Dr. Jenkins and Rev. Smith Baker are to speak this evening. We can hear them singing very plain up here. Grace and I took quite a long walk after school and Eunice and Charles went down to the church a little while.

We got the first train last Monday night but had to get on with a rush. They were taking the engine that was in the Leebore accident back to Portland and so we had to go very slow. When we got down to Westbrook Junction we had to wait until ten minutes of six before our train started. It had to wait ~~below~~ at Woodford until that second train from the East got through and that was awful late. The train tried to make up for lost time and we almost flew from Westbrook to Graham and were only three or four minutes late. I never rode so fast in my life. I kept thinking of all the accidents I've heard of all the way up.

My plant was all wilted down but I see that looks quite fresh and green in some places and guess it will come up some time or other. I hope so at least.

Miss White came back Monday night so we are just rushing now.

I think that this is my last weeks work in Physiology. We shall have to change to Algebra very soon. That will mean hard work for us.

Well my lessons won't amount to much if I don't stop writing soon so I think I had better close.
