves provide free access to all materials—books, current periodicals, bound periodicals, and the vertical file of pamphlets, pictures, and clippings.

The Library's role in the education program is indeed an important one and cannot be overemphasized. The chief physical resource of the college is its books, for they contain the intellectual substance which is its chief concern. We wish to expand the library services, and are looking forward to the time when we may have a new building. The college student who learns to use the library intelligently has acquired a skill which will be useful throughout his life. Through books he may aspire to gain any friendship he desires, and as a result grow in stature, wisdom, and humanity.

Mathematics

COMPREHENDING

THE English courses offered at Gorham are planned to fulfill a two-fold purpose: improvement of skills in oral and written communication and development of critical appreciation of literature. The members of the English department believe that every potential teacher should learn to use language effectively and should acquire the habit of reading widely and discriminatingly.

Freshman English, taught by all members of the department, is a two-semester course required of all first-year students. During the first semester, emphasis is placed on the reviewing of fundamentals, the critical reading of essays and articles, and the writing of themes. In the same semester, a non-credit course, Remedial English, taught by Miss Littlefield, is provided for freshmen markedly in need of special help in English fundamentals. In the second semester of Freshman English, work in the improvement of writing skills continues, but the focus is on the study of varied types of literature: short story, drama, biography, novel, and poetry.

Mr. Arnold and Miss Sawyer teach the two-semester course in literature required of sophomores not taking special programs.

Among the varied electives which afford juniors and seniors the opportunity to extend and deepen their knowledge and appreciation of English are several which are new this year. Mrs. Fickett is offering Methods of Teaching Junior High English; Mr. Weeks has introduced Approach to Poetry and Shakespeare.

The mathematics department offers three types of courses: for general education, for elective specialization, and for teaching procedures and concepts. The freshman class is sectioned according to previous mathematical instruction so that each student may acquire a background of the nature and significance of mathematics, geared to his highest level of learning. In the junior year all students have a course in teaching mathematics at primary, intermediate, or upper grade range, based on the understanding of essential mathematical concepts and on modern principles of learning. Elective courses are offered in College Algebra, Trigonometry, Analytic Geometry, Differential and Integral Calculus, and Statistics. The necessity for developing ability to think with numbers is recognized as an important objective for all teachers.

Science

SCIENCE is an important component in the education of any person in the Twentieth Century. It might even be said that any person who is ignorant of science can never claim to be truly educated. In an attempt to insure that our future teachers will be scientifically literate, GSTC requires that all freshmen have a year of biological science and that all sophomores have a year of physical science.

Through the selected content, an attempt is made to familiarize the student with the fundamental concepts of science, the scientific method, and laboratory techniques. In addition to the required courses, students may elect from the following fields: chemistry, geology, physics, zoology, botany and conservation. Each course presents appropriate laboratory experience or field work. These courses are selected by students preparing to teach junior high school science and by those preparing to teach in elementary schools who are particularly interested in science. Courses in methods of teaching science are also offered so that the beginning teachers will have both the subject matter and some helpful techniques and procedures.

The department is operating in a beautiful new building with excellent facilities. The courses now being taught offer superior advantages to the students because of more adequate space, smaller classes, improved facilities and a more specialized faculty.

The science department hopes to expand its offerings of electives in the near future to include astronomy, meteorology, analytical chemistry, organic chemistry, electronics, photography, genetics and heredity.

Campus School

THE Campus School is and must be an integral part of the college. The school is crowded, but the program must provide for the mental, moral, physical, and social development of each child. The members of the faculty have another great responsibility. They must guide the college students who teach with them so that each will develop his teaching potential to the greatest degree.

In the Campus School, the student teachers have the opportunity to put into practice the theories and methods discussed in college classes. They share the teaching, never carrying more than a third of the teaching load with the exception of half days and whole days at the end of a quarter. They learn to plan, to make necessary decisions, and to take part in all types of activities suitable for the children with whom they are working. The task is not easy. It is a real challenge, but most of the student teachers accept it as such and have an interesting and profitable experience.

Demonstration lessons are taught for various college groups. The Campus School teachers use regular classes and teach the day's lesson in a way that students can see methods being discussed put into actual practice. Sometimes groups visit various classrooms in order to observe child behavior.

Miss Upton's students in Guiding Educational Experiences get an opportunity to teach their first lesson to a group in the Campus School. The students observe, make careful plans, teach, and receive helpful criticism from supervising teachers.

The Campus School children enjoy their contacts with the college. Great enthusiasm is expressed when groups are invited to go to the gymnasium for organized physical activity. The college students are "trying out their wings," but the children are appreciative of their efforts.

Some of the children who have difficulty with reading have an opportunity to join the remedial reading classes at the college. Parents are happy, children enjoy the work, and worthwhile results are achieved.

The Campus School faculty is conscious of a great responsibility — the fruitful guidance of both children and college students. but is happy to accept the challenge and hopes to meet it in a way that is satisfactory.

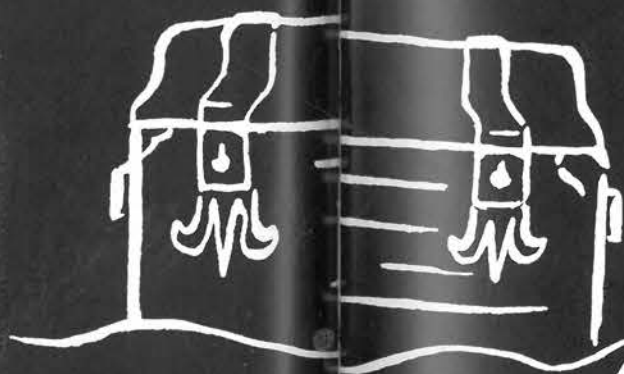

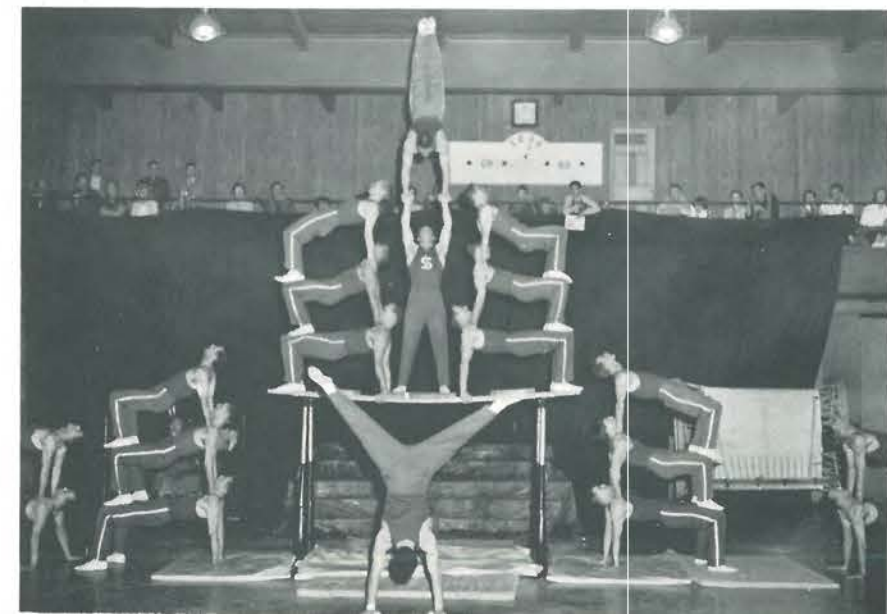
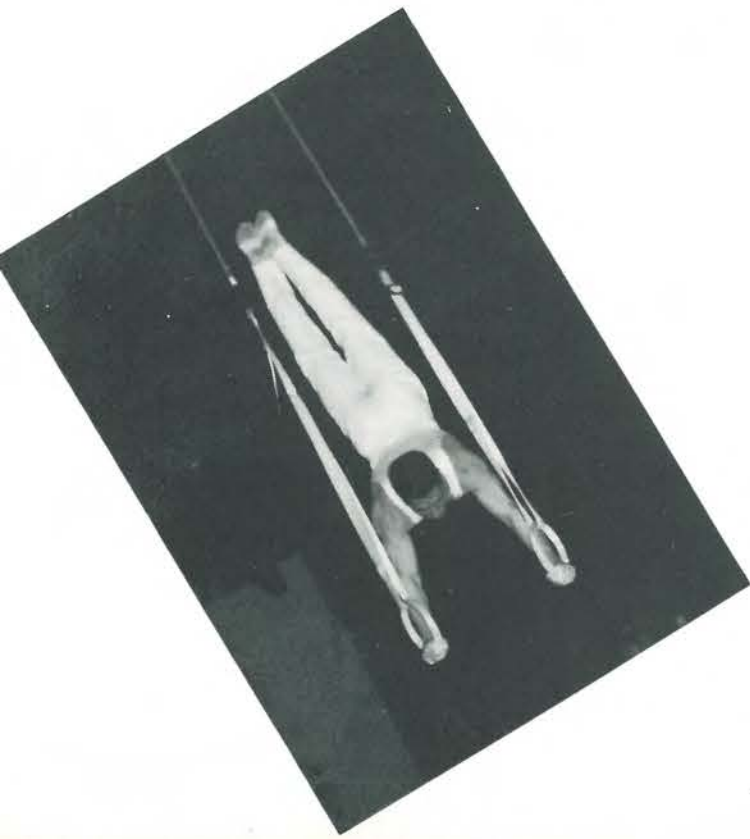
The Varsity "G" Club is an organization consisting of men who have earned a letter in varsity sports competition.

Intramural Volleyball

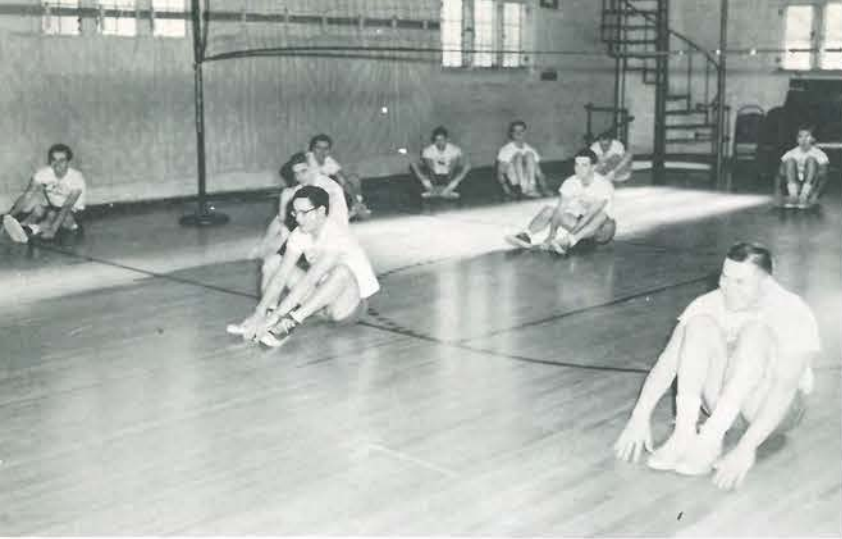

Intramural Basketball

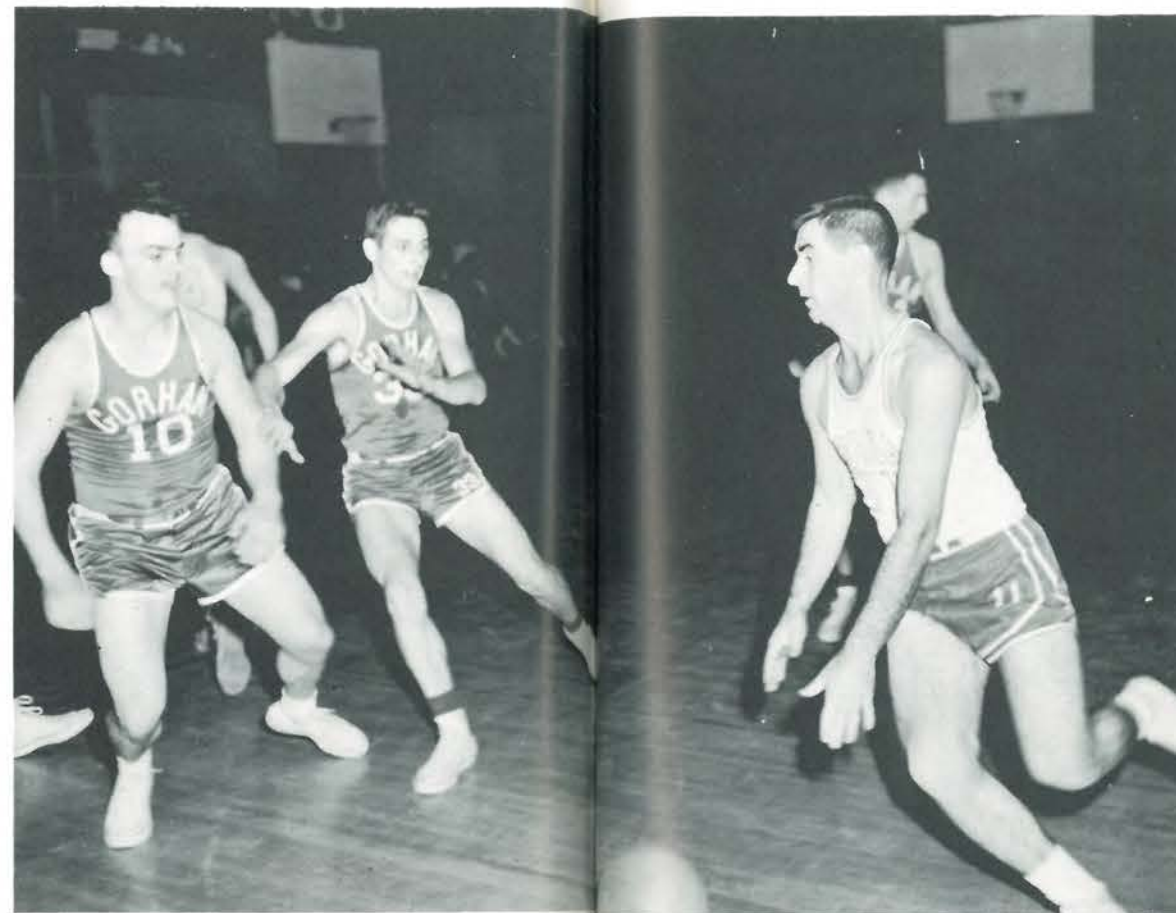
