Gary was truly a friend of all who knew him

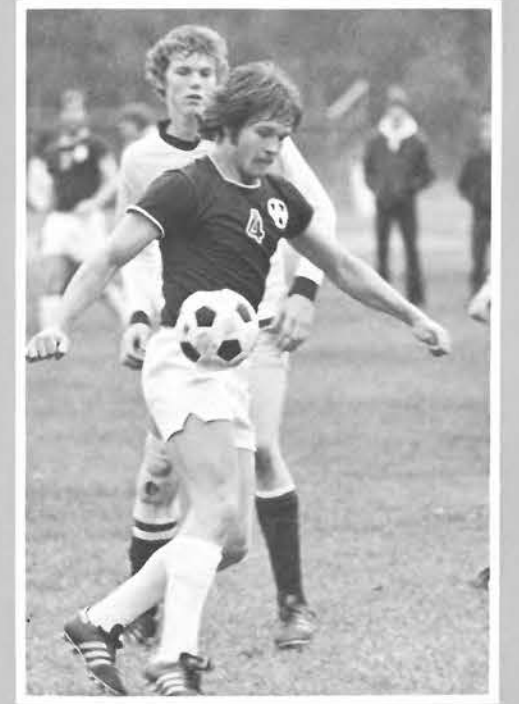

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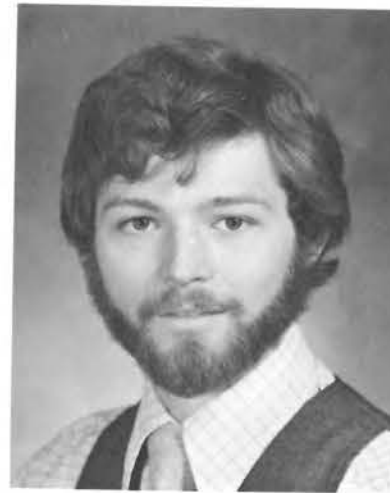
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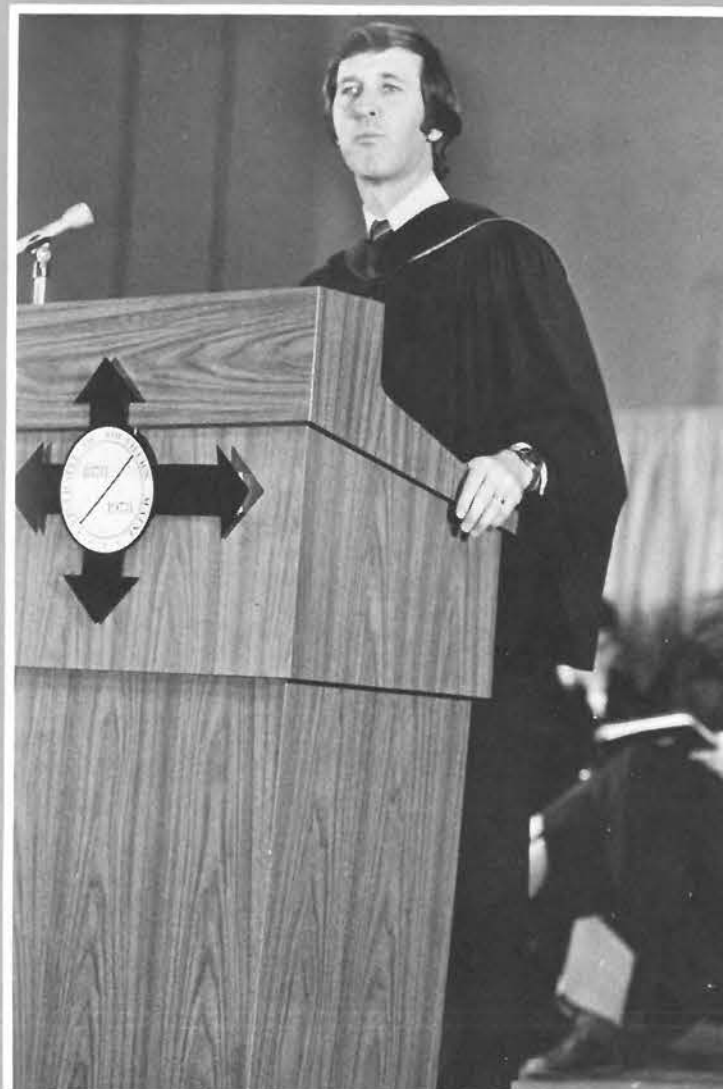
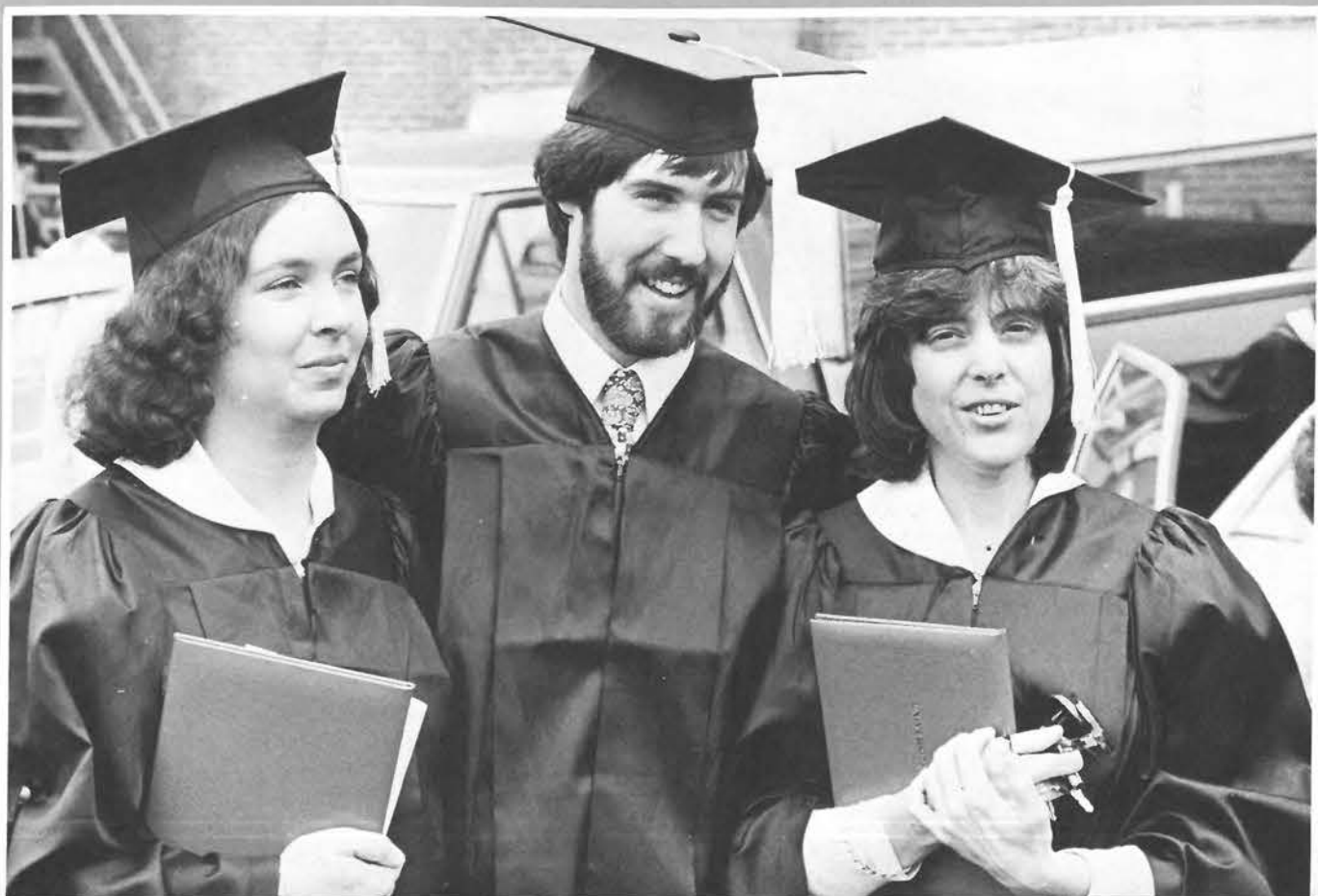
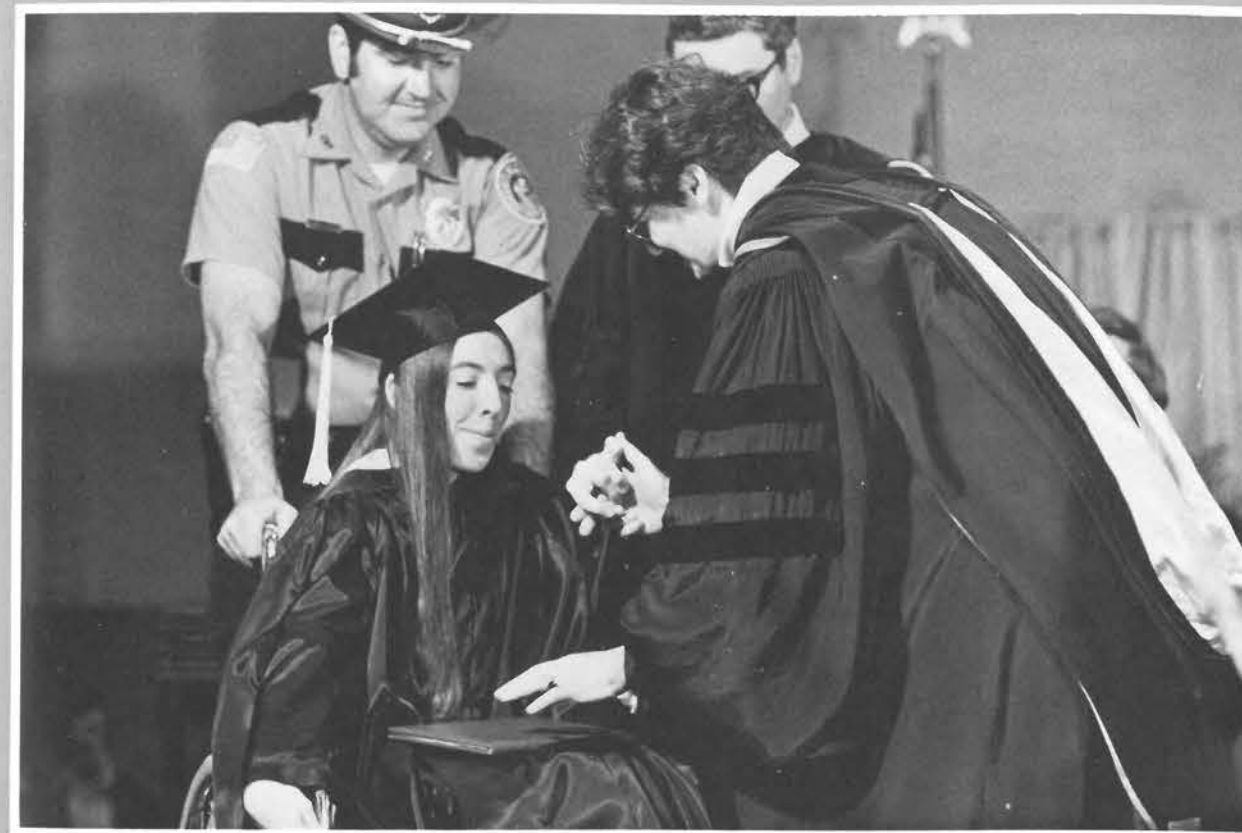
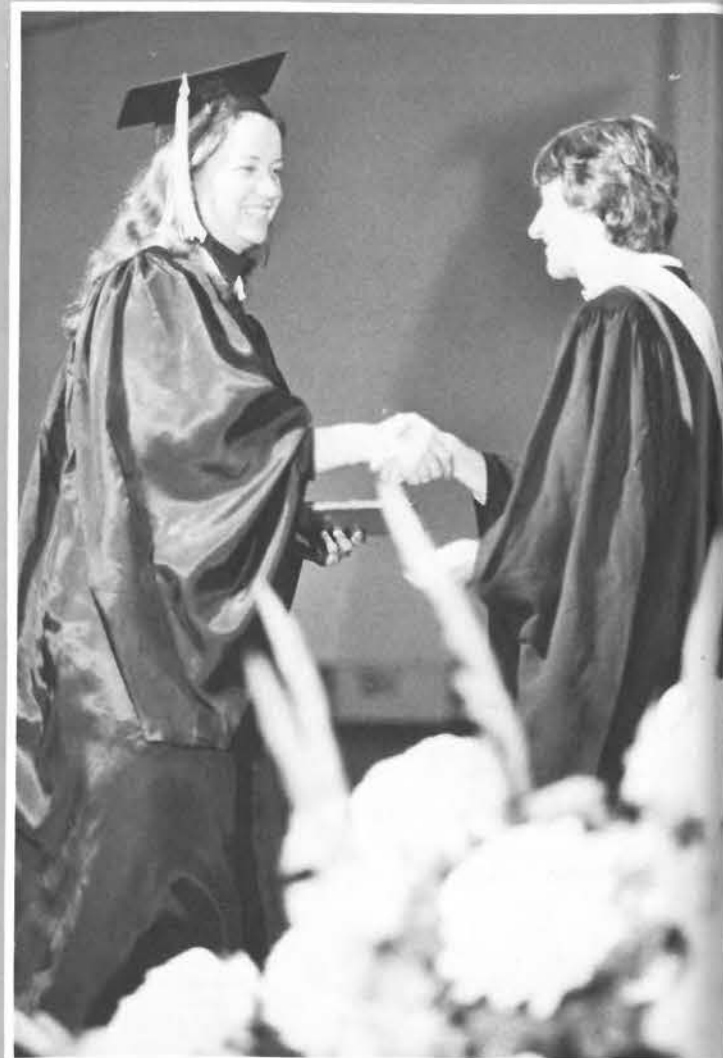
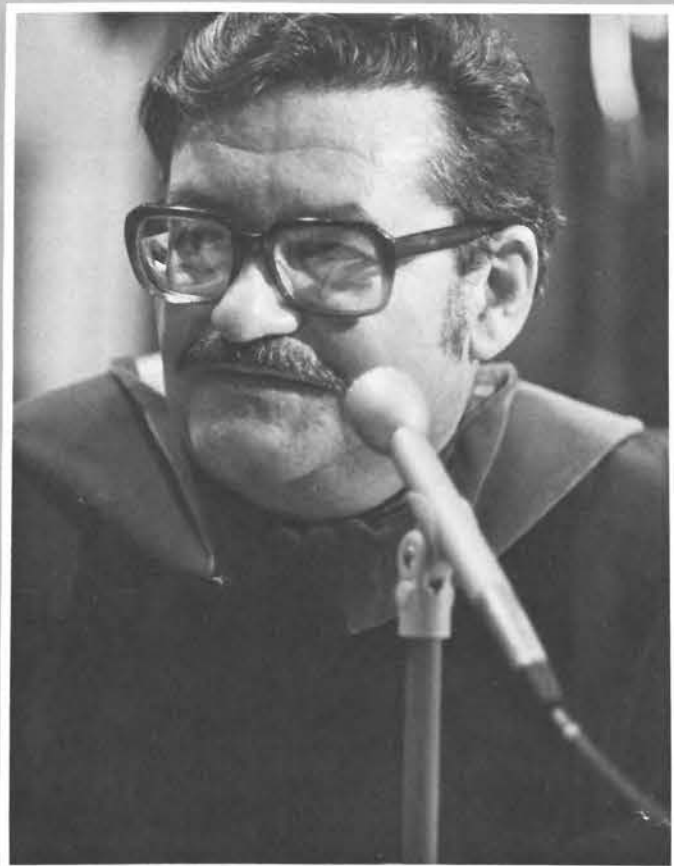
GRADUATION 1979

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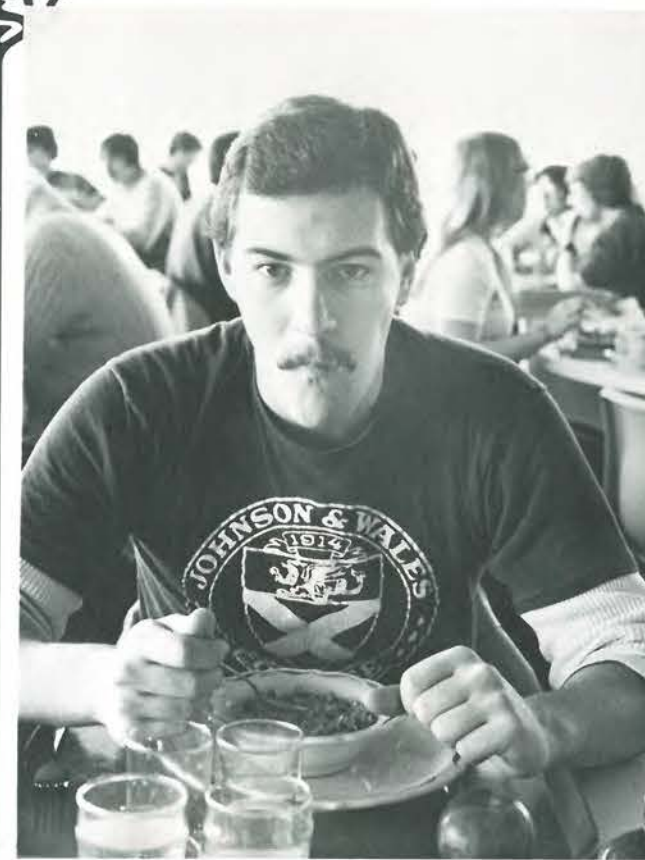
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
