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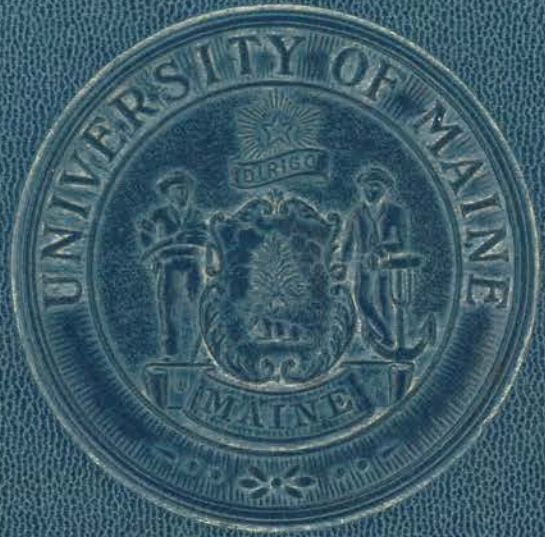

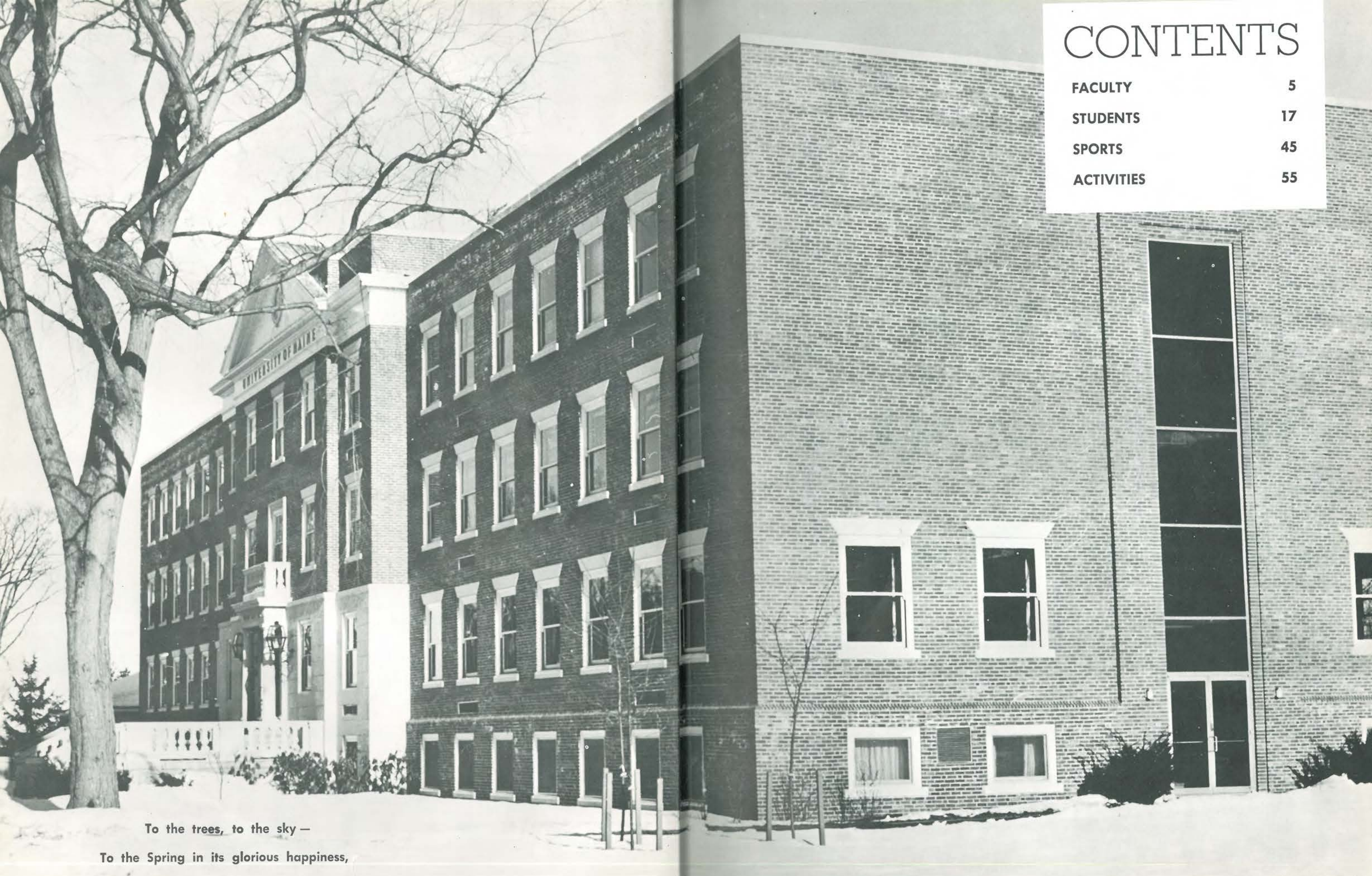

Mr. Clark discusses the different phases of a yearbook publication with two of the yearbook editors, Paula Gibson and Beverly Howard.

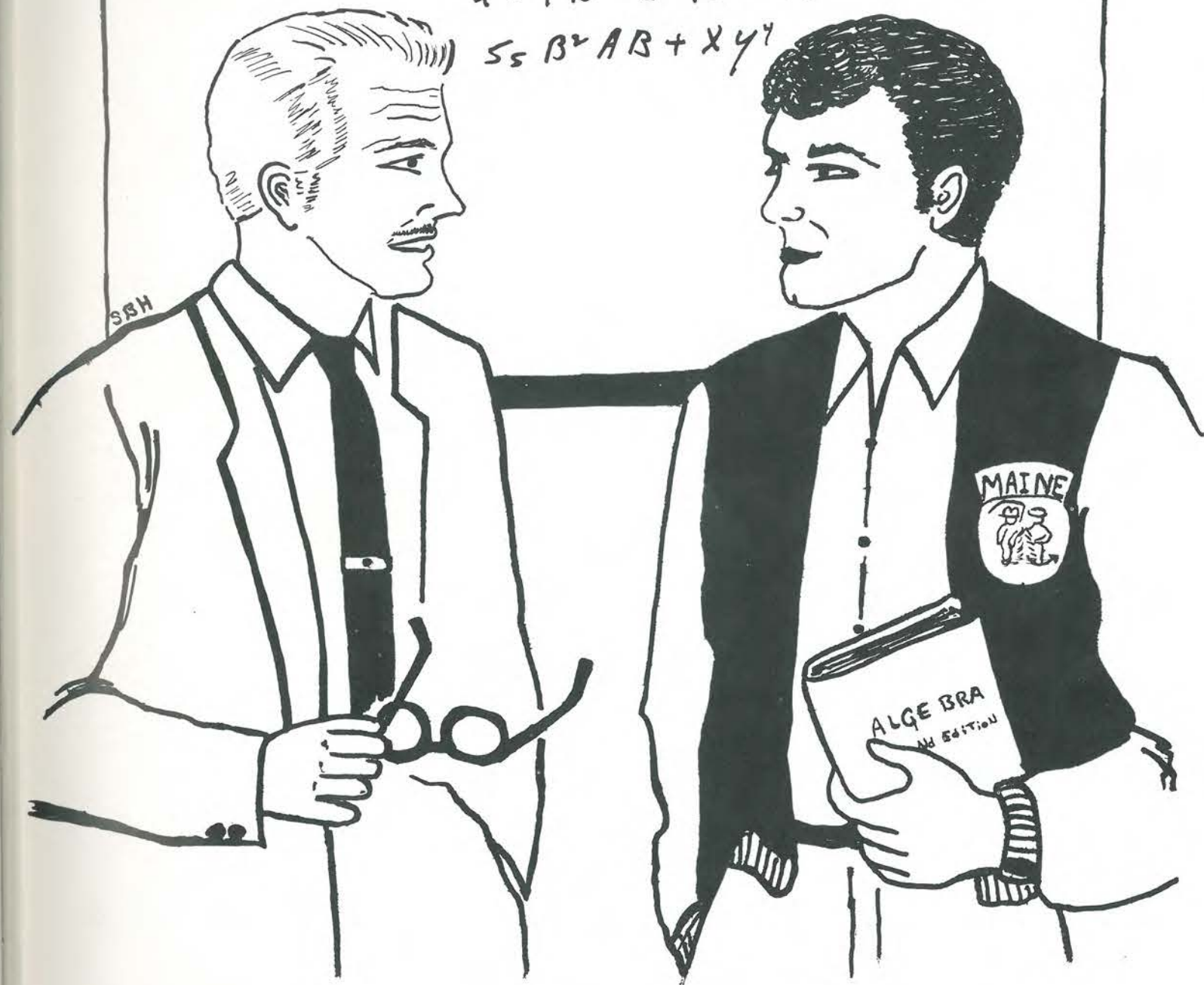

In 1937 he received his A.B. from Glenville State College, in 1939 his M.A. from the University of West Virginia, in 1948 his Ph.D. from the University of Colorado.

Luther I. Bonney is a native of the State of Maine. He is a graduate of Bates College from which he later received an honorary degree, and was a student at Johns Hopkins University.

He has served with extraordinary devotion as a teacher and educational administrator. Beginning as a teacher of Latin and Greek in secondary schools, he later became professor of mathematics at Middlebury College with which he was affiliated for twelve years. Dean and teacher at Portland Junior College, now the University of

Maine in Portland, he combined courage and faith with ability and tireless effort enabling him to overcome seemingly insurmountable obstacles.

In recognition of his high ideals and his long, happy, and useful years as a teacher and administrator, the Trustees of the University of Maine were happy to confer upon him the honorary degree of Doctor of Science in Education.

We are proud to claim him as Dean Emeritus of the University of Maine in Portland.

Dave Vaillancourt, with a late-season rush, emerged as the team batting champion, hitting approximately

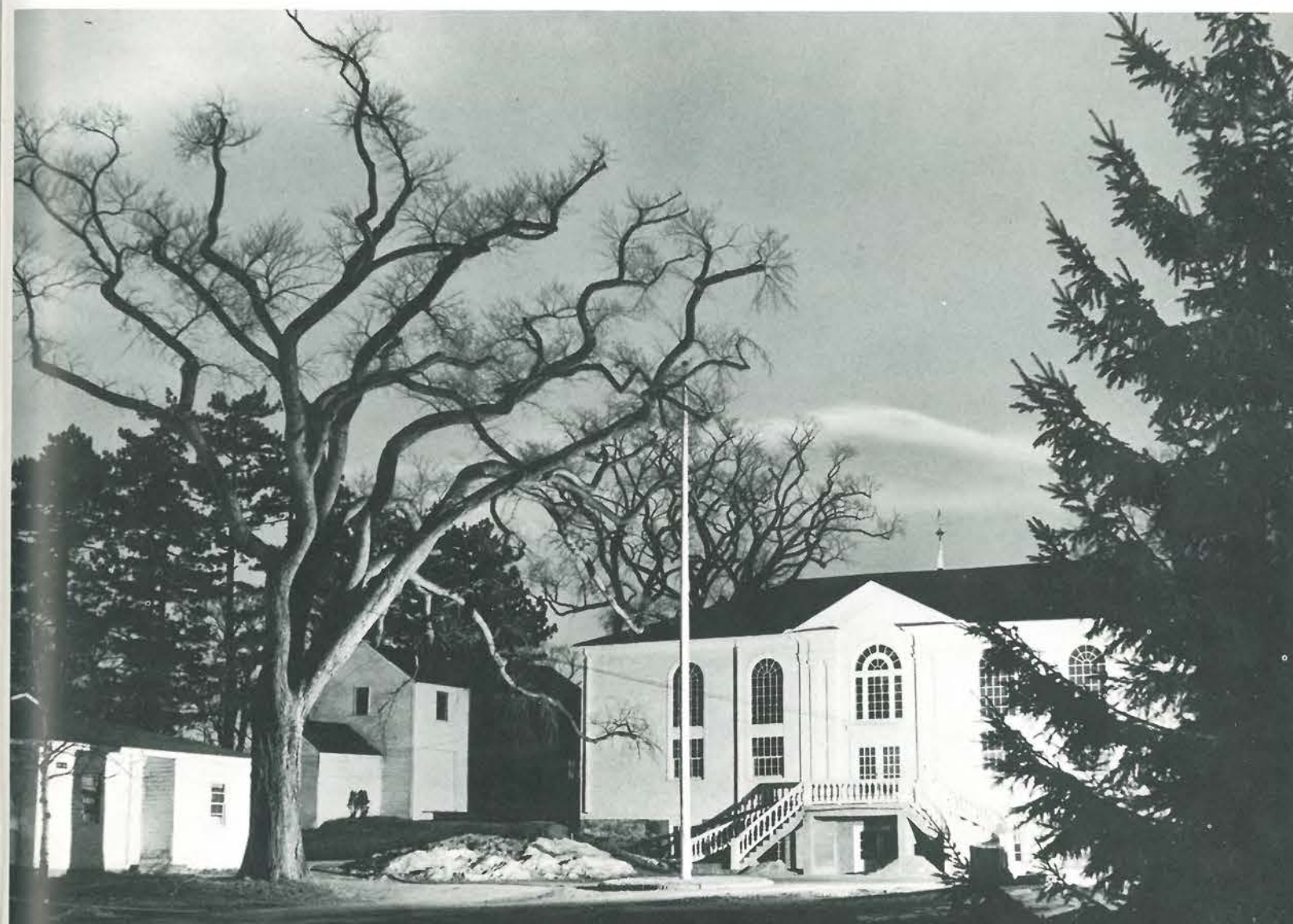
.350. Marty Bourque and Don Derrah also hit well over .300.

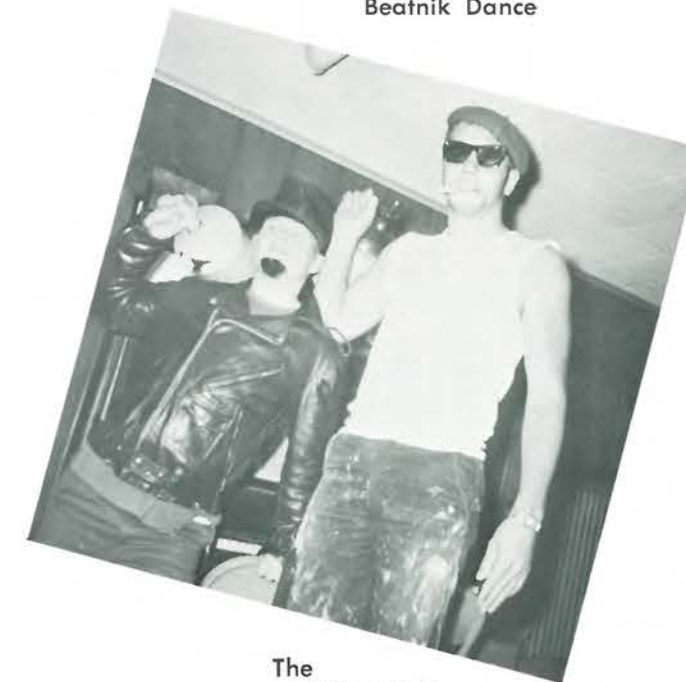

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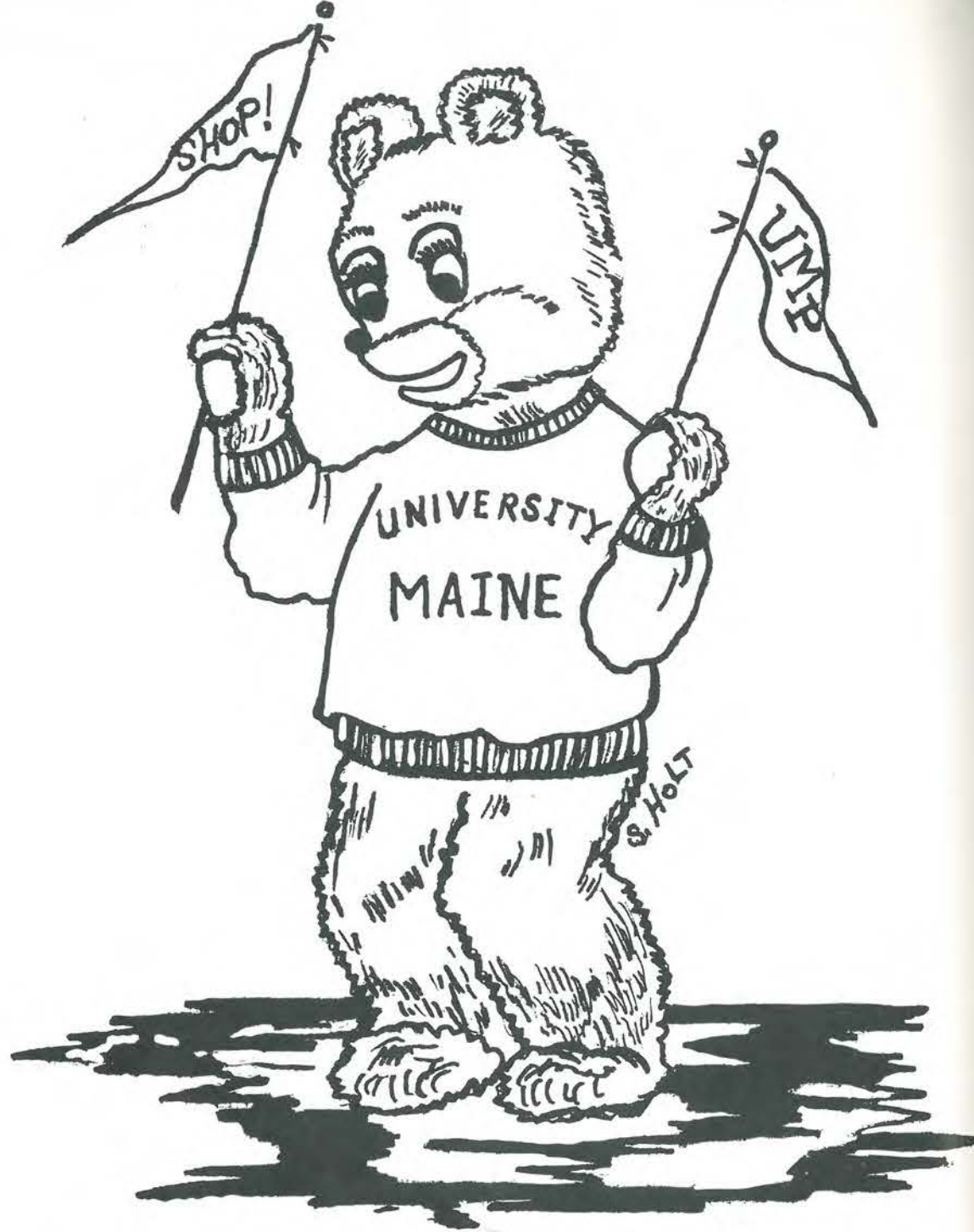

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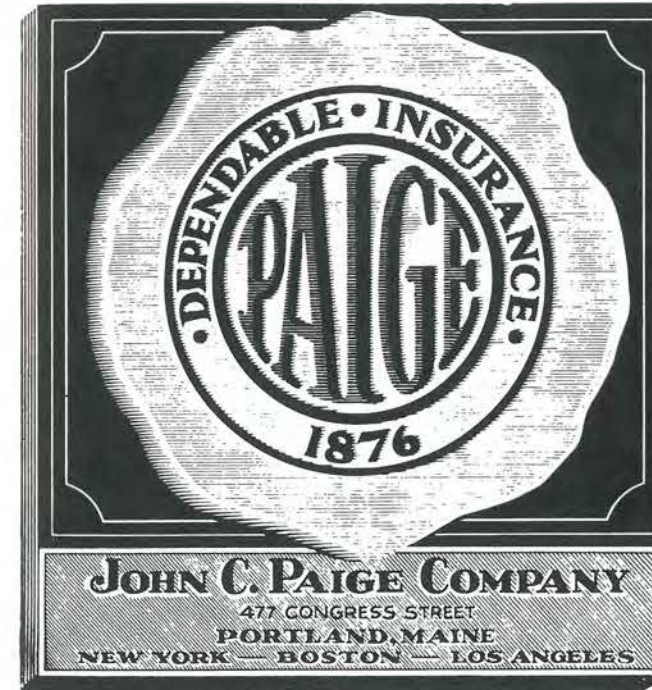
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
