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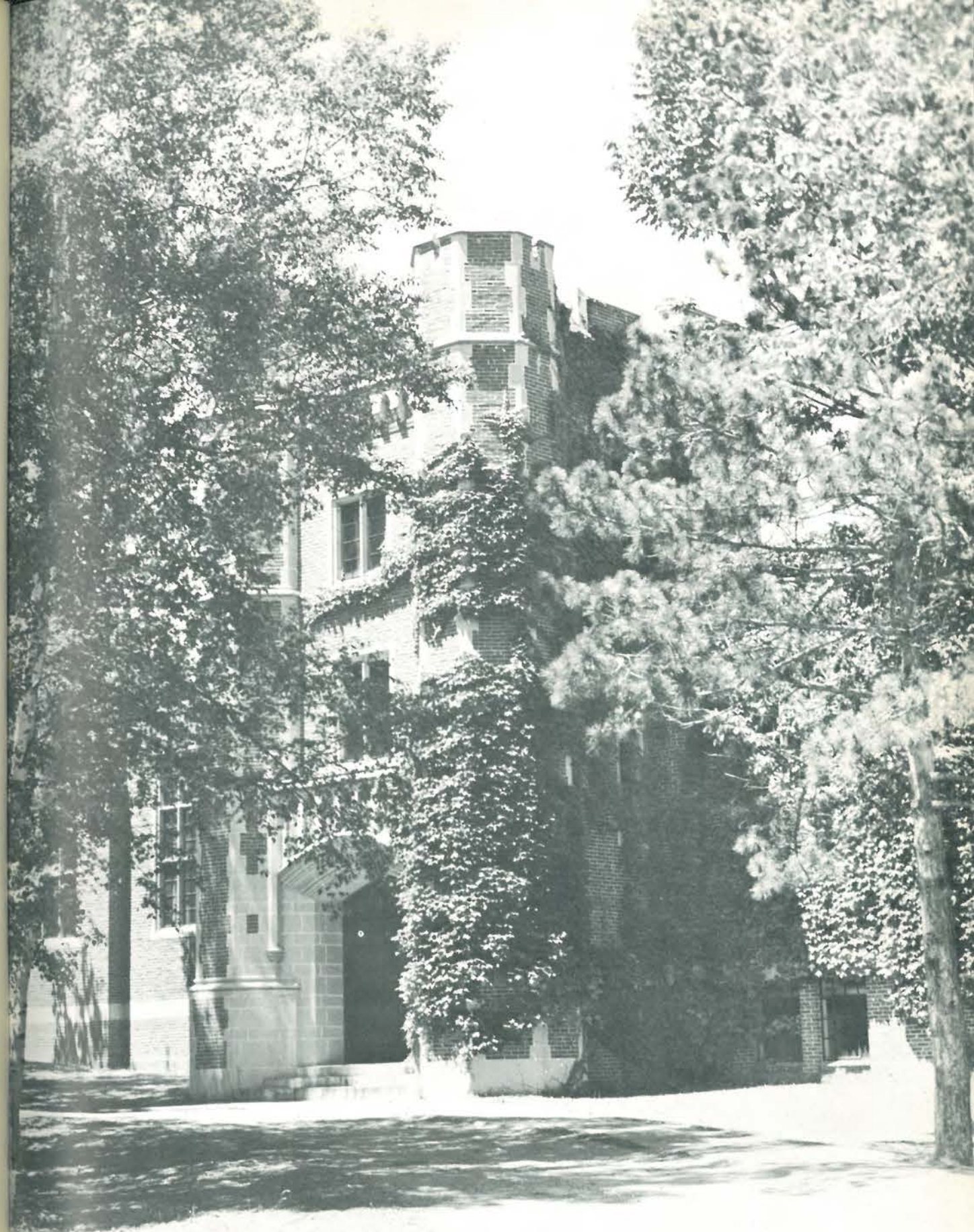

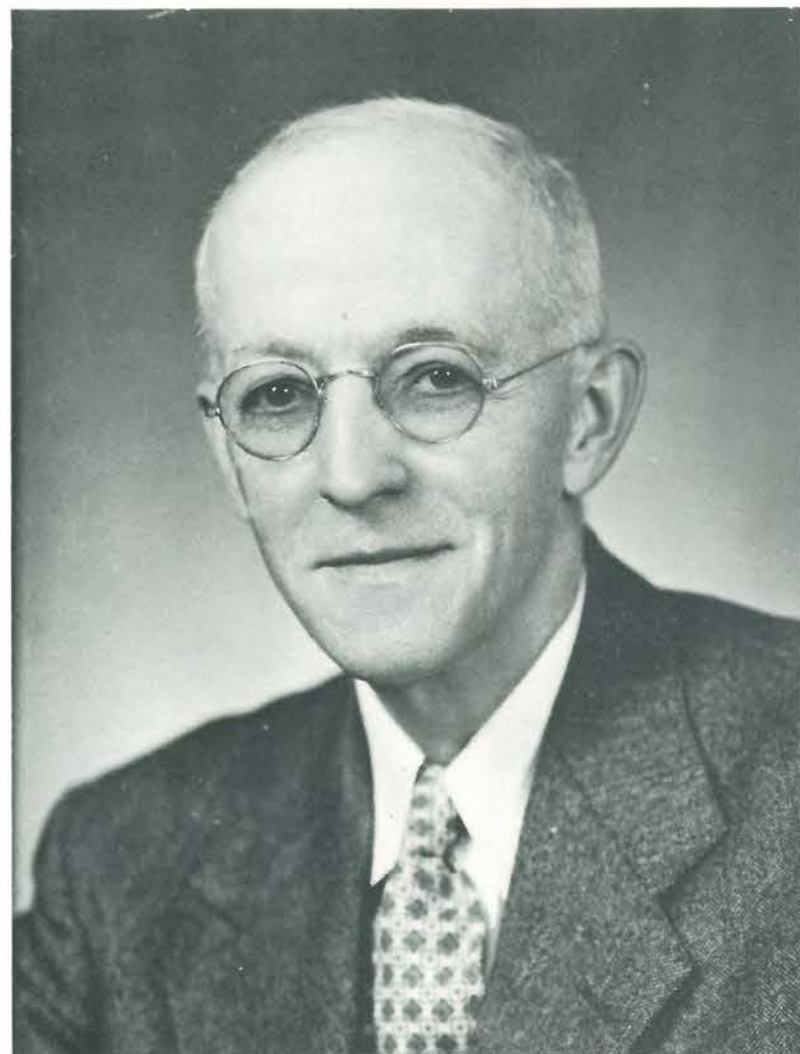

The beautiful faith of Youth.*



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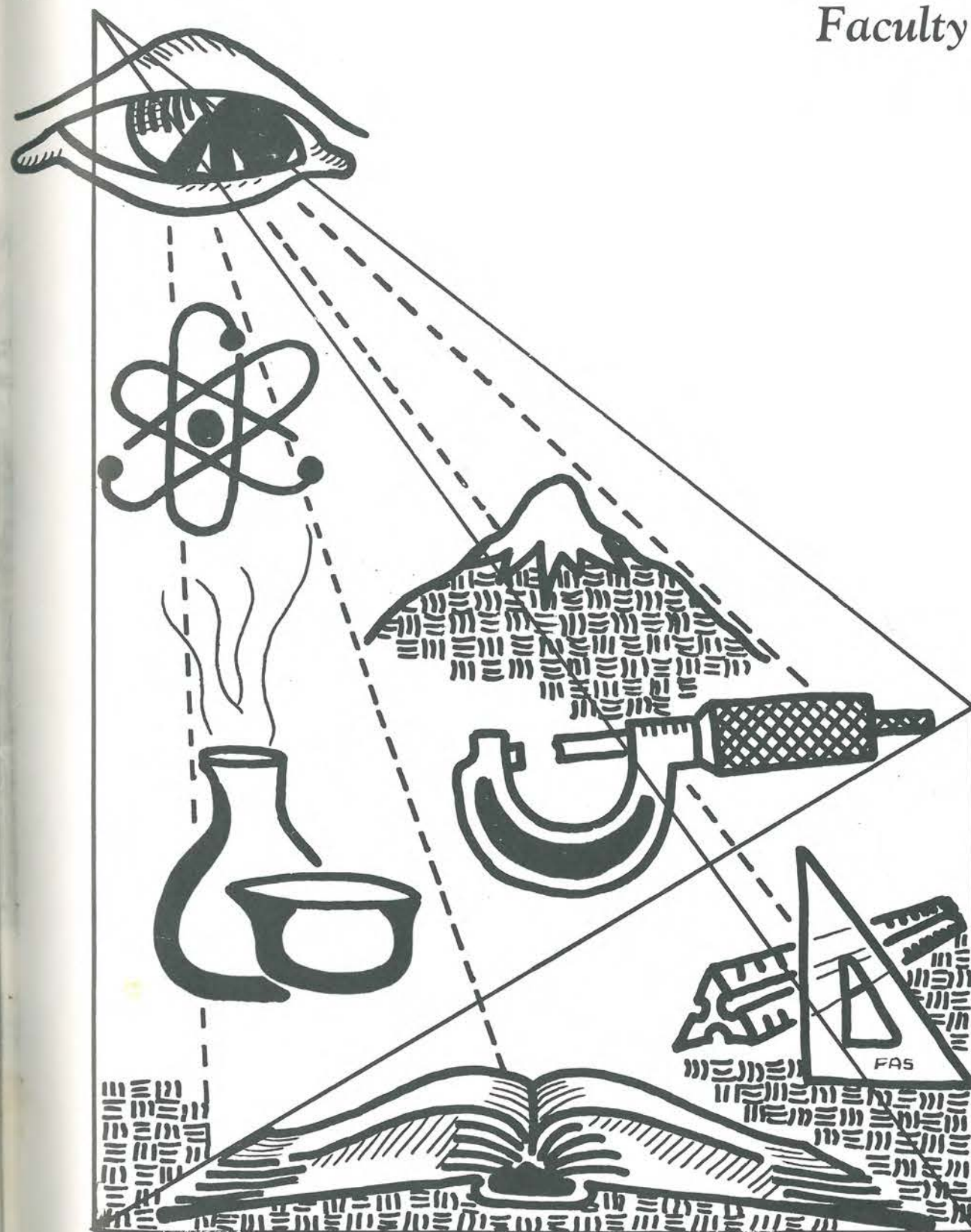

The Philosophy of the School

The major objective of Gorham State Teachers College is to provide graduates of professional competence and personal character to serve the public schools in the areas of Kindergarten-Primary, General Elementary, Junior High School and Industrial Arts teaching and supervision.

The College is deeply dedicated to the values of character, culture, and professional growth that constitute the attributes of desirable teachers of America's children. Specific objectives in several areas of teacher education center around the purpose of the College to produce graduates whose experiences at Gorham will reflect our concern with the following criteria of effective teacher education.

1. *Thorough general education* is provided through the basic courses of the first two years, supplemented by a varied selection of elective courses for Juniors and Seniors.
2. *Special professional education* is organized to provide continuous growth in educational experiences throughout the four years of the college program.
3. *Student teaching experience* is provided for a full semester of the Senior year to the end that the student may demonstrate his ability as a member of the profession.
4. *An understanding of society* is a goal of required and elective courses in the social studies to foster the student's grasp of the social processes of the past, the present and the possible future.
5. *An understanding of the child* is the province of psychology, guidance and affiliated fields to the end that the student develop attitudes, skills and knowledge to better guide educational experiences.
6. *A loyalty to democratic values* centered on the dignity and worth of the individual and his role in active participation in the privileges and responsibilities inherent in a society of free choice and expression is advanced in both formal class work and organized student life.
7. *Growth in moral and spiritual values* is promoted by close association with a faculty and administration exemplifying high standards of spiritual expression and by campus organizations and activities serving the religious needs of the student.
8. *Social responsibility* is developed by a continuity of courses and student activities which concern themselves with the realities of the problems of a world in stress and strain and of a nation and state in social transitions.
9. *Physical welfare* is promoted for individual and group by a comprehensive physical education program which looks beyond the personal needs of the student.
10. *Aesthetic expression* is recognized by the creation and appreciation of beauty in the many arts. The College program stresses the heritage of the arts and the values of individual and group participation in art related activities.

The development of a democratic philosophy of education is a common concern of school and society. It serves the teacher in establishing the ends toward which one develops those enduring attitudes, interests, ideals and understandings; abilities, skills, and habits, which are the ends toward which teaching is a means.

The Industrial Arts Department

The Industrial Arts Department includes more than a third of the total male enrollment at Gorham State Teachers College. They carry a full schedule of courses, averaging twenty-six class hours per week, for the entire four year course. When they graduate they are qualified to teach industrial arts at any grade level.

The curriculum is one of doing, more than listening. The I. A. men get practice in actual production, creation, and repair so that they will be able to teach the young people the aspects of production, consumption, and recreation, as they pertain to American industrial life. They will work with other teachers to provide all youngsters with an opportunity to get a well rounded general education which will make it easier for them to become adjusted to life.

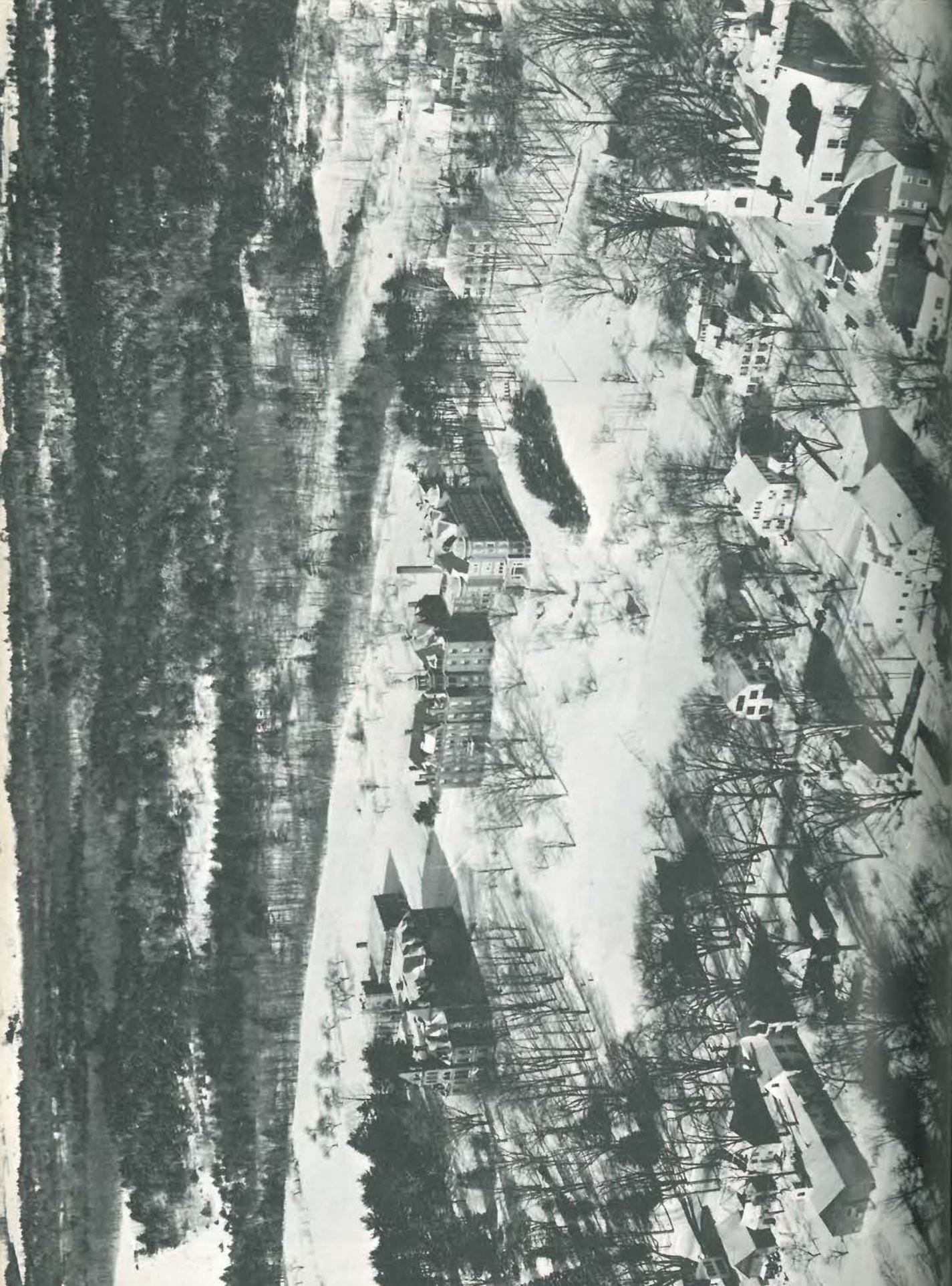

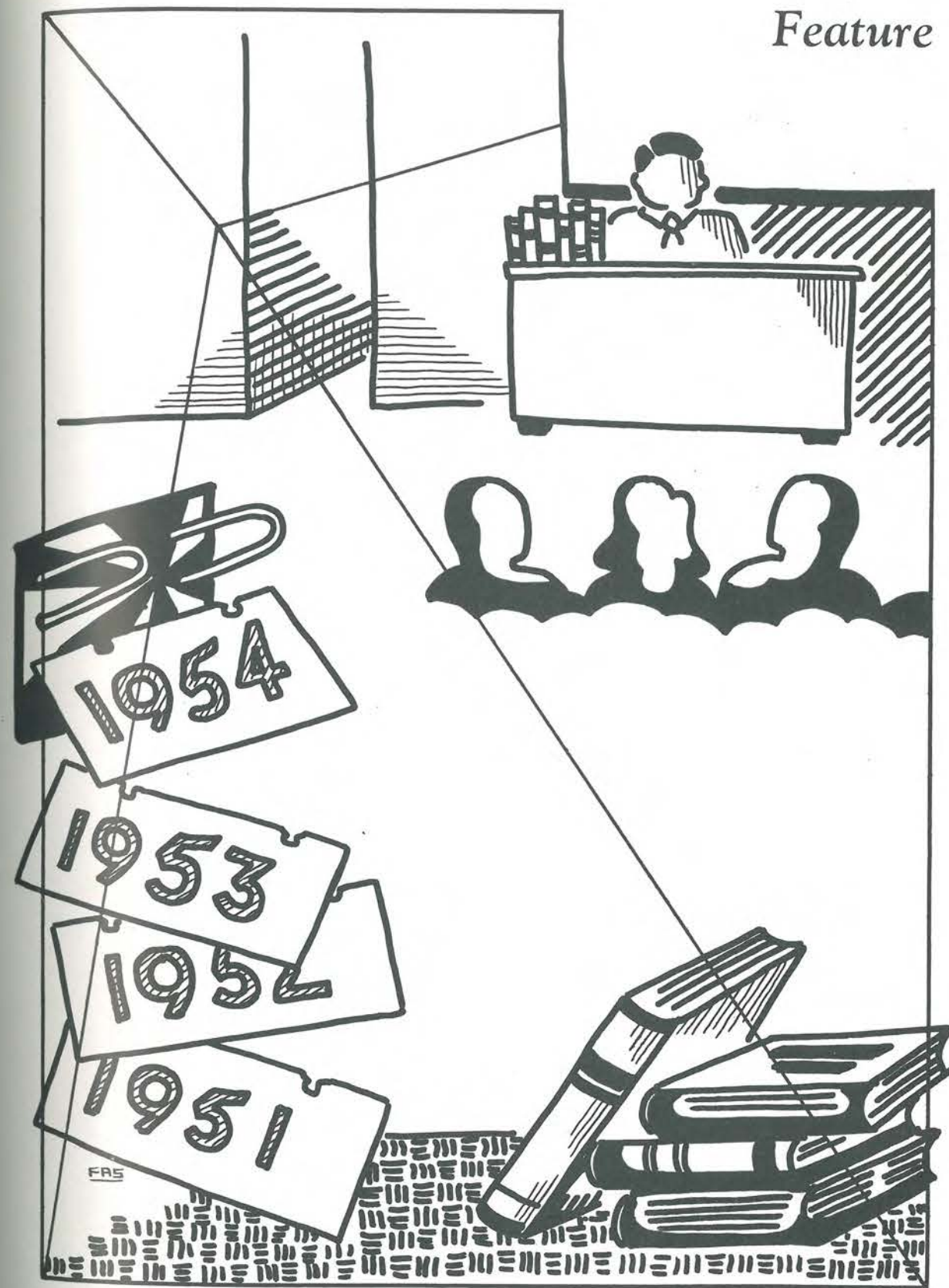

Teacher Training

One of the outstanding features of Gorham State Teachers College is the friendly attitude which exists between student and student and between faculty and student. For our feature this year we are greatly indebted to this wonderful spirit of co-operation which does so much to make Gorham a place we will long remember. We wish to thank Miss Upton for helping us plan this section and we give a special thanks to Miss Mildred Peabody who gave so much of her free time in order that we could bring you this section.

For those of you who are unfamiliar with the training procedure at G. S. T. C., it consists of a program of instruction which is three-fold in purpose. It is the belief of our faculty that we will maintain a higher interest in studying and working with children if we are frequently given a chance to watch them and observe their behavior. For this reason the freshman and sophomore classes take many trips to the campus school. They see actual classes in progress, either under the guidance of the regular teacher or the student teacher, in grades ranging from the sub-primary to the sixth grade. So, the first and introductory phase of our program is that of observation.



As the end of the sophomore year rolls around we are beginning to feel that we are experts on child guidance and instruction. At this time Miss Fitz and Mr. Pollard, our physical education instructors, step in and show us in one easy lesson what we don't know. The second phase of our program is put into action and we are allowed to teach several physical education classes to various groups from the campus school. This program is elaborated upon in many of our classes and we are given the opportunity to teach our own class and, in a few courses, to teach the children in the campus school under the close observation and supervision of the teachers. Participation is an extremely important part in preparation for our vocation.



In our senior year we get a real chance to try out our skill. For eighteen weeks we are put under the supervision of an experienced teacher and thus finish the third phase of our program—that of student teaching. In the following section we have tried to show as many different actual teaching situations as is possible. We asked each teacher what it was about the particular situation which we photographed that made that experience so gratifying to him or her. The quotations beside each picture are the actual feelings expressed by the student teacher who is pictured.

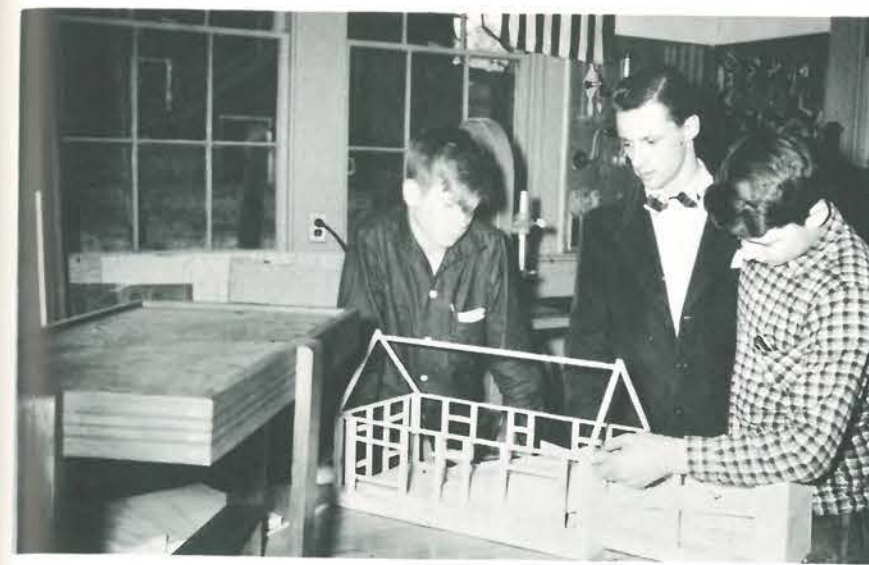


Student Teaching In The Industrial Arts Department

The I. A. department sends students all over the state to do their student teaching. Every week the student must write a letter to Mr. Martin telling all that has happened within the week in the shop. He has to keep up a journal and record incidents in his professional diary each day.

He has conferences before and after each lesson he teaches and is frequently visited by members of the Gorham State Teachers College I. A. staff. He is supposed to be active in at least one extra-curricular activity at the school where he teaches, and should make some permanent contribution to the I. A. department of that school.

During the period of his student teaching he has to attend one conference on the Hill and must make visits to at least three other schools within the state. In the shop he takes over completely for the teacher and conducts classes in woodworking, metalworking, electricity, arts and crafts and many other subjects.



Les King and Elmer Lyons both felt that student teaching provided them with a good deal more information than they had been able to get from books. When you work with the children themselves and actually feel their response to your instructions, you learn the one thing that no book can tell you—how to teach.

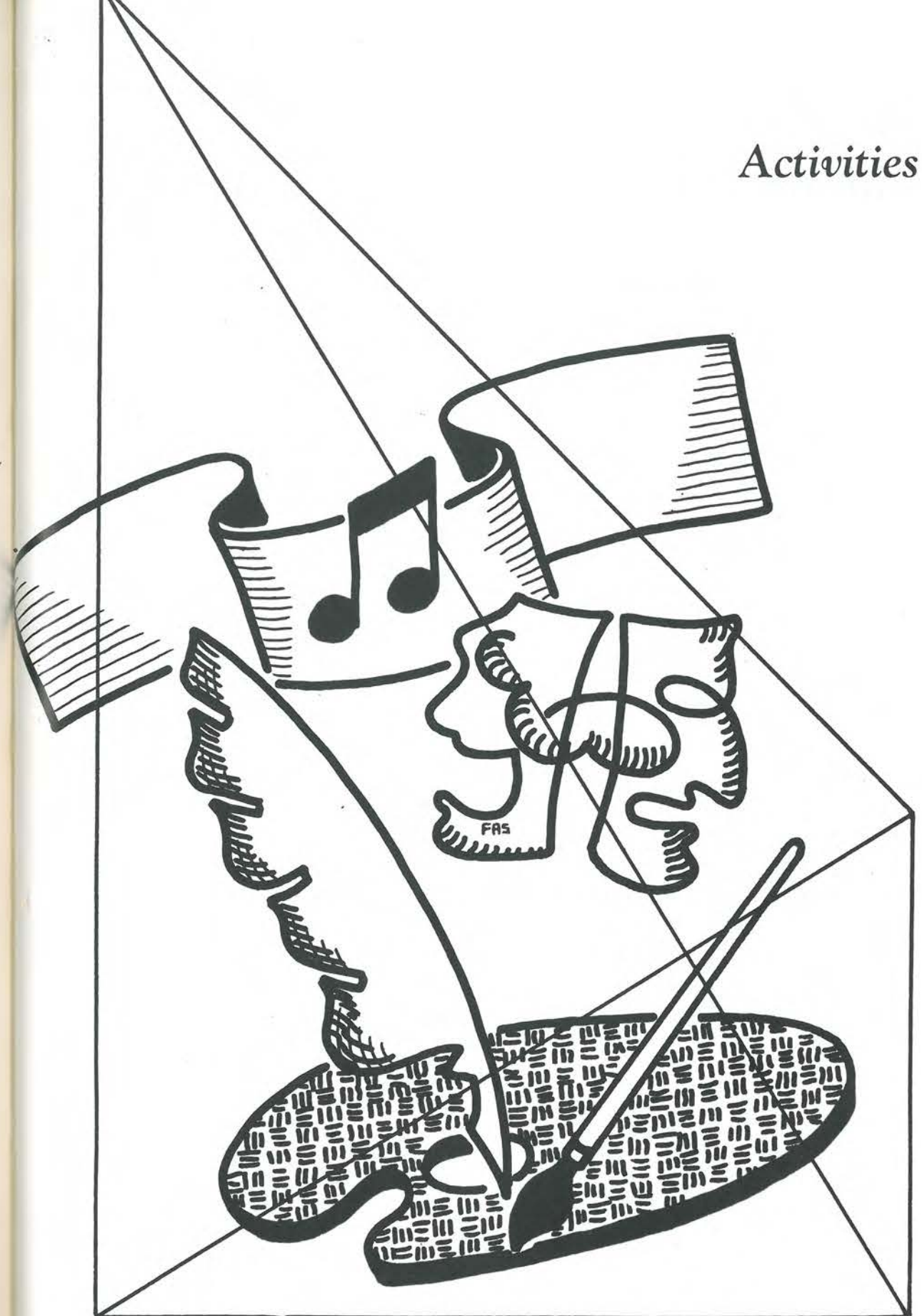

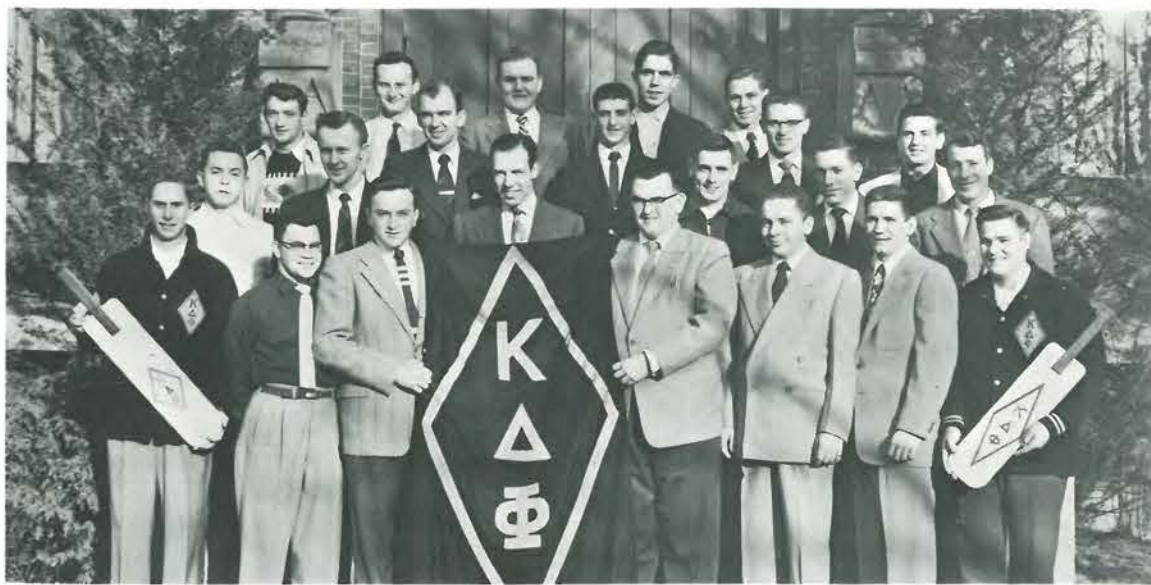

All women students belong to the Women's Athletic Association and all are invited to participate in as many of the women's sports as they wish. The W. A. A. is governed by a board of officers, counselors, and a representative from the cheerleaders. The main duties of the board are to control women's sports and allied activities, and to be in charge of selling merchandise in order to make money for the W. A. A.

The women's athletic program at Gorham State Teachers College ranges from the more highly organized team sports, such as field hockey, to the indoor and individual sports, such as ping-pong and bicycle riding.

The W. A. A. maintains a point system to give recognition to those who participate in sports. Each sport entitles the participant to 25 points, but the number of hours of participation varies with each activity. There is a counselor for each sport who keeps a record of the hours. In no case do individuals receive additional points for being a champion or a member of a varsity team. The girl who has earned 50 points receives her class numerals; 150 points, her "G"; 300 points, her pin; and 500 points her jacket.

The college has adequate equipment for most of the women's activities, and facilities, such as the tennis courts and gymnasium, are shared equally by men and women.

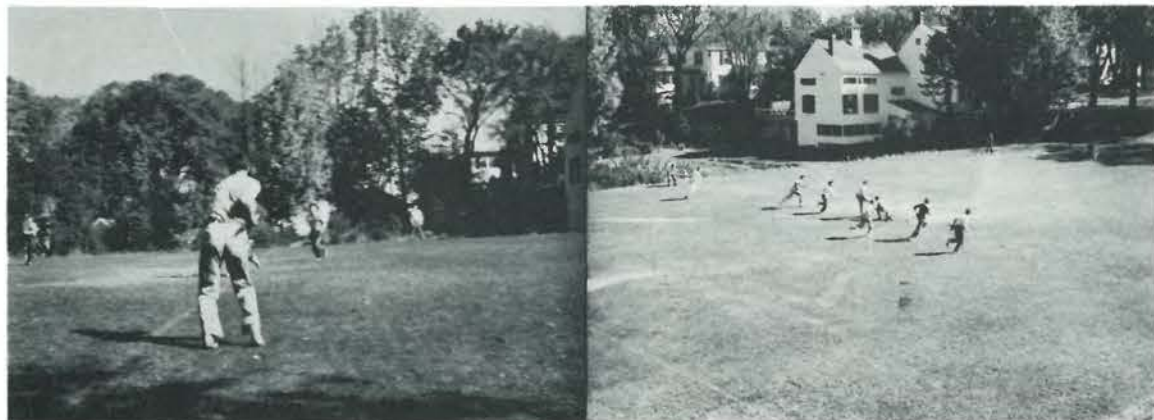


Men's Intramural Sports
